

## Supplying One's Own Motive Power.

By RUTH CAMERON.



"The attempt to classify one's a c q u a i n t a n c e," says Gellert Burgess, "is the common sport of the thinker, from the person who says, 'There are two kinds of persons—those who like olives and those who don't,' to the fatuous immortal 'over' who says, 'There are two kinds of women—Daisy, and the other kind!'"

Classifications certainly are interesting, aren't they? And since I have Mr. Burgess' word for it that everybody likes to make them, I will not apologize for adding one more to those I have already made.

Today's classification is, there are two kinds of people—the many who will run well enough when hitched up to the motive power supplied by society; and the few who supply their own motive power.

For instance, there are many people who will do their best work when they are forced to it by competition or by the demands of an employer. There are very few people who have within themselves the motive power to make themselves do their best work whether there is outside compulsion or not.

Again, there are a great many people who, hitched up to the motive power of society, will live up to society's standards of honor and honesty. But there are very few people who

think out their own standards of honor and honesty and then have the inward motive power to keep themselves up to them.

In the matters in which society has its eyes on him, the average person can be depended upon to show the proper measure of kindness and courtesy to his fellow beings. What society expects is the motive force which moves and dominates him. On the whole, it would be rather hard for him to resist it than to let himself be moved by it.

But it is distinctly the extraordinary man who supplies his own motive power for kindness and courtesy, who is courteous even when society does not expect it of him, and kind in ways in which his kindness does not show and in a degree which goes beyond society's standards, but is demanded by his own. In the business world there are a great many men who are fitted to work under the directions of others. There are comparatively few who can direct their own energy to profitable use. A large percentage of all the new business concerns which are started are doomed to failure. And one reason is that the men who work successfully in other men's employ were not capable of working for themselves.

As I said before, the class of people who supply their own motive power is comparatively small, but it is not at all exclusive. Anyone may join it who will.

## Klem Flinched When Called Upon to Face the King

London, Feb. 27.—Yesterday's ball game was featured in the morning papers. The writers make lengthy comparisons between cricket and base-ball, and the consensus of opinion is that although baseball is interesting as a novelty, in the matter of games it is inferior to cricket, and not in the least likely to compete with the latter on this side.

Much admiration was expressed over the catching and throwing of the ball players. One writer suggests, however, that it is a sort of music hall turn. "This kind of power was delighted applause, but," he adds, "it becomes mechanical by its very perfection." Empire Klem's coolness and indifference to danger in his position is especially commended. "Only twice did he flinch," says one paper. "That was when he was called upon to face the King and announced the score."

The Daily News says:—"After yesterday's showing baseball still remains, and will remain, an exclusively Transatlantic dish, such as clams, crackers, and canvas back." His Majesty King George experienced the thrill that comes as the result of a spectacular hit which breaks up an extra inning contest. Seated within a wire-enclosed box behind the home plate of a diamond that has been laid out on the Chelsea football field, His Majesty saw in the second half of the eleventh inning Tommy Daly, of the Chicago White Sox, Canadian by the way, meet with his bat a fast ball delivered by Faber, of the New York Giants, drive it far across the field, and into the topmost bleachers for a home run, and win the game for Chicago 5 to 4. The King clapped hands as Daly trotted around the bases.

King George, who was accompanied by Walter Hines Page, the American Ambassador, watched with great interest and seeming knowledge of the game the closely contested eleven innings, applauding heartily brilliant field and battery plays.

Others in the Royal box were Col Squire, Commander Symington, Harold Fowler, Ambassador Page's secretary, Admiral Kepple, Lord Granville, and Sir Frederick Ponsonby. Small tables were also provided, whereon the King kept the score on his programme under the tutelage of

Mr. Page and Mr. Laughlin. The King laughed heartily when the first ball struck the protecting wire netting, causing those behind to duck apprehensively, and showed keen amusement, too, at the fans' shouts such as "Take him out," "Get a new umpire," "He's got a glass arm," etc. The King looked mystified, however, when someone called out—"There's a hole in the bat" as Jim Thorpe swung wildly at a low one.

## Queen of The Atlantic.

The Aquitania, the new Cunard liner which is to be launched this summer, is to occupy the proud position of queen of the Western Ocean. She is the last word in the science of shipbuilding and in luxurious travelling. The figures in connection with the Aquitania are remarkable: Cost, £2,900,000; length, 301 ft.; breadth, 97 ft.; depth of boat-deck, 22 ft. 6 in.; gross tonnage, 47,000; speed, 23 knots; passenger accommodation, 3,250; crew, 1,000.

A very important feature is that she is a ship within a ship. That is to say, she has two shells—an inner, and an outer—both of which are watertight. The space between the two averages about fifteen feet, while this space is divided into compartments by bulkheads at intervals.

There are, altogether, eight decks on which passengers are carried, and among the comforts to be found on board this luxurious ship may be mentioned: Drawing-room, hall and galleries, lounge, smoking-room, verandah, cafes, restaurant, grill-room, dining-room, gymnasium, and a swimming bath.

