



Household Notes.

When glass is broken, a very good way to pick it up is to wet a woollen cloth, lay it on the floor where the fragments will adhere to the damp cloth, which you can burn.

The Fishermen's Protective Union.

The Editor of the Evening Chronicle seems much perturbed at some of our more recent references to the good work accomplished by the Fishermen's Protective Union under the Presidency of Mr. W. F. Coaker. Why?

There is nothing new in our expression of appreciation of what the F. P. U. has done for the fishermen, nor is there anything new in our acknowledgement of the extraordinary part played by its President in that movement.

Eleven months ago we placed our opinion on record, and what we stated then we abide by to-day. We retract nothing, and the record of the time which has elapsed since that time has served but to strengthen the opinion to which we then gave expression. What we wrote then will be found in the summary of the outstanding events of the year 1911, and will be found in our issue of December 31st, 1911, and runs thus:-

"The most remarkable feature of the year in our Island Home has been the rise to usefulness of the Fishermen's Union. It would be idle, and stupid in the extreme, to ignore its influence on the fishery industry and particularly its success in obtaining for the fishermen more adequate returns for their labours on the deep. It is a power in the land, and likely to be a lasting one, if its strength is exerted fairly and honourably for the betterment of the fishermen."

"The part which its President, Mr. W. F. Coaker, played in obtaining better prices for fishermen selling fish is the most notable one we have known in such a connection, and should go far to establish the Union on a firm

and lasting basis. We are living in an age of community of interests, and if the fishermen of the country can show the solidarity in the future which they have shown this fall, their economic interests will be much better safeguarded in the future than they have been in the past."

At that time we pointed out the likelihood of the influence of the Fishermen's Union being a lasting influence. We referred to the unique exertions of its President, Mr. W. F. Coaker, and the benefits which had accrued to fishermen generally through the success of those exertions.

The events of the past eleven months have shown that our prediction was timely and has turned out true. The influence of the Fishermen's Union has not waned. On the contrary it has waxed stronger and stronger, and as it was a power in the land last December, it is much stronger on the eve of December 31st.

The success of its President, Mr. Coaker, has not been lessened. Indeed, during the year he has marched on from one success to another, and there is abundant ground for congratulating the Fishermen's Union on its year's work, and for the Union to be prouder than ever of its President.

Politically during the year the Liberal Party and the Fishermen's Union have worked on parallel lines against the administration of Sir Edward Morris. That course has been apparent to all who have read the Liberal newspapers and the Fishermen's Advocate.

We published the Memorials to the Governor asking for the retirement of the Hon. Donald Morrison from the offices he holds in the Morris administration, and we backed the petitions of the Fishermen's Union praying for a General Election in the fall of 1912.

As the facts, we have related in the paragraphs which precede this one, are those which have made an impression on the mind of the Editor of the Evening Chronicle that we are the sponsor of the "Notorious Coaker," as he dubs the President of the Fishermen's Union, we are content to leave

that impression on his mind, and what we do in the future, we hope will deepen that impression on his mind. We are not concerned much with irrelevant matter which Mr. McGrath may drag in. Our attitude is clear, and we can trust the public to brush away the usual irrelevances and scurrilities in which Mr. McGrath delights.

The Police Court.

A man convicted of the larceny of a quantity of soaps was remanded for 8 days.

A drunk was released on payment of cash hire.

A labourer was convicted of having his house in an unsanitary condition, sentence was suspended.

Three cases of cruelty to animals were on the docket. Two were dismissed, and one withdrawn.

A case of lewd and abusive language between two women, was dismissed.

Fifty Dead In Show Panic.

Bilbao, Spain, Nov. 25.—A terrible panic was caused yesterday afternoon by the cry of fire at a moving picture show here. About fifty children and others were killed. Only one woman up to late hour—last night had been found among the dead. The number of injured is not known, as most of them were taken to their homes by friends.

The scene of the accident is a large circus, which had been converted into a continuous cinematograph show. As the price of admission was only two cents the building was crowded to its utmost capacity, for the most part with women and children.

The operator of the machine lost his nerve when a film ignited, and screamed "Fire!" He was able to extinguish the flames himself without difficulty, but the effect of his cry upon the audience was instantaneous. Almost everyone within the building sprang up. The police and attendants were powerless to control the panic-stricken people, and were swept away by the surging mass which sought to fight away to the exit. Scores were knocked down and trampled upon and many were crushed to death in the passages from the galleries to the streets.

