



Workmen Hoist Selves on Aerial Scaffold

To replace the cumbersome and sometimes hazardous scaffolding, and Mary Coughlan, aged 5 weeks. tackle blocks, and rigging ropes used in construction work, a French manufacturing concern has perfected a device known as a "skyscraper"—a small platform on which a workman can hoist himself to any height required by his particular job.



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