## Furs From The North Country


Edmonton, Alta., Mar. 2.—Colin Fraser, who has been trading in the north country the last 26 years, arrived in Edmonton a few days ago with a catch of furs, which, he said, is the largest he has made in 10 years. His pack included pelts of 17 silver, 70 cross and 45 white foxes, 56 otter, 30 lynx, 400 marten, 21 wolverines and several bear skins. He made the trip south from Fort Chipewyan to Fort McMurray with four dog teams, and from the last named point to Athabasca with horses. D. S. Mackenzie of Fort McMurray, who accompanied Fraser on the down trip, brought these pelts: Red foxes, 189; silver, 21; mink, 473; lynx, 69; rats, 113; bear, 9; wolves, 14; wolverines, 2; weasels, 137; otter, 20; skunk, 15 and two coyotes.

The value of the fur catch in northern Alberta for the season is placed at several million dollars.



## At the House

Petitions were presented by Mr. Downey on Temperance reform, by Mr. Clift, from Botwood and other places on same subject; by Mr. Hicks from Old Perlican on same subject; by Mr. Lloyd from British Hill, etc. on fishery matters, and from Smith's Sound for a road; by Mr. Devaux from Point Verde, asking for the dredge; by Mr. Stone from Whalra Brook for electric road board and from New Perlican on sawmills; by Mr. Halfyard from Fogo, on Temperance, from Tilling for canal, from Joe Batt's Arm for a well, and from Fogo for various public works; by Mr. Targett from New Melbourne and Brownsdale, on Temperance and from Blaketown for electric road board; by Mr. Hickman from Bay de Verde for road; by Mr. Coaker from Charlottetown, B. B., on temperance; by the Premier from St. John's West, on

temperance; by Mr. Kent from St. John's East, on the same subject. The report of the Joint Select Committee on the Fishery Resolutions, submitted by the Prime Minister were read and adopted. The Salaries and Marine and Fisheries Bills were passed without amendment by the Legislative Council, and read by the Speaker. The rules of the House were suspended on motion of the Prime Minister. The House then resolved itself into Committee on the Sealing amendment. Some little discussion took place and further amendments made, during which Mr. Kent showed how both branches of the Legislature had been slighted by sealing captains, who had waited upon His Excellency the Governor and laid before him protests they had against some of the clauses in the sealing bill. He thought that the proper course for these men to adopt was to approach the Legisla-

ture, particularly as the House was in Session, and he had no doubt but that their grievance would receive very earnest consideration. He was very glad the Governor acted as he did and referred the matter to the Prime Minister. The Council's amendments to the Sawmills Bill were read a second time and concurred in. The Pilotage Bill was read a third time. Partisan Reports and the Herald's falsehood. Mr. Kent dealt with the partisan reports that he referred to on Friday last and read from the Evening Herald an extract to the effect that the Opposition members had done Mr. Dunfield, Supervisor of Debates, an injustice by blaming him for supplying improper synopsis of official debates. Mr. Kent denied the accusation and repudiated the Herald's statement. The Revenue Bill was read a third time when Mr. Kent arose and made a few observations in reply to the Prime Minister regarding the question of cur trade. He was glad that his former reference to this matter had the effect of stirring up the Customs Department and made them realize that the exports were undervalued. It was important then that the valuation of our exports should be as correct and reliable as possible. Regarding the increased taxation and the changing of the tariff Mr. Kent reiterated the criticisms he made on Friday last and that proper care and thought had not been exercised in the making up of the new tariff. The Prime Minister said there was a similarity between England and Newfoundland regarding the question of trade. He said if there was any extravagance it was not the fault of the Government or of any individual as such things would happen in every

Government. He was prepared to submit the expenditures and accounts of the Government for the last five years to an impartial tribunal. It would be difficult, he thought, to get the exact cost of our exports and he said ironically the way to deal with parties who did not give proper valuations was to put them in jail. ## Concession to Ulster Unionists.

Asquith's Plan—Each County Will Decide for Itself Whether to Come in Under Home Rule or to Stay Out for Six Years. Unionists receive it coolly. Redmond thinks concessions too great, but accepts them for the sake of peace.—Carson Rejects the Offer.

LONDON, This a.m.

Premier Asquith yesterday laid before the Commons his proposed concessions to Ulster with regard to its position under the Irish Home Rule Bill. The announcement which has been so long and so anxiously awaited, was to the effect that before the Bill became operative, polls should be taken in each county to decide whether there should be an exclusion of Ulster counties from the provisions of the Bill for a period of six years from the first meeting of the new Irish Parliament. If the majority of voters were in favor of this scheme, the county would automatically be excluded for the prescribed period. Before an attendance even larger than that which listened to the introduction of the Home Rule Bill, the Premier began his statement as to the concessions the Government proposed to offer Ulster, shortly before 4 o'clock. He prefaced his speech with a declaration that the Government made these suggestions, not because it was running away from the original Bill, but merely to allow the Bill to start with the greatest prospect of success. While there was possibly acute dissatisfaction and civil strife in Ulster, said the Premier, if the Bill should be shipwrecked or postponed the outlook was equally formidable. The supporters of the Bill were as convinced to-day as ever they have been of the soundness of its principles and machinery, continued the Premier. He said he regarded it as a sincere and considerate attempt to place the Irish Government on a solid foundation without injustice or hardship to any one class. He informed the House that negotiations for a compromise last August failed to result in any approach to agreement, but had made all realize more than

