Complaint About Mail.

We have been asked to direct the attention of the Postmaster General to the failure of the S. S. Euphrates to go over to Portugal Cove for the mail for Bell Island on Thursday afternoon. Our informant tells us that the S. S. Progress went over at 7 p.m. the same day, at which time the weather was much worse than it was when the mail boat should have crossed. The subsidy has been considerably increased by the present Government and the people are expecting a service which should not be disarranged at a time when such a steamer as the Progress can make his way across the Gulf. We will no doubt look into the merits of this complaint and see that the public is properly served, if this dissatisfaction is well founded.

Death of Rev. Dean Born.

At 2.30 this morning the death occurred at his residence the Deanery, Kilbride, of Very Rev. Dean Wm. Born of St. Patrick's, Riverhead. The deceased priest he was appointed Dean 6th year had been ill for over two years, and about 12 months ago went to Montreal where he underwent an operation at the hands of a specialist, the well known Dr. Garrow. The disease from which the Dean suffered, however, did not show any sign of improvement as result of the treatment afforded, and for the past 10 months the venerable clergyman has suffered much and was confined to his room for over two months past. Dean Born was ordained to the priesthood by the late Rt. Rev. Dr. Mullock 43 years ago on St. Michael's last, after pursuing his theological studies at St. Bonaventure's College under Rt. Rev. Dr. Carfagnini. His first mission was St. Lawrence where he spent several years, to be afterwards appointed Parish Priest of Burin, later receiving a similar appointment at Trepassay where he spent 20 years and endeared himself to the people of the place. About two years ago he was appointed Dean of St. Patrick's, Riverhead St. John's, and was esteemed and venerated by the people of the parish. Dean Born was a classmate of His Grace Archbishop Howley while studying at St. Bonaventure's, and was a contemporary of Revs. Fathers Kinsella, Doyle and other well known and revered Catholic priests who predeceased him by many years. Three sisters survive the deceased priest viz: Mrs. Gosse of Water Street, Mrs. English, widow of the late Joseph English, printer, and Mrs. Margaret Roll of the Colonial building. Father Born was a zealous, pains-taking and devoted priest and his many friends all over the island will learn of his demise with the keenest sorrow.

An Amusing Incident.

At 4.30 p.m. yesterday a horse laden with fish packages, being hauled to the Fleet, became stubborn on Water Street, opposite the Telegram Office, and standing on the street car tracks would neither go backwards nor forwards. As a result the east bound street car had to stop, and every effort was made to start the stubborn beast. Becoming impatient, the motorman placed the head of his car against the team, put on his power and forced the unwilling horse down the street until he reached the foot of Holloway Street. The incident attracted a crowd.

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Dec. 9.
Over two-thirds, or over 400 members of the new House of Commons have been elected, and the political parties stand as they were at the dissolution of Parliament. The Unionists, who last week were expected to gain at least 20 seats, thus far have gained but three. The standing of the parties to-night is: Government coalition, Liberals, 163; Nationalists, 53; Laborites, 29; Independent Nationalists, 6. Total, 251. Opposition Unionists, 209. Liberals gained 14; Nationalists, 21; Labor, 4. Outside of the defeat of Timothy Healy, Nationalist, in his old constituency, Louth, which is attributed to Cardinal Logue's prohibiting the priests to vote. The elections to-day did not provide any surprise, unless it was in the failure of the Liberals to recapture Denbigh. The result of this Welsh borough election is characteristic of the whole election. W. Ormsby Gore won the state last January by 8 votes, and to-day increased his majority by one vote, although the polling on both sides fell off.
Mr. Frewen has offered his seat for Cork to Mr. Healy, but Healy has declined as he intends to try to upset the election at Louth of Richard Hazelton. Nationalist, alleging illegal practices on the part of his opponents. Two members of the Cabinet, Premier Asquith and Reginald McKenna, First Lord of the Admiralty, were involved in to-day's contest, but the outcome in Mr. Asquith's constituency will not be known until to-morrow. Mr. McKenna secured a reelection at Monmouthshire North. The Liberal majorities in Lancashire continued to fall to-day without, however, any increase in the Unionist vote. The most optimistic of the Unionists has no hope of making serious inroads in the Government's majority. Their leaders persist, however, that the election was unnecessary, that the result probably amounts to a vote of lack of confidence, and that with the Nationalists and Laborites exacting the fullest price for their support it was but impossible for the Cabinet to remain in power. The Unionists' successes in Lancashire caused great satisfaction to the Unionists to-day. They began, however, lack of Unionist gains in London.
The Saturday Review says: London City (2) was carried by corruption. Such charges seldom are made concerning British elections. Wales to-day named its last candidate, and Ireland will follow suit to-morrow, leaving but two Scotland districts, Wick and Orkney, Scotland, to choose members. The polling to-morrow will be brief. Only 13 constituencies are to be called on to choose members, and in only half of these will the result be known to-morrow night. Riotous scenes are taking place in many of the Irish towns, and as a result of a riot at Thurles to-night, Jno. Dillon was unable to leave town and had to remain hidden, as a crowd waited in the road leading to the railway station to waylay him. The trouble began at a meeting addressed by Mr. Dillon, which the O'Brienites tried to break up. The police had to make several charges to quell the fighting.