Fashionable Company.

Mr. J. Buckland said the habit of wearing skins and plumage in ladies' hats was rapidly leading to the extermination of many birds, because they were being killed faster than they were breeding. Some types had already been lost to the world in this way. On an island in the North Pacific Ocean was found a heap of dead albatrosses, waist high, their bodies stripped of feathers, and many having been condemned to a lingering death.

The beautiful lyre bird of Australia had been reduced to a few specimens, and not long ago some sordid wretches surrounded and fired a patch of scrub where these remaining birds had sought shelter, and shot them down as they rushed out. One hundred and twenty tail quills of these birds had been sold in London at 2s. 6d. each, quills which took millions of years to evolve, and which were now lost to the world.

Every egret worn by a woman meant not only the death of the bird, who would rather give up her life than abandon her little ones, but it also meant the wailing cry of hunger from her offspring.

Great Britain was the receiver of the stolen goods. A little while ago, at the feather sales in London, a snowy heron's feather was sold at \$100 per ounce, which was at the rate of \$1,500 per pound. Labor Leaders Planned Murder.

Indianapolis, Nov. 23.—Explosions of non-union works in Milwaukee, Omaha, Nebraska and Springfield, Mass., were explained by Orrie E. McManigal at the dynamite conspiracy trial to-day, as having been done by him shortly before he and James B. McMamara, arriving in Detroit to "clean up" that city, were arrested with suit cases filled with dynamite. For weeks before his arrest he testified he had observed here he was being followed and had seen strange heads dodging around corners of elevator shafts in the Iron Workers headquarters in Indianapolis. "I told James B. before we started for Detroit, that

William Burns had detectives after us, that detectives were even coming up near the vault where we stowed the dynamite, and that one of them followed me on the street when I was going with a suit case of dynamite to blow up the south Chicago job," said McManigal. "McMamara said if we saw any more of them we would go to Chicago and rent a room next to Burns' office, put an electric wire through our room, and arrange to set off, from our room, a bomb in Burns' desk when he was sitting there. That would make an end of our troubles with him, he said. I told him I did not think we would do anything of the kind or ever get near Burns." That was about April 15, 1911, McManigal said. He and McMamara were arrested seven days later.

Zelling had never met a cosmopolitan citizen and did not believe that one existed outside of the Smithsonian Institute. So he went out after the votes with a red automobile and some fervent advertising matter, and removed Jonathan from the public gaze by a large majority.

But Jonathan was not satisfied. He threw a few stimulants into his cosmopolitan citizen, rolled up his sleeves, cleared his throat and ran on an independent ticket in the recent holocaust. You know what happened. A large silver from the democratic landslide hit both him and Zelling and sent a two-listed relative of Thomas Jefferson to the senate. Jonathan took a spade and buried his cosmopolitan citizen as deep as he could reach, and has not referred to him by name since.

Senator Bourne is a useful man in the upper chamber. He is a nifty expounder, and has made a quick-fire battery of long, intricate words. He divides honours with the Hood river apple as an advertiser of the state, and thousands of Oregon people have been benefited by his largesse in the form of free onion seeds and fanned orations, which were not allowed to become too frank. On the fourth of March next, Senator Bourne will re-

tire to a locality of the same name, from whence no traveller returns without the formality of a primary election.

The bride wore a gown of silver brocade trimmed with old lace. The seven bridesmaids wore frocks of cream net and satin with blue ribbons and lace caps. Sailor boy pages held the bride's train of priceless Brussels lace.

New York, Nov. 23.—The greatest auction sale of books in the world ever known came to an end here last night with the last of the offerings from the library of the late Robert Hoe. The sale began over a year and a half ago and divided into four sections, fell but little short of the \$2,000,000, which it was estimated that the famous library would bring. The total, when the last book was disposed of to-night, was \$1,932,060.50.

DURAZZO, Albania, To-day. Servian troops have occupied this town. No resistance was offered. It is a port on the Adriatic which Servia desires to obtain and Austria is determined she shall not. Austria is most determined in this intention.