ever the difficulties of the situation. To meet Ulster's objections they had tried to devise "home rule within home rule," but that proposition did not commend itself either to the Unionists or Nationalists. By such a scheme Ulster would have been exempted from the administrative and executive authority of the Dublin Government, while legislation to which Ulster objected could not come into force until it had been sanctioned by the British Parliament. Another suggestion considered was the inclusion of the whole of Ireland in the Bill for legislative and executive purposes, but giving Ulster counties the option of removing themselves for a time. Any sort of exclusion, said the Premier, would tend to keep the controversy alive and would invite serious administrative and financial difficulties. He said he believed the Unionists would find some form of provisional exclusion as a medium between the surrender of principles and the application of force.

LONDON, To-day.

The plan for the conciliation of the Unionists in Ulster in connection with Irish Home Rule Bill laid before the Commons yesterday met with but a cool reception from Unionists. Asquith's offer was that a poll should be taken of electors in each county of Ulster to decide before the Bill became operative whether they should be excluded from the operation of the Bill for a period of six years from the first meeting of the new Irish Parliament. This, it was pointed out, would result almost undoubtedly in the exclusion from Irish Home Rule of the counties of Antrim, Armagh, Londonderry, Down, Bonar Law, leader of the Opposition objected to the six year limit and demanded a dissolution of the Imperial Parliament on the

question. He was followed by John Redmond, leader of the Nationalists, who declared although the concessions went too far, he and his colleagues would agree to them for the sake of peace. Sir Edward Carson, leader of the Ulster Unionists, rejected the plan. Bonar Law, Unionist leader, in a speech following the Prime Minister, left no doubt that the offer falls to meet the approval of Unionists. If the proposal of the Government represented the last word then the situation was a grave one, was the significant warning of the leader of the Opposition. Although the Chamber was crowded yesterday afternoon when Asquith arose at 4 o'clock to make the announcement, the occasion was marked by an absence of demonstration or excitement beyond ministerial cheers. When the Prime Minister expressed his own satisfaction with the inherent justice of the measure and also his regret at the failure of negotiations looking to a settlement by consent, his speech was heard in silence. Bonar Law's speech received similar treatment. Sir Edward Carson's explanation that though indisposed for several days, he determined to be present on this occasion, evoked sympathetic applause from both parties. His repudiation of the Prime Minister's offer, accompanied by the assertion that Ulster could

not accept the proposal, which meant her death sentence with a stay of execution for six years, produced a profound impression. Premier Asquith said a poll would be taken in the county if a requisition was presented signed by one-tenth of the electors presented within certain time after the date of the passing of the Bill. Persons entitled to vote were those entitled to vote at Parliamentary elections, and the question put would be "Are you for exclusion of the county from the Government of Ireland for a period of years, or are you against such exclusion." The poll would be taken by ballot similarly to Parliamentary election. If the poll resulted in favor of exclusion, the county would be automatically excluded for the prescribed period. Sir Edward Carson, "What happens at the end of six years?" Asquith replied there should be ample time to test by experience the actual working of the Irish parliament. They were sure also that before the period of exclusion ended there should be a certain opportunity for the electors of the United Kingdom to pronounce whether or not the exclusion should come to an end. Asquith showed by examples there must be two general elections before the period of exclusion expired. The Government believed it was a fair and equitable agreement. In reply to a question by Bonar Law, the Premier said they should come in after six years unless the Imperial Parliament otherwise determined. He emphasized the excluded areas during these six years would continue their representation in the Imperial Parliament.

At the close of last night's entertainment ringing British cheers were given for the retiring commander and his successor, and the National Anthem brought the happy event to a close.

### Rescue of the Langan.

(Boston Globe, Feb. 27th.)

One of the most remarkable rescues in the records of marine history was effected yesterday when the little Red Cross liner Morwenna towed the big British collier Langan into harbour from 190 miles out to sea, where she had been floundering helplessly for eight days without her propeller.

**MASS OF THANKSGIVING.**

Five of the highest dignitaries of the Catholic Church in Newfoundland, on their decennial pilgrimage to Rome to meet the Pope, figured in the most picturesque and heart touching scene ever witnessed on the high seas.

At 4 o'clock on Thursday morning the little Morwenna passed a line out to the stranded coal boat with her 48 lives aboard.

The news was flashed to the steamship's passengers that nearly half a hundred men had been snatched from the jaws of death on the heaving ocean, and Archbishop Howley, of St. John's, and Bishop March, of Harbourside, Nfld., knelt on the deck of the Morwenna and offered up a mass of thanksgiving to bless the means that their steamer had been the means of bringing another vessel with her precious lives safe into harbour.

