**Newfoundland's Scotch-Cured Herring.**

In spite of the increasing demand for Newfoundland Scotch-cured herring and the practical certainty that there will be no further supplies of foreign herring of any description during the coming season, prices remain at the quotations of a month ago when there was no demand, and even now operators are making concessions to buyers. This condition of affairs may be considered as perhaps the most perplexing in the history of this cure of fish in this market. Other grades have shown substantial advances, some of them within the past few weeks, yet there is practically no change in the Newfoundland herring situation except that there is more business being done. There is considerable speculation in New York as to what the condition will be a month hence, especially if there is positive assurance that no foreign herring will be exported to the United States this year or until the close of the war. The market is without question ready to absorb quantities of this cure during the summer months and it will probably make little difference whether the prices remain at the low level of to-day or go, the normal consumption will not be reduced. And should there be no supply of herring from abroad and only a limited supply from Maine and Alaska, it will take but a few weeks to absorb all the Newfoundland herring in this market. Indeed, jobbers have looked ahead to this situation and have placed large stocks in cold storage to await higher prices and the full demand. The entire supply in all hands in New York is now about 12,000 packages, much of it in second hands. The two largest holders probably have not more than 6,000 packages together, and the remainder is divided amongst perhaps a dozen. New supplies arrived on a steamer from St. John's on Thursday, and it is reported that offerings were made as low as \$14 and \$15 for small fish. This lot, consisting of about 1,000 barrels, was the only shipment of herring for New York factors. The routine business of the week has been largely local, although some large orders have been filled. The prices have been on the basis of \$14 and \$16 for large fulls, according to size and quality; \$12.50 and \$14.50 for selected fulls; \$13 and \$14 for

mediums. There has been little spring pack or carryover goods sold during the past few weeks. Norwegian cure continues to sell at from \$8 to \$10.—Fishing Gazette.

**Flower Day for French Red Cross.**

Sir W. H. Horwood presided at a meeting of the Imperial Red Cross Fund Committee held yesterday afternoon at Government House, the following being present:—Lady Davidson, Mrs. G. H. Emerson, Mrs. W. G. Gosling, Mrs. John Harvey, Hon. P. T. McGrath and Mr. F. H. Steer, Hon. Sec. Treasurer.

The total receipts of the Empire Red Cross collection amounted to \$40,000 with more to come in. Tag Day alone accounted for \$3,001.47 a record figure for such an occasion.

Already £5,000 had been cabled to the British Red Cross Fund and it was agreed yesterday that £3,000 more be at once cabled. The ladies of the Women's Patriotic Association have generously borne all the expenses themselves. A vote of thanks was passed to all of them, especially those who braved the adverse weather on Tag Day in the effort to collect such a handsome sum.

It was agreed that on or about July 14th, which is the Fete Nationale, or the birthday of the French Republic, a Flower Day be held in aid of the French Red Cross. The W.P.A. will also undertake the management of the whole affair, and at night will hold a Grand Concert in Bannerman Park. A small entrance fee will be charged, the whole to be given to the same deserving object.

Marshall, Belmont Avenue, following the ceremony, and later Mr. and Mrs. Dickie left on their wedding tour, the bride travelling in a costume of grey Shantung silk and hat to match. Upon their return from their trip they will reside in Toronto until such time as the groom leaves for overseas.—Daily Mail, June 6th.

R. Skeans, Secretary Plumbers' Union, wanted to know how many years completed apprenticeship at this trade, and if the Council intended to give the Union representation on the City Plumbing Board. The Council are of the opinion that there are enough experts attached to the City Board. The City Board will report on the former as soon as possible.

Steer Brothers were given permission to put windows in office building. The Engineer reported the opening of 300 ft for water main on South Side during the week and 150 feet of pipe laid.

Impounder Duffett asked for a field glass which he considered would be of great assistance to him in carrying out his duty. In the minds of some of the Councilors the suggestion was not favourably received, as they thought the impounder would be wasting too much time scanning the neighboring hills in the vicinity of Battery Road where the domestic goat reigns supreme. One of the Councilors suggested a course of training in an aridrome, and ultimately purchasing a plane for this particular service. The impounder will have to continue to trust to his bone-rimmed spectacles. The meeting adjourned at 10 p.m.

