The Small Investors.

The British Government has taken a leaf out of the book of French finance with advantage. For a long time it has been the settled policy of France to encourage the small French investor to put his money in Government Funds, and this practice has had a notable effect on French thrift, which is the most marked of any nation on earth. It is indeed said that the quick recovery of France from the enormous levy made by Germany after the Franco-German war in the shape of an indemnity may be traced to this cause. Great Britain in the past has done very little in this tion. She has dealt rather with the big investors through the Bank of I England. In floating the last war loan a few days ago, she made special arrangements through the Post Office banks and the Trade Union or ganizations to appeal to the working class, evidently arranging for the holding back of the big investors. The response has been prompt, and according to a message last evening most gratifying. The Evening Standard stated last evening that up to noon yesterday \$750,000,000 of the loan had been applied for, and that Brothers. the present flow of subscriptions is mostly for small or moderate amounts. Not only are the workers volunteering freely for the trenches, but they are coming forward freely for the munition factories, and are showing equal readiness in putting their savings at the disposal of the Government. There is no room to doubt the statement that a veritable "revival" has struck the home-land that the people are bending their backs to the mighty task before them and that they intend to see it though.





To-day there are scores, even hundreds, of different sorts of explosives known to science. Some, such as lyddite, require a very considerable shock to explode them. Others, such as nitro-glycerine, are fearfully dangerous to handle, for a few extra degrees of warmth or a very slight jar is sufficient to turn them instantly

quite so unstable as iodile of nitrogen. It has to be made in alcohol. When allowed to dry it appears as a brown powder, and so unstable is this powder that a touch with a feather will set it off. The experiment has been tried of learing a few grains upon a table mixed with a few grains of sugar. The first bluebottle that flew on the table and began to crawl among the grains caused an explos

The mere jarring of the air by loud shout or a heavy footstep is sufficient to detonate iodide of nitrogen, and it need hardly be added that no one in their senses would attempt to make this terrible stuff. To do so in any quantity would be equivalent to committing suicide.

Lyddite Mustn't be Near Steel. But here is an odd point about lyddite. It must not be left in contact with iron or steel. If this is done the pieric acid combines with iron rust 2 to form a very dangerous compound. Consequently, all shells used to contain lyddite are first carefully tinned

Lyddite is six times more powerful in its action than nitro-glycerine, and nitro-glycerine, in its turn, is eight times more powerful than the same weight of the old-fashioned black

Ordinary gunpowder explodes upwards. Guncotton and dynamite exert their force in a downward direcvaluable for blasting purposes.

If you take a fern leaf, lay it on a flat piece of steel, and on top of the leaf place carefully a small quantity of guncotton. If the guncotton be now exploded you will find a perfect outline of the leaf printed delicately on the slab of steel, thus proving that the explosion has been in a downward direction.

Each shot fired in the present war requires three different explosives. First, the detonator for the firing charge; secondly, the firing charge itself, which is usually guncotton thirdly, the shell explosive, lyddite o some similar substance.