LONDON, To-day. Sir Edward Grey's proposal that Ambassadors of six great Powers—Britain, France, Germany, Russia, Austria-Hungary and Italy—should assemble in one of the Capitals with a view of emphasizing the points arising out of the Balkan war upon which nations are in agreement, it is understood have the support of Germany, France and Russia. Ambassadors will be able to register agreement on principle of such matters as to the future of Albania, disposition of islands of Aegean Sea, opening and closing of the Dardanelles. For instance, the Powers apparently are all ready to recognize Albanian independence, and pledge themselves not to seek territorial acquisitions in the Aegean Sea. News as to negotiations between Turkey and Bulgaria is scanty. There is a temporary lull on the battle field. Great secrecy is being maintained regarding the conference at Baghathe where the plenipotentiaries are discussing the terms of peace in a railway car saloon between the opposing lines in battle array.

The Biggest Idea Before Business To-day.

The following is a highly condensed extract as published in the Efficiency Magazine from an address before a thousand New York business men by Herbert M. Casson:

What is Efficiency? There are four periods in the life of a business. It begins, not with efficiency at all but with an invention some idea that Carnegie couldn't invent. But he can take something somebody else has invented and develop it into a great business.

The third period is systematizing the organization, and the System period is the one in which we have been moving for the last ten or fifteen years. The inventive period seems to have been over. We don't invent, but we improve what has been invented, and we organize the men who have been working on it.

Now, we thought until the last few years that the last period in business was the period of System, and nothing could come after that. But we have found that there is something further than System—something further than organization and consolidation, and that is Efficiency.

In many lines we have clung to the policy of system until we have made it automatism. We used to think, if we could only get men who worked like machines! Machines worked hard; made no mistakes. Therefore, I will make my men like machines. In fifteen years from now the students of business will say that is the greatest mistake we have made. Because there are things machinery cannot do. Machinery doesn't think! It is better to have somebody work for you who THINKS, and we are coming back from the thing to the think!

Let me give a definition in four words. Efficiency is a HIGHER PERCENTAGE OF NET RESULTS. It is not more hustling and more hurrying and more driving and more frenzied business. It's how to work with less energy—not more; with less effort—not more!

The capitalist puts first his capital—his dividends. The trade union puts first the working man and the wages. But the first thing in importance is the JOB. And neither the capitalist nor worker can have as high dividends or as high wages as they ought to have until they put an end to their senseless fighting and begin to think of the JOB! Think of the job, and you will raise dividends and wages and salaries.

The old method of manufacturing was simply a one-man system. The factory originates with some one man, like Fulton, who invented the steamboat; with Bell, who invented the telephone, or Morse, who invented the telegraph. They were not efficient men. They were inventors struggling with new ideas.

After the inventive period comes the period of development. Few men combine the inventive and developing faculties, was bossed by a manager and the line of authority was single and straight. The boss was supposed to know about everything but as a matter of fact he didn't. No boss does. He was the boss only by authority, not knowledge.

The line of authority must be single and straight, but the line of knowledge can be a very different thing, and about the boss can be a number of young men who are specialists in different lines—functional foremen, as we call them. Every factory ought to have not only a boss, but also a "plant brain." Ten or fifteen men who are all specialists in some one thing ought to combine and plan and tell the boss what is the best thing to do.

In advertising the first lesson of efficiency is Attention. Take notice. The good advertising man is the man who notices everything.

The next lesson is this. There are three classes of the public to whom you can go—the Impossible, the Possible, the Dead Sures. The Impossible are out of reach. The Dead Sures you needn't bother with. But advertise also to the possibles.

An advertisement is built like a house. There must be four elements in it—look, like, learn, buy. It must attract attention; must be pleasing, give information, and it MUST MAKE THE READER BUY THE GOODS.

which to write an advertisement—the standpoint of the advertiser, the goods and the public. If I say, "I want to sell gloves," that's bad. If I say, "My gloves are good," that's better. Masked Maniac In Charge

OF POLICE STATION WITH INFERNAL MACHINE IN HIS POSSESSION.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 19—Armed with an infernal machine containing enough dynamite to destroy an entire city block, a bottle of nitro-glycerine and a 45-calibre revolver, a masked maniac took possession of the Central Police Station to-day and held it for more than an hour, while hundreds of occupants of the building and those for blocks around the place in panic sought safety in distance.