I've made a discovery. At least it seemed like one to me. The other day I was sitting in the dentist's chair. A weighty decision hung in the balance—whether a tooth should be pulled or kept another year. Now I have never in my life had a tooth pulled. And at the idea that which I had often heard other people dread, with that mild sympathy we always feel for other people's troubles, might actually be about to happen to me in the next few minutes, I was simply appalled. It seemed inconceivable. When my mother was a little girl and had been naughty and her father got the switch, she used to say incredulously, "What you're not going to whip me, not me!" And that was the way I felt about the tooth.

And The Tooth Stayed In. In the meantime the court having pried into the private affairs of my tooth, came to a decision. I needn't have it out. A wave of relief went over me. I felt perfectly happy. To be sure, I should have to have that tooth out next year. And doubtless before my death I should have to have many more teeth out. But it didn't bother me one mite. In fact so far as my feelings were concerned, that person who was to have her tooth out next year was quite another person.

The Reason We Don't Expect To Die. And that's the discovery. I've often wondered why we feel so calm about death and bereavement and the various ills that by the laws of human existence simply must come to

us. That is why. Because the "you" or "I" of the future is always another person to us. Likewise the "you" of the past. Go back to the old school or college grounds twenty or thirty years after you have graduated and find how impossible it is to feel that you ever really went to school there. You remember that boy or girl with much the same sense of detachment with which you remember your old playmates. He Lived The Child He Used To Be. As I write there comes to me a far more beautiful expression of this same thought. Do you remember it in Charles Lamb's essay, "New Year's Eve." Let me find it for you. "If I know myself," he writes, "I know I can have less respect for his present identity than I have for the man Elia. For the child Elia, that 'other me' there in the background, I find it hard to cherish the remembrance of that young master with his little reference to his stupid changeling of five and forty as if it had been a child of some other house and not of any parents."

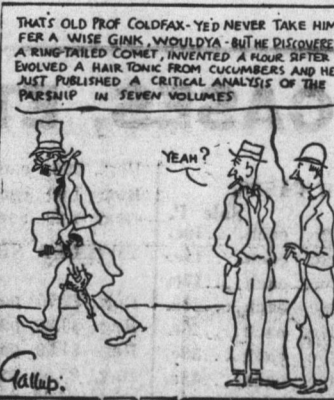

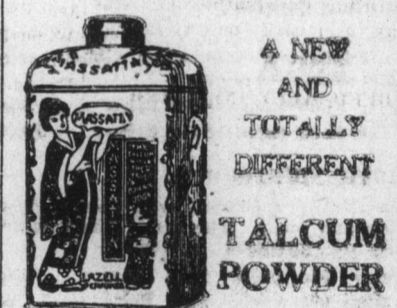
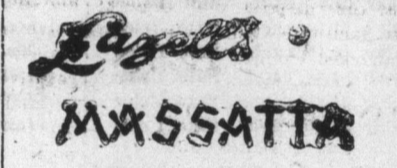

**War News.**

**Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.**

**BRITISH CAPTURE POSITIONS.**

LONDON, June 14. The report from the British headquarters in France issued to-night reads: We carried out a successful raid this morning on the Arras battle front east of Monchy-Le-Preux. Hostile positions of considerable importance on the high ground known as Infantry Hill, the possession of which has been stubbornly contested by the enemy on a number of occasions, were stormed by our troops on a front of over three-quarters of a mile. The whole of our objectives were gained. We captured 175 prisoners, including three officers and two machine guns. In air fighting yesterday one German airplane was brought down and three others were driven down out of control. None of ours are missing.

**GERMANS ABANDON CERTAIN SECTIONS.**

LONDON, June 14. Important sections of their front between the Lys River and St. Yves, have been abandoned by the Germans. It is announced officially. The British troops followed the retreating Germans closely, and made considerable progress east of Ploegstreet wood. The statement follows: Our further advance east of Messines combined with the pressure of our troops south of the front of our attack, has compelled the enemy to abandon important sections of his first line defensive system in the area between the River Lys and St. Yves. Our troops have followed up the enemy closely and have made considerable progress east of Ploegstreet wood. We also gained ground during the night in the neighborhood of Gaspard. We raided enemy trenches last night north of Bullecourt and south of Hooge, and captured a few prisoners in each case.