With the consent of the passenger steamer grouped around them, the highest potentates of the Catholic Church in Newfoundland whispered the holy words of prayer in thanks to the divine will which had decreed that they should be present in such an inspiring scene.

Archbishop Howley, Bishop March, the Rt. Rev. Mgr. McCarthy, of Carbonear, the Rt. Rev. Mgr. Reardon, of Placentia, and the Rev. Father J. St. John, chancellor of St. John's diocese, of Torbay, Newfoundland, all on their decennial pilgrimage to the Holy City, told of the gallant work of the men aboard the Morwenna.

Archbishop Howley bemoaned the fact that he and his brethren had not been in Torbay, Harbourside, without having had the opportunity of paying their respects to Cardinal O'Connell. Archbishop Howley spoke feelingly of reading the cardinal's letter of commendation of the ship, expressing his best wishes for His Eminence.

When it was suggested that the clergyman might lose the serious day, Europe on account of the serious delay caused by the rescue of the disabled collier, Archbishop Howley threw up his hands in astonishment that such a question should be raised at such a time.

"I will miss many steamers gladly, if I could be aboard vessels which saved lives like this one," he exclaimed.

At 4 a.m. yesterday, the Morwenna, in response to the distress rockets sent up by the Langan's crew, ran down to her assistance. She stood by until daylight, when the Langan lowered a boat, in charge of Second Officer Thompson, and with three of the Chinese sailors, attempted to take a towing line to the suc oring vessel.

Hardly had the boat struck the water when it was capsized by a heavy sea and the men were thrown into the water. Lines were thrown to them from the Langan and all four were drawn on board in safety.

Capt. Garbutt, in recounting the story of his experience, said that the Langan left here at 11 a.m., Feb. 17, on Feb. 18, at 7 a.m., when 53 miles west by south from Seal Island, or about 190 miles from Boston, the tall end went up a few hours later and the engines were shut down as quickly as possible to prevent wrecking the engine room.

The vessel was comparatively full at the time, and the sea was moderate. The steamer immediately fell off and in the northeastern gale which sprang up a few hours later she was carried toward the Massachusetts coast. Then a gale from the northwest sent her reeling off the coast. She was battered by heavy seas, and with no means of propulsion she was tossed about like a huge cork. For eight days the huge steamer was completely at the mercy of the elements.

# THE BUDGET

## Mr. Kent's Criticism.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.  
March 3rd.

**MR. KENT**—The Committee of the Whole House last week heard the statement of the Hon. Minister of Finance upon the financial affairs of the Colony, as set forth in his Budget Speech. This statement, of course, raises the most serious questions that the House or this Committee has to consider. It is always a matter of interest to the members of the House and to the public at large to know what has been done in connection with the financial affairs of the Colony during the period that elapsed since the last session of the House. Hence we all look forward during the session to the Budget Speech, the annual financial reckoning of the Government, with much anticipation. We always hope that his statements in relation to past transactions and his proposals for the future will be approved of by the whole House and by the country. I am however afraid that neither the statement nor the proposals which we have heard from the Hon. Minister on Wednesday last will commend itself to the Committee or to the people neither as to what has been done nor as to what he proposes to do.

Any person examining the affairs of Newfoundland as they appear at present, and looking back through the transactions of the past few years, cannot but be impressed by the fact that but for the mistakes of the Government we would not find ourselves in the financial position presented by the Budget Speech of the Minister. The Colony is in the position of a country that is entering on a race of development with other countries, and it is upon the men in charge of the affairs of the Government that the main duty and responsibility of keeping Newfoundland well in the front in this race for material prosperity rests. During the recent years prior to the advent to power of the present administration, we made efforts to develop our material resources, but unfortunately for the people the present Government cannot be congratulated for any progress or development made or inaugurated or fostered by them during their term of office. Any person who reads the Budget must be satisfied that such is the case. He makes no reference to any specific improvement brought about by his Government or during their term of office, but bases all his claim that abounding prosperity prevails upon conditions that came into existence during the regime of his predecessors.

The first fact that naturally strikes one in considering our position is that during those years nothing of a constructive character has been introduced by the Government. Beyond the building of the branch railways no national development has taken place, nothing that would help to build up the industries of the Colony, our fisheries, our mines, our forests. In fact the record of the Government has been almost a blank. When you consider in connection with this the fact that during their term of office the Government has had the handling of more monies than any other Government ever had in twice the number of years in power, the record is all the more unsatisfactory. They have had abnormal revenues, unprecedented borrowings, but still, whatever in-

crease there has been in trade and in revenue has been due to causes that existed before they came into power.

