



But let us forget them and let us make for the old Southside Hill, now carpeted with the green and red of the partridge berry, or out to Topsail, or up to Manuels River, or let us make for the old "Cow Path" leading to beautiful Holyrood (and along the said "Cow Path" the whorts never grew thicker than they do this year) and let us "boil the kettle", and I bet you it will be a good "cup of tea", unless your grocer has done you dirty altogether. For the secret of it is, you steep the tea as soon as the kettle boils, and any old tea will taste pretty good, I'll bet you.

But it is just as well to take the best tea with you. it doesn't cost much more. The last time we were out we had a splendid tea and it only cost us 65c. lb. HEROIC LIFEBOATMEN SAVE CREW OF "RALEIGH."

Germany Must Pay for Devastating France -- Legal Lights to Shine Next Winter .--Wage Negotiations Will Open at Sydney

LONDON, Aug. 21. Thrilling tales are told by surviors of H.M.S. Raleigh, who arrived at Liverpool on Saturday. The light cruiser went ashore at Heath Point, fog, and the crew were only saved to see across the deck, and the Raleigh was slowed down to eight knots to avoid icebergs. She veered to the starboard and struck the rocks immediately. Discipline was well maintained and the crew mustered to their boats, but it seemswirling water alongside. The ship was fast settling and canvas rafts were launched. It was absolutely necessary to establish connection with the shore and volunteers were called for. Lieut. Hopper and a number of blue jackets responded and managed to get in a lifeboat. 

Several experienced woodsmen were engaged to organize the cutting, and see that it was not done indiscriminately, and that full freedom was provided for reforestation. Rough roads were made from the woods to the banks of the bay to enable the cut timber to be transported to the loading places with a minimum expenditure of time and labor. A store was opened in an old building, at one time the property of the whaling company which conducted its operations from Hawke Bay, and this was fully stock ed with all the requirements of the woodsmen, and this, so quickly, that supplies were issued to the first men who arrived in time to enable them to set to work without delay. Only such building as was urgently need ed has been done up to the present but the company proposes, in the near, future, to erect more suitable quarters, as land areas are augmouted, so that within a few years, prosperous township will have sprung

up on the banks of Hawke Bay.

Every care is taken for the welfare of the men, who are all made as comfortable as possible, and given such supplies as they need to enable them to live well. There is a first aid tent, fully equipped, and superintended by experienced and qualified men, and such slight accidents as inevitably occur in all logging camps are attended to so efficiently that those who require treatment are well enough to return to work in a short time. Any complaints that the men may have to make, and this happens very rarely, are fully enquired into and remedied, if necessary. The rate of pay is such that all men, whether on wages or piece work, if they work even moderately, are able to live quite well, and have sufficient left to send home towards the upkeep of

their families. SOLVING UNEMPLOYMENT.

The opening of the Hawke Bay industry comes at a time when it is urgently needed. The West Coast fishery has, this year, been a complete failure, and were it not for the fact that nearly every man capable of working, has found employment at Hawke Bay, such destitution as had never before been known in any section of the country, would have prevailed, and the government would have ben compelled to either find some unnecessary relief work, which men, and for the first three months, point of view of the number of men employed, and it only requires furthvelop to a much larger extent.





land is in Canada in connection with the dispute between Canada and Newfoundland with regard to the line dividing Lahrador and Ungava. Sir Patrick is engaged in making certain investigations for the ancient colony in connection with the dispute and will later go to London to continue his inquiries, says a Canadian dispatch from Ottawa. Sir Patrick understands from an

nouncement made at Quebec that the case will not come before Privy Council for a year.

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