**FORT SALIFFE CAPTURED.**

LONDON, June 14. Fort Saliffe, on the east shore of the Red Sea has been captured by British warships. It was officially announced this evening. The announcement says the Commander-in-Chief of the East Indies reports that on Thursday morning His Majesty's ships under his command captured Fort Saliffe, after three hours' resistance. The Fort is situated on the eastern shore of the Red Sea, 180 miles north of Perin and between Leheya and Hodelda. Ninety-four

prisoners, three machine guns, two mounted guns, military stores, camels and harbor plant were captured. One British seaman was killed. Fort Saliffe is in Kamarin Bay, Yemen Province, Southwestern Arabia, and large rock salt works are located there. The captured fort lies about 175 miles north of the Gulf of Aden. The force of Turks north of Aden has been long in the way of the British in the attempts they have made to advance from that city. The purpose of the seizure of Fort Saliffe may be the facilitation of a movement to work behind this force and capture or disperse it.

**SUCCESSFUL ATTACK.**

LONDON, June 14. The Messines offensive was the most successful attack which the British have yet made. Every single objective that was marked in the preliminary plans have been attained, said Major General Maurice in his weekly talk with the Associated Press. Comparing this assault with the Somme battle, General Maurice said that the British gained on the first day more than twice the ground captured in the first four days of the great conflict along the Somme, while the British casualties at Messines during the same periods for comparison were only one-fourth of what they were in the Somme fighting. General Maurice was most optimistic in his talk to-day, remarking that British successes were steadily growing greater. He added, we still have the undeveloped resources of America behind us which gives complete confidence in the future. Discussing the British method of attack General Maurice said, the impression had gone about that the success of this assault was due to the great mine explosions but that was a false idea. "Our real success was due to the arrangement of our artillery fire and the superiority of our artillery over the enemy's. This artillery superiority in turn was due mainly to our superiority in air service which directs the artillery. The million pounds of explosives set off certainly was an aid to the attack since it caused a panic among the Germans and permitted our men to get through more easily. But our mines were under the German front line trenches which were not held strongly, so I believe the explosions caused only a small proportion of the casualties which the Germans suffered. Our success in attaining everything we set out to get in this battle is more striking because the Germans knew the attack was coming. I have just secured some German orders which were captured from prisoners. These show the enemy was conversant with what was going on. One order, dated May 3, gives the approximate time of the British attack, stating that it would take place between June 3 and 9. Another order stated that the Messines-Wytschaete ridge

would be the objective, and it pointed out to the German troops holding this section that this position was important and must not be given up. A further order said the British aviators were becoming increasingly daring and declared the British practice of swooping down low over the German trenches must be stopped by machine gunners. The destruction caused by our artillery in this attack was terrific. I have toured the section since the attack and found every machine gun emplacement smashed. This means very heavy German casualties."

**ENTENTE FORCES LANDING AT ATHENS.**

ATHENS, June 14. The Entente forces are now landing at the Pireaus and Castella. Some of the troops are occupying the height near Phaleron Bay while others are marching to Athens.

**LANDING IN PERFECT ORDER.**

LONDON, June 14. The landing of Entente troops in the Pireaus was effected in perfect order. At the suggestion of Premier Zaimis, a Greek superior officer was placed, at the disposal of General Sarraill to facilitate the housing of the disembarked troops.

**CONSTANTINE LEFT ATHENS.**

ATHENS, June 14. Former King Constantine left Athens to-day to embark on a British warship.

**NOT OFFICIALLY INFORMED.**

LONDON, June 14. Lord Robert Cecil, Minister of Blockade, said in the Commons to-day the American note to China had not been officially communicated to Britain.

**KURDS REPULSED.**

PETROGRAD, June 14. Attacks by large parties of Kurds on the Caucasian front were repulsed by the Russians, the war office announces. Elsewhere engagements among reconnoitering parties were reported.

