The rainbow is formed by sunlight passing into raindrops or vapor in such a way as to divide the sunlight into the different colored rays of light. When the rainbow is formed none of the rays are absorbed by raindrops or vapor through which the suplight passes. Some of these rays of light are known as short rays and others long rays. But when sunlight meets other things, besides those which make a pure rainbow, these other objects have the ability to absorb some of the rays of colored light, and they throw off the remainder. When these rays have been thrown off those which have been absorbed make many different combinations, and thus are produced all of the different colors we know, the various tints and shades of color, according to composition and size. Exiled Hapsburg Freed by War.

There is only one member of Imperial House of Austria, of the once mighty House of Hapsburg, to whom the war brings release from exile, all the rest being now refugees, seventeen years ago was Archduke Leopold Ferdinand of Austria, Grand Duke of Tuscany, Prince of Hungary and Bohemia, and Knight of the pro Order of the Golden Fleece, and bro al escapades and experiences brought her world-wide notice in 1902. Both were benished from the land of their birth and adoption, the Archduke chiefly because of his determination to live his own life, untrammelled by to live his own life, untrammelled by court conventions. 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
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