City Council.

A full Board was present at last night's meeting.

In reference to the letter in one of the daily papers about W. Harris being given the job of repairing the roof of the City Hall, Councillor Mullaly explained that he and not Councillor Martin proposed giving the work to Mr. Harris.

A letter was read from Mr. J. Harris of the Board of Works, saying that the Board members were willing to find half the cost of erecting new lights if the Council would pay the other half.

Councillor Martin defended the old Council in what they had done.

The Whitney Law Co. asked for a copy of the law taxing foreign companies.

The Gas Co. asked for more information re the complaint about their lights being out.

Mr. Dooley wrote to say that he had kept up a light at his own expense on Quid Vidi Road.

Permission was granted to Miss Knight to repair her house at Hutchings Street.

E. M. Jackman was given leave to build a brick wall in the rear of his place.

Permission was given to Mr. Hayse to repair house on Wickford Street; the repairs are only temporary.

The Engineer will be asked to report on the complaint that a stable on Freshwater Road is too close to Phelan's house.

J. Connell will be given leave to repair house on Circular Road.

Councillor Mullaly brought up the question of the tax for water rates on the proposed Seaman's Home. He drew attention to press comments on the subject. He objected to the proceedings of that meeting having been made public and deprecated the insinuation made in the Standard that Mayor Ellis was influenced in giving his casting vote because he had the contract to erect the building. A vote of confidence in the Mayor was then proposed by Councillor Mullaly, seconded by Councillor Ryan, and carried unanimously.

A discussion on Mr. Rooney's rate of wages followed. Councillor Channing contending that he should not have been paid for a half day when there was no work doing. A long discussion followed on this matter in which Councillors Martin, Channing and Mullaly took part. The best thing that was said during the whole hour was uttered by Councillor Mullaly who hit the nail on the head as far as outside opinion is concerned. Here it is:—"The people are sick and tired over this silly discussion, and they would be better pleased if the Council would spend its time in a manner more useful to the taxpayers."

After passing of the pay rolls and weekly bills the meeting adjourned at 10.30.

German Antarctic Plans

Lieutenant Flicher's Expedition Sails for South Next Spring.

Berlin, December 2.—Lieutenant Wilhelm Flicher, of the general staff of the army, and leader of the projected German Antarctic exploration expedition, says that \$175,000 has been contributed towards the enterprise and that he is arranging to sail next spring.

A Norwegian whaling vessel is being overhauled for the use of the exploration, and the officers and crew are being chosen.

Lieutenant Flicher will push forward as far as possible in the Weddell Sea before the winter of 1911 sets in, when he will establish a base for further operations.

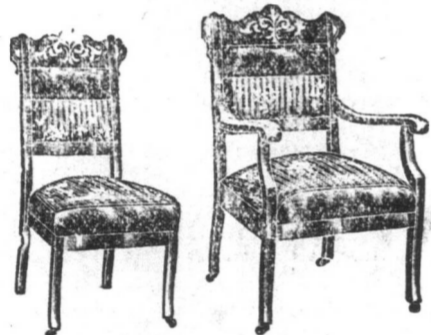

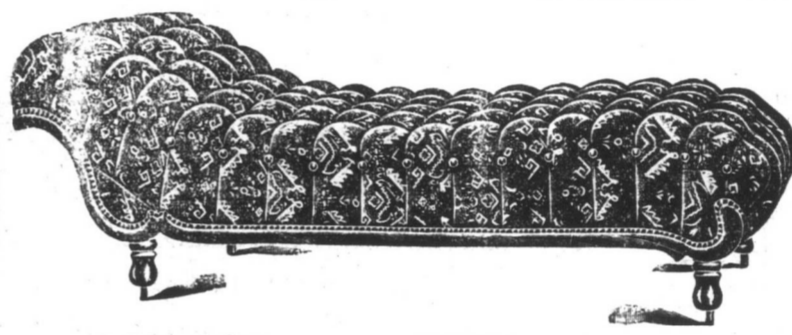

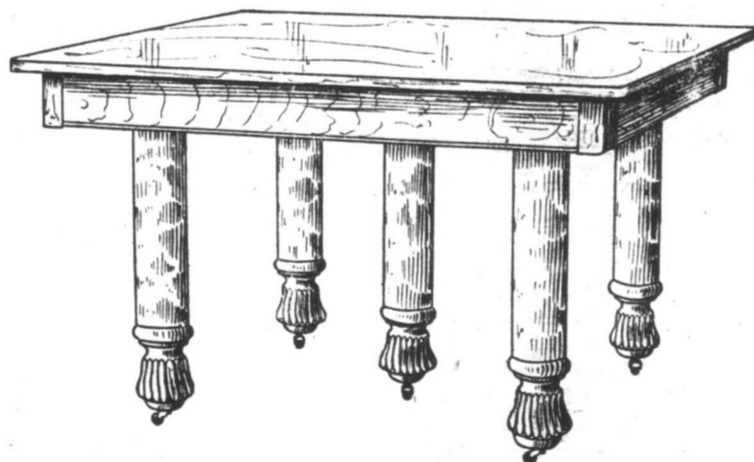