**AMNESTY FOR IRISH PRISONERS.**

LONDON, June 14. The British Government is considering the granting of amnesty to Irish prisoners arrested at the time of the rebellion last year. Chancellor Bonar Law made this announcement in the House to-day, saying the Government's decision will be known immediately.

**PRESS CONGRESS.**

TORONTO, June 14. Delegates to the number of 175 are attending the Canadian Press Association's meeting here to-day. Pre-

sident Elliott, of Kingston, in his address said he expected journalism to advance with the nation after the war. Much of the bitterness of party strife would disappear, newer lines of social service would be followed, and bigotries, one-sidedness, selfishness be less apparent. Amalgamations rather than more newspapers might be expected.

**CHINA AND THE U. S.**

TOKIO, Tuesday. (Delayed in transmission.)—The question of China as it exists between the United States and Japan has been brought sharply to the surface by the note of the American Government to China expressing regret over the dissension in that country and the desire that tranquility and political co-ordination be established. Regarding the future of China as interwoven intimately with her own Japan has long observed a fundamental policy, the goal of which is to procure recognition by the Powers of a special and paramount position for Japan in China. The impression prevails in Tokio that Britain and France since the outbreak of the war have tacitly extended a measure of recognition of the special privileges of Japan and the present issue appears to involve the question as to whether the United States will abandon her prerogative of independent action in China and henceforth consult Japan. The following statement of Japan's position was furnished the Associated Press by well-informed quarters: When Japan and the Allies were about to urge Yuan Shi Kai (the late President of China) to postpone the restoration of the monarchy, the United States was consulted beforehand and invited to participate. "The United States replied that it favored a republic but could not interfere with the internal affairs of China. The recent American note, which is virtually an interference was sent without consulting Japan and caused surprise. It was not until afterwards we were notified and invited to participate. We are making efforts to assure the people the States had no intention of slighting the Japanese, but they are externally sensitive to anything touching China which they deem a supremely vital question to Japan's future. The Foreign Office declines to discuss what action will be adopted toward America.

**The Messiah.**

In this third year of the Great War we were given an opportunity of hearing again Handel's Messiah, at the Methodist College Hall last night. This wonderful Oratorio interprets, as no other music does, the Incarnation, the Passion, the Triumph of the Lamb of God, and Mr. Allen has done a great thing for us in giving us, in these anxious days, such an interpretation, to cheer us, and to hearten. The conductor must have felt, last night, that his labor was well rewarded. The large audience, appreciative to a unit—enthusiasm one hardly looks for amid so much sorrow—enjoyed the work in a deep sense which would have been scarcely possible before the war. The music and the words which it clothed are now to them more than ever sacred.

**Household Notes.**

Miss Curtis's singing was uniformly clear and her voice rich and full. The wonderful "He was despised" perhaps showed the work at its best, but other parts, the air "He shall feed His flock" were lovely. Miss Strang's sweetness was best shown in "Rejoice greatly" one thought, but she found her greatest lyric inspiration in "Come unto Him"; and in "I know that my Redeemer liveth" one got at least a glimpse of those lofty mountain altitudes to which—  
"The glaciers spare  
The soul of their white snows"  
Where  
"You hear the bells"  
of the high-pasturing kine,"  
and where "far in the depth profound" you may see "the morning break," which that passage always suggests. Mr. Trapnell gave the passage beginning "Thy rebukes" on through "Behold!" and "He was cut off" in a manner worthy of him, and the chorus "Lift up your heads" gave the final touch of glory to the whole. Mr. King's work was excellent throughout, but one thought "The

Trumpet shall sound" was the highest he reached.  
The choruses were almost all very fine, and the climax "Worthy is the Lamb" with its solid depth and volume of sound, and greatest and grandest of all "The Hallelujah Chorus" brought us to the end delighted and in a devotional frame of mind.  
The orchestra showed what it is possible to do with a comparatively small number of instruments.  
It would be possible to find faults; but on the whole one would assert that the rendition of this sublime work was "almost adequate," and this is the highest praise.  
St. John's owes a great debt to Mr. Allen for making it possible for us to hear The Messiah, and this his farewell work will not soon be forgotten.—Com.