I have pointed out before in this House that conditions of our foreign trade as shown by the official statistics, have in recent years been changed from a favorable to an unfavorable balance. This condition still continues. To-day we have against the colony according to the figures given in the Budget Speech of the Minister, an adverse balance of \$1,340,000 in round figures. The year before, the adverse balance was \$850,000, and the year before that, it was over \$1,000,000. The year before that again the balance was adverse to the colony. If you go back for years previous to 1910-11, you will invariably find a balance of trade in favor of the Colony. What does this mean? It means that our imports exceed our exports, and that we are buying more than we are selling. What we buy over and above what we sell, we have to draw on our reserves to pay for. If we were to submit this to any impartial banker and ask his opinion in relation to this country he would tell you that the condition according to the figures, was one that showed an unsatisfactory state of trade. The figures in bulk have increased, it is true, but the imports have increased proportionally more than the exports. The increase in the figures as a whole, is mainly due to enhanced prices for fish and fishery products, also to the working of the mills in Exploits Valley.

Dealing with the general trade of the country, the Hon. Minister pointed out that the increase in imports are due to the normal growth of the Colony's trade and not to "inflation" made in the figures by the bringing in of large quantities of materials and machinery for installation of paper mills which accounted in the years from 1906 to 1910 for large importations. Then he goes on to say that these figures attest conclusively the beneficial effects of the policy of the Government. He took care not to develop this conclusion that these increased imports were due to the policy of the Government. There is nothing in their record of five years to warrant such a claim. No industries of general value or utility. No expansion of those previously established beyond the natural development of the business of the concerns carrying them on. Nothing to render our fisheries or our fishing business commercially more remunerative. It is true prices have advanced, but this was in no way due to the policy of the Government. It was due to causes operating outside Government influence entirely.

Now, Sir, I say here that it is a pity that the Government by its policy, did not see its way to give better and more intelligent encouragement towards the establishment of industries in this country, such as those at Grand Falls and Bishop's Falls, which would render the importation of materials for their installation and establishment necessary. Excessive importations, due to such causes if within reason, is alright in a new and undeveloped country like Newfoundland. The only increase in imports that can be traced directly to the policy of the present Government, are those due to the building of the Branch Railways, imports that are due to spending the borrowed capital

of the country upon these railways. According to the Minister's own figures and reasoning, the imports during the past year due to the building of the Branch Railways, amounted to about \$250,000 indirectly through the circulation of the money borrowed and spent in construction work, and according to the returns of imports tabulated the direct imports of materials for the Branch Railways, was \$224,000. In other words there was about \$550,000 of imports from this source. I base the statement in reference to the \$250,000 upon the reasoning of the Minister, which is contained in his Budget Speech of last year. The Minister there says, referring to the Railways: "As a matter of fact the average number of men in each of these years (1910-12) working on the railway would not exceed 1,500 for say six months or 180 days, at \$1.50 a day, equalling \$405,000. As the greater portion of what these men would spend of their wages is on articles such as flour, molasses, etc., which are admitted duty free, they would not pay in to the revenue more than an average of 10 per cent. on their whole earnings, which would be 10 per cent. on \$400,000, or \$40,000 per year."

The revenue on dutiable goods represents, according to our tariff about one-third of the value of the imports subject to duty. That would leave about \$120,000 or three times the revenue of \$40,000 worth of imports liable to duty from this source and the balance of \$180,000 would consist of non-dutiable goods and of imports indirectly due to other expenditures than those in paying the daily laborer to whom the Minister's figures alone related, making in all \$250,000, with the \$325,000 stated already as direct importations for the purposes of the branch railways. These are the only imports which we can say are directly due to the policy of the present Government, and these are based upon the expenditure of moneys borrowed by the Colony itself. These figures are low, and would, I think, if other reasoning than that of the Minister was applied work out at a much greater total. The rest of the increase in the trade figures is due in part to the policy of the previous Government—in part to the increased trade all around and to the increased prices that is got for our fish, and to the earnings of our people on Bell Island, at Grand Falls and other centres of lumber and paper and other wealth-producing industries which were in existence before the present Government came

into power. It is then, I submit quite clear that the present Government cannot claim that any of these industries and increased trade are due to their policy. If, as I said before, they had encouraged the establishment of industries, their return would show the imports brought to establish such industries and the industries themselves when established would be centres for increasing the wealth, and earning as well as spending power of the country. The balance of trade which exists and which is against the country, is due to the fact that we as a country, are buying more than we are selling, and are drawing upon our reserves to pay for this excess of purchase. The Minister tells us that the figures upon the values of our exports issued by the Department of Customs, during the last few years have not been reliable especially the value of our fishery exports. He says that the Deputy Minister wrote the Board of Trade that the valuations put on our fishery exports were so much undervalued that the figures were utterly unreliable and useless. Well, it is very difficult to understand why that is so. There must be something wrong in the Department if it is so. It is provided by the Customs Act that the value of the article of export when the export entries are made out should be sworn to, and surely it is the business of some person in the Department to see that the figures that are provided and the values that are stated and sworn to in the entries, are correct or as near as possible to the value of the articles under export. Surely the Department and its officers having charge of these matters have sufficient information regarding conditions in the colony, to know whether entries made in relation to exports contain the fair and proper valuation of the articles set out in such entries. Certainly there should not be such a discrepancy as would account for such an adverse balance as one and a half million dollars in the course of a year. This is a serious matter, and may put the trade of the colony in a very unfavorable light before the world. When the law calls for values to be verified by oath, surely we

should be able to accept the figures as at least approximately correct. Section 100 of the Customs Act, provides:

"Before a clearance is granted bound to a place or port out of this Colony, the owners, shippers or consignors of the cargo on board such vessel shall deliver to the Collector or other proper officer of Customs, entries of such parts of the cargo as are shipped by them respectively and shall verify the same by oath; and such entries shall specify the kinds and quantities of the articles shipped by them respectively and the value of the total quantity of each kind of article \* \* \* such oath shall state \* \* \* that the values of such articles are truly stated according to their actual cost or the value which they bear at the time and port of exportation," &c.

It also provides that information must be given regarding the place of manufacture or production. It clearly requires, Mr. Chairman, that the value of these exports at the time and port of exportation should be verified upon oath. If there is carelessness upon the part of people passing these entries it is surely the duty of the Department to insist upon proper valuations and not to issue figures upon the export trade of the country which convey such an utterly false impression of the conditions of the country. It is said that these figures are sufficiently large to make a change in the balance of trade in the Colony. If that is so, the authorities allow an adverse balance of trade to be published and go abroad when the figures in the Custom House are, as we are told by the Deputy Minister, so utterly unreliable, as if converted to show a favourable condition. By proper intelligence, proper information and proper observance of the law this defect anyway might be very easily remedied, and if my observations have no other effect I shall not have spoken without effect.

I have said, Mr. Chairman, that the present Government have had more money during the years they have been in power than any previous administration, and the Minister in his Budget Speech which he delivered here the other day took the position that one of the objects of a Minister of Finance is to find a surplus, not as the result of economy, but by taking more and more money from the people every year. He has always up to the present time been able to find a surplus because of the very large "revenue" in taxation which took place last year we were told was justified because of the surpluses which had existed and because the condition of our finances warranted the reduction.

Well you have to-day a very curious commentary upon the position which the Minister took in this respect last year. If you compare the Budget figures since 1909 they will, I think, teach you a lesson which it would be well for the Government to take to heart. Economy is the direction in which the energy of the Government should be directed and not towards increased taxation and not towards burdening our people


with taxes which are unnecessary and which I propose to show before I am finished are utterly unwarranted, unfair and proper. It is to be assumed, Mr. Chairman, that when the Minister of Finance comes into this House with his estimates he has carefully considered the sums necessary to meet the needs of the public service for the following year, and though every latitude should be allowed for unforeseen contingencies, that his estimates would cover all the needs of the public service that could be foreseen, and any emergencies which may occur during the year which might reasonably be anticipated by experienced officials. Now, if we compare the record of the Government in respect to their estimated expenditure and actual revenue during the past four years we will see how the Minister and the Government have avoided this principle. Take the year 1909-10. That year the Minister estimated that the expenditure of the country would be \$2,972,000.00. As a matter of fact

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
**THE BUDGET**

Mr. Ken's Criticism.

When the year's amounts were closed it was found that the actual revenue amounted to \$3,447,988.84. In other words the actual revenue exceeded the estimated expenditure by about \$475,000.00 or nearly a half a million of dollars. The revenue that year was larger than during any previous year and it is easy to see how to account for these large expenditures. These large expenditures are due to the fact that the money was coming in and the Government and the Minister fell into the temptation to spend these moneys on current account. They might have had as the outcome of careful financing if they had exercised it in that year a sum of nearly \$500,000.00 which would have covered the loans they asked for in the Session of the Legislature which then followed. If that surplus over their estimated expenditure had been available there would have been no need for increasing the public Debt in this respect; and, I think, Mr. Chairman, if the figures of expenditure for that year were carefully gone into in detail it would be found that none of the Public Services would have suffered, that none of the grants for Education or Old Age Pensions or other such purposes would have suffered. They were matters provided for in the estimated expenditure and could have been met out of the moneys voted without drawing on this surplus of half million dollars at all. Then, sir, we come to the next year, the same thing happened. In the year 1910-11 the estimated expenditure was \$3,055,655.72 and the actual revenue was \$3,271,264.42 leaving another balance of actual revenue over estimated expenditure of \$215,608.70 or nearly another half million dollars. The same remarks apply to this as I have made on the finances of the year 1909-10. Of course it will be said, as it has been said over and over again, that they had to spend money for education, for old age pensions and for other humanitarian and useful works of that kind, but I say, Mr. Chairman that these are things provided for in the regular estimates—were foreseen expenditures, and that these excessive receipts should have remained in the Minister's hands after meeting all the requirements for these services and others that were anticipated in the estimates for the year. Of course I do not say, Mr. Chairman, that all this money—nearly a half a million dollars in each of these years—should have been available for capital expenditure or for reducing the burden of taxation, but I say that the greater portion of it should, and I say that it should have been enough in the years that have been covered by the present Administration term of office to have rendered it unnecessary to have resorted to such large borrowings for local purposes as has been the case. All the expenditures upon which loans have been raised could under proper economical management have been met out of these surplus amounts remaining on current account after meeting all legitimate and proper expenditure.

