the Governor in Council has been pleased to order that the following Reguations shall come into effect as and from the 15th day of June instant.

of the Colonial Secretary,

1. The port and harbor of St. John's shall be closed entirely to the entry of shipping at night from nightfall on the 15th June instant until further

2. The Light at Cape Spear will be reduced in visibility, and the Light at Fort Amherst and the Leading Lights of St. John's will be extinguished. Measures shall be taken so that he glare or upward reflection from treet or other outdoor lights in the city of St. John's shall be reduced to wenty-five per cent. of the normal. This Regulation will also apply to Bell sland, Conception Bay.

4. No Light shall be lit in any pub-c building, shop, or private resi-ence in the City of St. John's except ne windows in such public building, shop or residence, are covered by suitable blinds or shades, so that the glare or reflection upon the heavens is reduced to twenty-five per cent. of

5. No Lights shall be lit upon any vessel or boat in the Harbor of John's unless suitably obscured.

6. Head Lights used on any mo cars or motor cycles in or near the City of St. John's, or in or near any settlement in the Districts of St. John's East or West, or on any road approaching St. John's or any of the said settlements, upon which lights may be visible at sea, shall be so obscured that the glare or upward re-flection upon the heavens shall be reduced to twenty-five per cent. of the normal. Side lights on motor cars, motor cycles, or vehicles of any description must be obscured, and hall not be of greater strength than

7. It will be the duty of the men ers of the Constabulary to see that these Regulations are strictly forced, and all orders isued by

8. It shall be the duty of the Min-ter of Marine and Fisheries to see that these Regulations are observed on all shipping in the Harbor of St. John's, and all orders by him for their better observance shall be forth-with carried out. KNOKKE KERKERIKE KERKERIKANON

9. Every person convicted of a vio-lation of these Rules and Regulations before a Stipendiary Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$100, or in default of payment, to imprison-