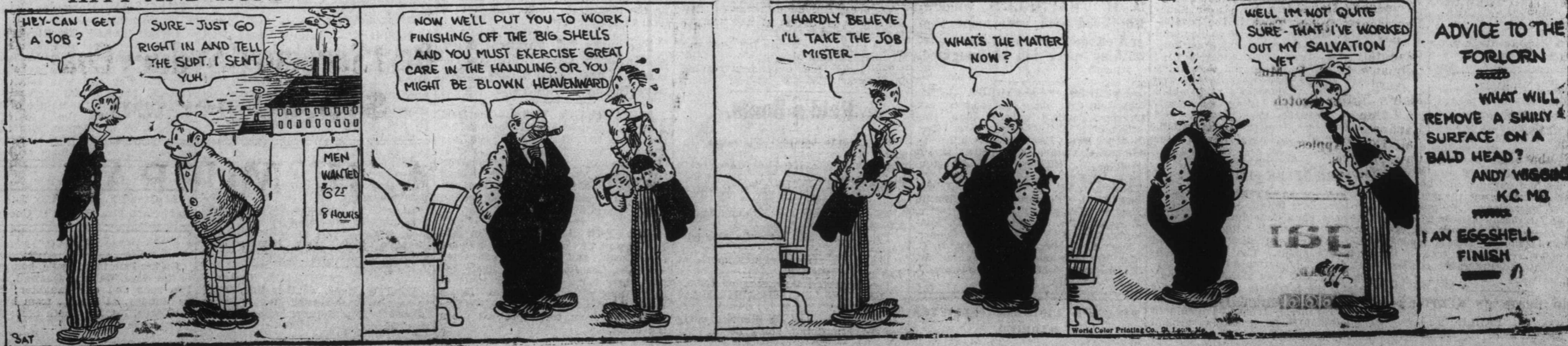

TO-DAY'S Messages. 10.00 A.M.

WINNIPEG, To-day. The Canadian Manufacturers' Association closed its Convention here to-day with passing a resolution approving Conscription and calling for the abolition of the political patronage system.

WILSON EXPLAINS THE POSITION

WASHINGTON, To-day. America's reasons for sending her flag against the fire of the enemy across the sea and the purpose she seeks were stated anew by President Wilson to-day in a flag-day address beneath the Washington monument. Germany's military masters denied the United States the right to be neutral, the President said, and by extraordinary insults and aggression, "left us no self-respecting choice but take up arms in defence of our rights as a free people and of our honor as a sovereign government." He recalled how the Imperial Government had forbidden Americans the use of the high seas time and again and executed its threat to send them to their death; how it fulfilled this unscrupulous country with spies and conspirators and sought by violence to destroy industries and arrest commerce. Finally how the Berlin Foreign Office tried to incite Mexico and Japan into a hostile alliance. "What great nation, he asked, in such circumstances would not have taken up arms? Now that America has been forced to war, declared the President, "she bids her young men go forth to fight on a field of blood far away for the same old familiar heroic purpose for which it has seen its men die on every battlefield upon which Americans have borne arms since the revolution of democracy. The sinister power, he said, which has the German people themselves in its grip, now at last has stretched forth its ugly talons and drawn blood from us. "The whole world is at war," he added, "because the whole world is in the grip of that power and is trying out a great battle which shall determine whether it is to be brought under its mastery or fling itself free." In giving warning that the Germans actually have carried into execution their plan to throw a broad belt of military power across the centre of Europe into the heart of Asia, rejecting the idea of the solidarity of races and peoples, Wilson spoke of the "new intrigue for peace now appearing in many guises at the behest of the Berlin Government." "It cannot go further; it dare not go back," he said, "it wishes to close its bargain before it is too late and it has little left to offer for the pound of flesh it will demand."

2.00 P. M. CREEPING FORWARD. BRITISH HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, To-day.

There is nothing like a general advance on any front, but we proceed silently to occupy bits of ground and stretches of trenches which have been evacuated by the enemy. By this creeping we now hold a line of posts over 2,000 yards in advance of the line which we pushed east of Messines. The German story of British cavalry charges in this region are untrue like all other German utterances on the subject of the battle. Cavalry has not engaged and has not attempted to take even the smallest part in the operations. Mounted patrols of half a dozen men or so have in a few cases been usefully employed, but while the German statement that very few returned is true, it is only true because the same number returned as went.