Then, again, sir, take the next year, 1911-12. In that year the estimated expenditure was \$3,332,000 and the actual revenue \$3,736,455.87, showing a balance of actual revenue over estimated expenditure of \$404,455. Again, last year we had an actual revenue of \$3,919,040.40, and the estimated expenditure was \$3,600,000, leaving a surplus of \$319,040.40. In all, during the four years the difference between actual revenue and estimated expenditure was \$1,671,556.35. This large surplus might have been saved in four years had your expenditure kept within your estimated expenditures. As a matter of fact the surpluses of actual receipts over actual expenditures during these four years, if we include the hundred thousand dollars that was appropriated in anticipation in 1910 for special works, amounted to \$919,000. These actual surpluses for the four years was also spent on current account, and to-day you have practically no balance to the credit of your current account. In addition all amounts spent by the Government on capital account were borrowed which in view of these large receipts over the estimated expenditures and notwithstanding these large surpluses on your current account for these years. As a matter of fact, Mr. Chairman, the borrowings for local purposes other than railway building including the loan which was authorized the other day amount to over a million and a half altogether. (I am referring to local borrowings only). Of course the Minister will say the first loan included an amount on current for the year 1908-09, and that this was due to the Government which were before them. Well, I pointed out last year in the House that the Government which went before the present could not be held responsible for that deficit because that Government were



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out of power four months before the termination of that financial year, and the present Government—which has certainly made a record for itself in the matter of expenditure—came into power and had control during these four months of accounts and expenditure and it had then, of course, the making up and closing of the accounts for the current year. It is another case of the man painting the lion instead of the lion painting the man. Of course that is neither here nor there with regard to the present position which I am trying to place before the Committee. Notwithstanding all this money that has come into the Treasury what is our position to-day. Are we in a financially healthy condition to-day? What does the Budget of the Minister of Finance show us? Now, according to the statement issued by the Prime Minister prior to the last election in his manifesto he pointed out and accentuated the benefits that railways have been to this country and that the taxation last year as compared with the year prior to the building of the first railway in 1882 showed an aggregate reduction of \$800,000 a year.

We find to-day, in the Budget which the Minister of Finance presented here, that nearly all that has been swept away, and that the thirty-years' benefits which the Prime Minister claims to have been accrued by reason of the opening of the railway, have been swept out of existence by a single stroke of the pen of the Minister. So far as the taxation borne by the people of the country is concerned, and you are putting on to-day nearly \$700,000 of taxation at one swoop. Still, sir, we are told that the Government has been carrying on public works, has been building railways, that it has been extending the public services of the colony, and that it has not increased taxation. If that fact stood alone, and if the Government had faced the fact that the works they were undertaking would have entailed increased taxation, that the people would have to pay, and if they had honestly and squarely put that matter before the people and the people accepted it then, Sir, we could not find fault with them. They could say, "the people put us here, we told them what was going to happen, and they are to blame and you cannot find fault with us." But we find, Sir, that these things were not put before the people of the country. They were told that all these things were going to be done without increased taxation, and yet on the very first opportunity that the Administration has to deal with the matter of taxation, it is increased by nearly \$200,000 over and above the \$380,000 the amount which was taken off last year. Looking at these facts and looking back at the comments made in relation to the taking off of the duties last year, is it any wonder that I stated and that I repeat now, that the Budget last year was "an election Budget," made specially for the purposes of the election, to carry out on the eve of the General Election a promise made to the people at the previous election, and simply for the purpose of

throwing dust in the eyes of the people with the intention that the next session of the House not only to restore that amount of taxation, but to increase it by nearly eighty per cent. The Speaker left the chair till 8 o'clock.



Vienna, March 9.  
Hundreds of women, in mass meetings, are pronouncing in favor of Women Suffrage. These meetings were held yesterday throughout Austria. Resolutions were adopted declaring that it is the general demand of Austrian women for votes in parliamentary and local elections.

ST. LOUIS, March 9.  
Three are known to be dead and a dozen others are believed to have been burned to death, whilst forty were seriously injured in a fire which to-day destroyed the seven-story building of the Missouri Athletic Club and the Bookmen's Bank on Fourth Street, Washington Avenue.

WASHINGTON, March 9.  
Sir Cecil Spring Rice called at the State Department to-day to inform Secretary Bryan that a British subject, named Snyman, had been driven away from his ranch, and his property was in danger of destruction. Mr. Bryan telegraphed to the U. S. Consul at Chihuahua to make enquiry and report the facts. If necessary a protest will be made to Carranza or Villa.

