



The vessel had run into the trough of the sea when she struck on the shoal in the hurricane raging and immediately she stranded. When the captain looked at he saw anoth-er towering mountain of water auvancing on the craft, believed that would sweep the rest of the crew, wh were forward, off the deck, and that his only chance for life would be jump into the main rigging and hol on, if possible, until the sea would have gone over the hull of the craft. He instantly put his idea into execution and climbed quickly up the rig ging. Those in the fore part of th ship launched the dory quickly and jumped into her, but the big sea al luded to hitting the schooner thre her down on the dory and buried he with her living freight, not a soul whom were seen afterwards be Singleton, all having been instantal drowned. This same sea threw the schooner off the rock on which she nung, and had damaged the hull badly that the vessel began to settl gradually. 

We have been asked to direct the attention of the Postmaster General o the failure of the S. S. Euphrates to go over to Portugal Cove for the mail for Bell Island on Thursday ifternoon. Death of Rev. Dean Born

At 2.30 this morning the death occurred at his residence the Deanery Kilbride, of Very Rev. Dean Wm. Born of St. Patrick's, Riverhead. The deceased priest who had attained his 66th year had been ill for over two years, and about 12 months ago went to Montreal where he underwent an operation at the hands of a specialist, the well known Dr. Garrow. The disease from which the Dean suf-fered, however, did not show any past 10 months the venerable clergy-man has suffered much and was confined to his room for over two months past. Dean Born was ordained to the priesthood by the late Rt. Rev. Dr. Mullock, 43 years ago on August last, after pursuing his theological studies at St. Bonaventure's College under Rt. Rev. His rst mission was St. Lawrence where ne spent several years, to be after-Burin, later receiving a similiar appointment at Trepassey where he spent 20 years and endeared himself to the people of the place. About two years ago he was appointed Dean of St. Patrick's, Riverhead St. John's, and was esteemed and venerated by the people of the parish. Dean Born was a classmate of His Grace Archbishop Howley while studying at St. Bonaventure's, and was a contemporary of Revs. Fathers Kinsella, Doyle and other well known and revered Catholic priests who predeceased him by many years. LONDON, Dec. 9. Over two-thirds, or over 400 mem-bers, of the new House of Commons have been elected, and the political parties stand as they were at the dissolution of Parliament. The standing of the parties to-night is: Government coalition, Liberals, 163; Nationalists, 53, Laborites, 29; Independent Nationalists of the Coalitation ists, 6. Total, 251. Outside of the defeat of Timothy Healy, Nationalist, in his old constituency, Louth, which is attributed to Cardinal Logue's prohibiting the priests The elections to-day did no provide any surprise, unless it was in the failure of the Liberals to re-capture Denbigh. The result of this Welsh borough is characteristic of the whole election. W. Ormsby Gore won the state last January by 8 votes and to-day increased his majority by one vote, although the polling on bot sides fell off.

Mr. Frewen has offered his seat for Cork to Mr. Healy, but Healy has declined as he intends to try to upset the election at Louth of Richard Haz elton.