HARD DRAIN ON KULTUR. BERLIN, To-day.

Of 72,000 students registered during the past winter in German Universities and Technical Schools, 65,000 are under arms, according to an estimate by the Tagblatt.

S.S. Njord Destroyed by Fire.

Spontaneous Combustion the Alleged Cause. The shipwrecked crew of the S.S. Njord, lost off St. Pierre Island, Sunday night last, have arrived in the city. Capt. Turner, master of the ship, caught fire, the origin of which he cannot account for, and had to be abandoned. The Njord left North Sydney at 2 a.m. on Saturday, the 9th instant, for St. John's with 450 tons of coal. At 6.30 the following morning Second Engineer Martin, who was on watch, reported smoke in the engine room. As the Captain came hurriedly to the deck, tongues of flame broke out through the ship, forward and aft. Two life boats were quickly launched and, with the exception of the Captain, boatswain and Cook, who followed a few minutes after in a dory, boarded by engineers, firemen and sailors, rowed to the E. B. Walters, a Lunenburg schooner, which was fishing a short distance from the smitten steamer. The latter was then ablaze and sank soon after. That was 40 miles E. by N. of St. Pierre. The rescue vessel brought the shipwrecked men to St. Pierre, Capt. Turner and crew allege that the treatment usually accorded distressed seamen was by a result of ignorance of the men on board the Lunenburg vessel. In fact they were refused water to wash themselves and the captain's 12-year-old son was refused a berth to sleep in. Capt. Turner and crew lost everything except what they stood in. At St. Pierre they were extended hospitality by the British Consul. There is a strong theory that spontaneous combustion caused by wet coal amongst the ship's cargo was responsible for the fire.

Dominion Iron and Steel Co. Give Workmen Increase of Wages.

Work is easily to be got with the Dominion Iron and Steel Co., which is actively busy in all branches of its operations, and very high wages are being paid to its workmen. At the lime quarries, Port au Port, increases of ten per cent. and more have been granted, and men are earning an average of from \$3 to \$4 a day, in addition to a bonus of ten cents a ton on extra time. A general strike has been opened there for the benefit of employees, where they can get supplies at lowest cost. Men are also needed at Sydney and Marble Mountain, where much work is going on. Besides high wages, the men are given free shacks and coal.



Under the provisions of the War Measures Act, 1914, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to order that the following Regulations shall come into effect, as and from the 15th day of June instant.

June 11th, 1917.

- The port and harbor of St. John's shall be closed entirely to the entry of shipping at night from midnight on the 15th June instant until further orders.
- The Light at Cape Spear will be reduced in visibility, and the Light at Port Amherst and the Leading Lights of St. John's will be extinguished.
- Measures shall be taken so that the glare or upward reflection from street or other outdoor lights in the City of St. John's shall be reduced to twenty-five per cent. of the normal. This Regulation will also apply to Bell Island, Conception Bay.
- No Light shall be lit in any public building, shop, or private residence in the City of St. John's except the windows in such public building, shop or residence, are covered by suitable blinds or shades, so that the glare or reflection upon the heavens is reduced to twenty-five per cent. of the normal.
- No Lights shall be lit upon any vessel or boat in the Harbor of St. John's unless suitably obscured.
- Head Lights used on any motor cars or motor cycles in or near the City of St. John's, or in or near any settlement in the Districts of St. John's East or West, or on any road approaching St. John's or any of the said settlements, upon which lights may be visible at sea, shall be so obscured that the glare or upward reflection upon the heavens shall be reduced to twenty-five per cent. of the normal. Side lights on motor cars, motor cycles, or vehicles of any description must be obscured, and shall not be of greater strength than five candle power.
- It will be the duty of the members of the Constabulary to see that these Regulations are strictly enforced, and all orders issued by them for their better observance shall be forthwith carried out.
- It shall be the duty of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to see that these Regulations are observed on all shipping in the Harbor of St. John's, and all orders issued by him for their better observance shall be forthwith carried out.
- Every person convicted of a violation of these Rules and Regulations before a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$100, or in default of payment, to imprisonment not exceeding Three Months.