MEXICO CITY, March 9.  
General Snyman, a former Boer General, has been ordered from his 3,000 acre ranch, La Reina, 45 miles south of Chihuahua, and the estate itself confiscated. Snyman was well known here. He was one of the leaders in forming the Boer Colony in Mexico after the British triumph in South Africa. He was born a Boer but became naturalized as a Briton before the war, and was elected to the Cape Assembly. He turned rebel against his adopted country, but was restored to citizenship several years ago by King Edward's proclamation of amnesty. Snyman is accused of allowing federals to use his ranch as recruiting headquarters.

LONDON, March 9.  
Men engaged in the Building Trades in London have sent an ultimatum to the employers, in retaliation for a circular letter issued by the Building Trades Federation, requesting provincial builders not to employ London workmen during the continuance of the existing dispute. At a meeting of the Men's Unions held on Saturday, the circular was discussed and a resolution was passed which declared that the time had arrived when all members of the Master Builders' Association must be regarded as at war with Trades Unions, and that only where employers withdrew from that Association should Unionists be allowed to work for them. This resolution, if carried into effect, will paralyze the building trades, which have suffered from a partial strike for several weeks.

**Channel Notes.**

The executioner's axe has again swung in this direction, the head of Mr. William J. Bragg, steward at Port aux Basques, having fallen at the behest of the honorable (?) member for the district, who is evidently on the warpath in full paint and feathers. It is said that the mills of the gods grind slowly, but they grind exceedingly fine. In the near future there will be a say in certain matters and then all accounts will be balanced.

There is considerable indignation over this dismissal, and strong protests from influential friends of the government have been made and the Prime Minister will be acting wisely if he listens to these protests and rectifies the wrong. Come, Sir Edward, now is your time to show that with you there will be none of that delay of justice which makes injustice.

The recent tariff increases are evoking considerable comment and much wrath. People can now behold without the aid of glasses the manner in which they were deluded by the remission of duties last year. They now realize the truth that the railway building and other pet extravagances of the Morris Government are likely to prove costly jobs for them. Truly this last juggle of Mr. Cashin's is a renezzed finance indeed.

The sealing steamers from St. John's are now due, and the excitement consequent upon their arrival and departure will go somewhat toward breaking the monotony of what has been a dull winter. The Gulf fleet is much larger than that of other years, but whether this will make for more or less seals being brought in, only the end of the voyage will tell. It is to be hoped, however, that all will make good bills.

In glancing through the new Sealing Bill, it is apparent that the framers overlooked one great essential by omitting a clause providing for giving the crews half their hand, which would have been of more real benefit to the men than all the elaborate legislation making it compulsory to supply meals a la carte. It is too bad that those upon whom the success of the trip is dependent should, after all their labor and hardship, have to be content with one-third of the catch. It is obvious that if fish and brews can, by Act of Parliament, be placed on the bill of fare, it is equally obvious that an act to provide for half their hand could as easily have been made. This is commended to the gentlemen of the Legislative Council.



A Paris firm has invented an ingenious method of signalling from aeroplanes. The device consists of a tube placed in such a position that a strong current of air from the propeller passes through it and is connected by a valve with a reservoir filled with soot. This valve can be operated by the passenger in the aeroplane in such a manner as to release either a large or small quantity of soot from the reservoir into the tube. The soot whirled out of the tube by the draught forms in the wake of the machine long or short streaks of black, by means of which messages can be given in the Morse code. The whole apparatus weighs not more than 9 lbs.

**ALL NATIONS TO ENTER GLOBE-GIRDLING PANAMA-PACIFIC AVIATION RACE FOR \$30,000**



Map Showing Principal Cities on Proposed Airship Race Route Around World.

The most tremendous aerial drama will be staged in 1915 when the signal is given for the 22,000-mile Panama-Pacific International Aviation race around the world for prizes of \$300,000 or more. Aeronauts from all civilized nations with every description of air craft driven by motors will participate. The event will compare with the crossing of the Atlantic by Columbus and the circumnavigation of the globe by Magellan in 1522. Arnold Kruckman, chief of the Panama-Pacific ex-

position bureau of aeronautics, will start soon upon a trip around the world, traversing the entire route, to establish control points and confer with commissioners that will be appointed by the various nations. The functions of this commission will be clearly separate from the aeronautical supervision of the race, which will be under the jurisdiction of the Federation Aeronautique internationale. According to the present plan the commission will be composed of five men, whose selection will be

placed in the hands of the President of the United States, the King of England, the President of France, the Emperor of Germany, the Czar, the Mikado and the Premier of British Columbia. The start of the race will be in May, 1915, from the aviation field of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. Patrols of scout cruisers will be established to mark the trail over the oceans and lend assistance if needed. Each machine will carry at least two men and will check in at each control,

where it will be stamped. Repairs and rebuilding will be permissible. Aviators are confident that by May, 1915, such progress will have been made that success will be assured. It is probable that by that time the Atlantic will have been crossed so successfully that the competitors will be given the choice of routes by mid-Atlantic or by way of Greenland. Circumnavigation of the globe will be the supreme adventure of our day.


