TARDY JUSTICE.-The Ottawa Free Press says :- In 1844, while Welland and St. Lawrence Canals were in course of construction, there was employed on the works an inman named Nathaniel Taggart, who had an idea that he could improve upon the system upon which the lock gates were proposed to be constructed. Mercie Conduct.

On Sunday the 31st May, as the steam er Dakota was passing through Goose Rapids on her way to Winnipeg, a little girl, daughter of Mr. George White of Rapids on her way to Winnipeg, a little girl, daughter of Mr. George White of this city, on route to this place with her family, fell from the aft part of the cabin deck into the river. On the hurricane deck were some eight or nine prisoners in irons going to stand their trial at the C. S. Dast. Court at Pembina. One of these named George Belthymer on sceing the child fall, sprang overboard, hundenfied as he was, and succeeded in reaching the stinggling schild and sustaining it against fearint odds, more than once the secthing waters closing overboth man and child. The ongines were promptly stopped, a bost lowered and succeeded in saving both of them. The scene on board wat enough to unnerve the stoutest heart, both the mother of the child and the wice of the prisoner being on board; and the providential saving of the noble rescuer and the child called forth feelings which moistened many an eye on beard. The irons that bound the prisoners wrists were immediately removed by order of the U. S. Marenal, and a change of clothing provided for him, subsequently a purse of over \$60, taken up by Mr. G. Dougal, of Collingwood, Ontario, was presented to him, accompanied by a testimonial signed by upwards of eighty of the officers and passengers on board, expressing their admiration at his heroic condact in rescuing the child from certain death at the imminent risk of his own life. There existed but one feeling on board, and that was that his noble conduct fully condones for the offence for which he is to stand his trial, and as his action was witnessed by both judge and jury, who happened to be passengers on the boat, we have every reason to hope that the scene they witnessed on Sunday may recur to their minds and that whilst doing their daty to their country's laws, they will take into consideration the noble nature that must exist in the heart of that man who was prepared to sacrifice his life for his fellow-creatures. of that man who was prepared to sacritice his life for his fellow-creatures.

The practice of purchasing church livings in Great Britam has been made the subject of sermons from the platform, as well as of very voluminous newspaper correspondence. A Welsh clergyman, in noticing the matter from his pulpit recently, said that 6,600 parishes in England were thus made a subject of bargain and sale, and he added: "You see how it is that parishes are saddled with incumbents who are theroughly unfit for their office. A boy rector, for instance, or a weak-headed one, comes down from Oxford to fill the incumbency of a large and populous parish. He introduces all sorts of gim-crackeries, genuflects to the altar, bows to the host, turns meense, lights candles, prays to the Virgin, kisses the crucifix, and drives the old parishouers perfectly wild with his mad Romish tricks. Yet there is not a soul among them that can prevent him. The nominee of so ne great mar, he is perfectly safe in his cure. It has been bought and paid for. Every soul there is his by law established to cure and bless in the way he thinks most fit. "There is nothing really to prevent a joint stock company of High Churchmen, Low Churchmen, board Churchmen and even Jews, from buying the advowsons and noxt pretentions at more than half of all the livings in England and Wales, and so in one day take steps to secure to themselvas and their own views 6,600 prieshes. Looked at in a spiritual point of view, the thing's frightful, abominable, and ridiculous."

DIRECT ACTION STEAM PUMPING ENGINE.—A machine for pumping large quantities of water is exciting considerable attention in Hamilton, where the inventor resides. The power produced is by the direct action of the steam without the aid of the engine—the pump, in fact, being a simplified engine itself, having two chambers into which the water is drawn from below, by vacuum caused by the condension of steam in each alternately, and discharged also alternately by the force of the entering steam. The water ichambers being emptied alternately a constant discharge of steam is kept up while steam is on. By a little valev in an air chamber at the rear of the pump a certain quantity of air is let in at the moment of each discharge, which in coming in contact with the steam and water produces a sort of explosion which adds great effect to the discharge. With only about 30 pounds of steam on and a steam pipe of 3-8 in. diame'er on the inside, the pump throws out 50 discharges or 203 gallons a minute; and one pound of steam raises a 2½ inch volume of water two feet high with the same pumpi. Unfair Equalization.

(From the Elora Express,)
Just now the people of Centre Welling
ton are deeply interested in the equalization of the assessment of he municipalities grouped for the payment of a bonus to the Credit Valley Railway, as the amount to be paid yearly by each municipality will be upon its equalized assessed value. A reference to the table of equalized assessment for 1874 will show how the share of taxation to be borne by the various municipalities in the group is likely to be levied; take the Town of Orangeville and the Villages of Fergus and Elora as a sample of the unfairness of local assessors and the uselessness of equalization as now carried out. Orangeville Town has a population not less than 2,500—Elora and Fergus Villages have each a population of about 1.600; Orangeville is next to Guelph in Wellington in wealth, enterprise, population, acreage, and growth. Yet its assessor modestly puts down its personal property, and assessable income at 83,750, while Elora stands at 48,025 dols, and Fergus at 57,200 dols, and unpretunding little Arthur estimates its income at 19,500. In real estate Orangeville 1915,600 dols, Elora at 279,360, and Fergus at 310,815. The totals of real and personal stand for Orangeville 192,760 dols; Elora 327,885 dols; and Fergus 369,915 dols. Taking 60 per cont. of the amounts returned upon the rolls, in accordance with section -22 of the new Assessment Law, the revised amount of the Beal and Personal of Orangeville stood at 118,955 dols, and 221,427 dols.