When Detective James Hosick knocked the man unconscious with a leather billy after slipping up behind him, the fuse of the infernal machine was automatically ignited, but Detective S. L. Brown grabbed the box, with its fuse happily spluttering and hurled it into the street. Sticks of high power dynamite scattered over the pavement while hundreds of spectators stood apparently paralyzed with fright. Through a freak of chance there was no explosion, and Brown continued kicking the sticks of dynamite and jumping on the fuse until he had broken the connection and extinguished the fire.

Shoots Occupants of Automobile

For Running Over Dog.

Erie, Pa., Nov. 21.—Because William H. Forster's heavy touring automobile ran over and crushed his dog to death, Lloyd Pastorius yesterday afternoon emptied both barrels of his double-barrelled shotgun at the rear end of the automobile.

Three occupants, Mr. Forster, his wife and chauffeur, George Keller were riddled with shot. Pastorius admitted the shooting when he gave himself up to the police.

Mr. Forster and his wife are in Hamot hospital in a critical condition. Keller had fifty shots embedded in his hands, head and arms. Mrs. Forster had just turned to look out of the window in the rear of the automobile, when Pastorius fired. The left side of her face and neck were filled with shot. More than a hundred were extracted at the hospital.

A Gold Coin With a Record.

Albert Almon, the well known collector of Louisiana, relics and other articles of antiquarian interest, showed the Gazette a French gold coin of 1730 worth probably between \$10 and \$15 for the gold in it, aside from its historical interest, which formed part of the treasure in a ship which was lost shortly after that date at Point Micheau, Richmond County. The coin is practically as good as new and on one side bears an effigy of the French King, Louis XV., with a small lion rampant below, with the inscription, Lud. XV. D. G. Fr. et Nav. Rex." On the reverse there are the fleur de lis and shield arms of France and Navarre, surmounted by a crown, and surrounded by the inscription: "Chrs. Regn. Vinc. Imper." with the date 1730. The initial "T" below the heraldic device would indicate that the coin was minted at Toucan.

The history of this coin is an interesting one. About the year of the first siege of Louisburg, a French gun boat left France with £1,500,000 of gold coin to pay the troops and all other expenses which were standing for some time in Louisburg. On nearing the Cape Breton Coast a fierce storm arose and drove the little ship off her course towards Point Micheau, (which name is a corruption of Point Michael, after this ship, which was named St. Michael.) The ship stranded on a reef at Point Micheau known as Gros Bos (big rock). All the crew were lost. The gold was in oak kegs bound with copper or brass hoops.

That the story of the loss of this treasure ship was true was shown in the year 1900, when a big storm swept over this shore and a piece of oak keel 40 feet long, with copper bolts, came ashore. Further proof was given by the finding of many gold coins on the western beach, one man finding six coins. This created much interest in the Point Micheau gold, so that hundreds went there. The beach was plowed and dragged, but no more gold was got at the time.

The piece owned by Mr. Almon was found last June and owned by Mr. Taylor. It was obtained through Wm. M. Murphy of Point Micheau. The coins were all of gold, dated 1725 to 1730. Mr. Armon states that in his French histories mention has been made of ships leaving France with gold for Louisburg, and he thinks that through further study the story of this ship could be secured in full detail in some of the histories or from the French navy records.—Glace Bay Gazette.

Hockey Rules Revised.

At the meeting of the National Hockey Association at Toronto on Saturday, the hockey rules were revised. Penalties for fouls were outlined as follows:—

A minor foul consists of holding or tripping and loafing off-side when the goal is not in danger. For minor fouls the players shall be warned once, and for every succeeding offence shall be fined \$2. The third offence for loafing off-side shall constitute a major foul.

A major foul consists of throwing the stick to prevent a score, tripping an opponent when the later is attempting to score, cross-checking, charging from behind, kicking and collaring. For the first offence a fine of \$5 will be inflicted. Second offence, \$10 and banishment for twenty minutes. Third offence, banishment for balance of the game.

In addition to the foregoing a match foul is also provided for. A match foul shall be when a player disables or injures an opponent. For the first offence the penalty shall be \$25 and banishment from the ice until the injured player is ready to come back. The second and third offences shall be dealt with as in the case of major fouls.

The referee is given the right to overrule an umpire's decision in the case of a disputed foul. No megaphone coaching will be allowed on the side lines. In order that the spectators shall know just what kind of a foul has been committed, the following signals will be given by the referee: "For a minor foul, raising the left hand; major foul, right hand; match foul, raising both hands."
