

A KICK FROM LETHBRIDGE

Says Calgary Loads Undesirables on Southern City

SO LETHBRIDGE HANDS THEM BACK TO CALGARY

Macloed Also Seems to Have Unusual Methods

Lethbridge News: Lulu Crosby the prepossessing vagrant who resides in luxury for a few days at the Hotel Dallas, and then changes her boarding place to the police station, has at last left the city, and under the care of Mrs. Alexander Thompson, police matron, and V. M. Callow, sergeant in the Royal Northwest Mounted Police is speeding on her way to Calgary. Calgary will be pleased to see her again, and it is said that at the jail there they treasured her locks, which she left behind her when she separated from keep-sakes. Miss Crosby will be united again with her friend, Miss Annie Morrison, who lately was a candidate for residence in Lethbridge at the kindly instance of Macloed. Lethbridge, not being selfish, would not keep Miss Morrison, but insisted on returning her to parental Calgary.

Calgary, Medicine Hat and Macloed, according to Harry Percy, the Lethbridge police chief, have lately acquired the pleasant habit of ticketing their undesirables to Lethbridge. Chief Percy thinks it is getting a trifle monotonous and has decided to make a public protest. He says:

Chief Percy's Protest.

"I would like to draw public attention to what is becoming nothing less than a scandal, the action of such towns as Calgary, Macloed and Medicine Hat in using the city of Lethbridge as a dumping ground. It is bad enough to send all a town's prisoners here, as does Medicine Hat, but when it comes to ticketing undesirables here, matters have passed the bearable stage, and the time is over for exercising charity in passing judgment on the facts.

"Regarding these last two women vagrants, Annie Morrison arrived here last Thursday, and registered at the Windsor. Her character was quickly discovered, and on Saturday she was shipped to Calgary jail. She informed me that when she turned up in Macloed, and was brought before the magistrate, she was given the option of coming to Lethbridge, at her own expense, or being committed to jail for thirty days. She had a little money, and came to Lethbridge.

Bought Her Ticket

"In Lulu Crosby's case, if the young lady is to be believed the town authorities actually purchased her a ticket, for this destination. She never lived here, and could have no claim on Lethbridge. Both these girls were in jail in Calgary, where their hair was clipped, and when they got out, they were generously unaccompanied to the south of the province. Magistrate Humm- phries and Major Belcher, inspector of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, wired from here to Hon. C. W. Cross attorney-general, at Edmonton, on Monday, asking where Alberta's female prison was located, and yesterday the answer came that it was at Calgary. Accordingly Calgary is receiving Miss Crosby back.

Hat Sentences Them Here

"Medicine Hat also has a fetching way of handling its undesirables. There are sentenced on the long enough to make an excuse for sending them to the barracks here, although Medicine Hat has a jail of its own. Naturally when their time is up, they are turned loose on the streets of Lethbridge. Major Belcher informs me that there are at present seventeen prisoners in the cells at the barracks, while the accommodation was only made for six."

THREE YEARS FOR ATTEMPTED ARSON

Man Captured in Act of Throwing Lighted Roll in C.P.R. Car

Quebec, Jan. 15.—Yesterday evening detective Johnston, of the Canadian detective bureau Montreal arrested John Baptiste Lemay in the act of throwing a lighter roll of paper into a Canadian Pacific freight car at the Palais station. Lemay was brought before the Magistrate today and sentenced to three years imprisonment.

A FEW FAITHFUL IN ALL FRANCE

Eighty Prelates Send Assurance of Their Loyalty.

Paris, Jan. 15.—The first act of the French Episcopal comprising eighty distinguished prelates was today to send a telegram to the Pope, assuring him of the fidelity and obedience of the French church. Four commissioners were elected to further the work of the body.

NEW CATHOLIC CHURCH IN FRANCE

Effort Being Made to have Church With Ritual but Outside of Control of Pope

Paris, Jan. 15.—An attempt will be made to start a national French Catholic church, Arch-Bishop Viateur, of Texas, has agreed to ordain clergy, and Bishops, who will be elected by Paris honors. The Latin dogma and ritual will be retained but the authority and infallibility of the Pope denied. Interest attaches to the question whether the French government will support the movement.

THE POWER PROPOSITION

After careful consideration, the
Albertan is unable to give its sup-
port to the proposition made by
Messrs. Budd and Alexander for sup-
plying electric current to this city,

to which is added a street railway
franchise. The offer that these gen-
tlemen make is somewhat tempting,
but the proposition is forsaking the
principles which this city has already
adopted.

Whatever may be said about the
proposition, it is an invitation to us
to abandon our municipal owned and
municipal controlled electric plant.

Of course we are told that the pro-
position is not asking us to depart
from the principle of municipal
ownership, but it does so. It is an
invitation to abandon to a private cor-
poration the supplying of electricity
to the city.

On the very night that this com-
pany came to the city asking it to
part with this franchise, a resolution
came in from the most conservative
board in this city asking that the
city take some action to relieve the
citizens of the inefficient service of
another monopoly which has the up-
per hand in this city.

But it is doubtful if these gen-
tlemen can generate power for a figure
less than it is being generated by the
city. That is another proposition. It
keeps it up the year round and
gives as satisfactory service as
at the present time. The city
made a test, and it was ascer-
tained that the power was being
produced at almost half the price
that these gentlemen at first offered
to produce it for.

There is another fact that must
not be overlooked. The Albertan
does not desire to reflect upon the
gentlemen asking the concession, but
at the same time the undertaking is
an enormous one and the capital in-
volved is immense. These gentlemen
have given no indication of the peo-
ple who are behind them in this un-
dertaking. It is not likely, but it
is not impossible, that this concern
might either now or in time to come
fall into the hands of the local power
company, and then where would
we be at?

As far as the street railway fran-
chise is concerned, we want that for
ourselves. The power of purchase is
always offered in cases of this kind
and is practically useless. We are
in a position to own our own
street railway; we have the money
and we can get the men to run it
just as soon as we can install it.

The Albertan is informed that this
company will not be prepared to
install a street railway for Calgary
for at least two years. That is too
long to wait. We want it this year,
and the city will build it.

Altogether the scheme is not one
that this city can entertain. Our
electric light plant is doing very
well. It will do better for a year
yet.

THIS IS THE TIME
The action of the Calgary board
of trade makes this question of municipal
telephones one upon which
action must be taken at once. No
better indication could have been had
of the feeling of the people of Cal-
gary than that shown at this partic-
ular meeting. The Calgary board
of trade is a conservative body, com-
posed of business men who weigh
well their action before adopting a
line of conduct. But right after the
very able address of the representa-
tive of the Bell company that body
by a vote of four to one, eight for
and four against, earnestly support-
ed the installation of the municipal
system. Every man has a right to
his opinion and doubtless every man
voiced as he thought best, but it was
very noticeable, too, that almost
every man who opposed the municip-
al telephone yesterday afternoon
was allied rather closely with some
large corporation.

If the same question was left in the
hands of any other collection of citi-
zens, it would be found that a much
larger majority would be in favor of
the installation of the Bell system.
That being the case, there is only
one course for the city to pursue in
this matter, and that is to lose no
time in placing Calgary in possession
of all the information and to proceed
in the direction of establishing

a municipal telephone system.
The time will come when we must
act. The most favorable time for
action is the present time. This is
the parting of the ways, and Cal-
gary will make no mistake, as Cal-
gary has made no mistake in adopt-
ing the municipal system. And Cal-
gary will make a grave mis-
take if it does not act now, as
Calgary has always made a grave
mistake whenever it has departed
from the municipal ownership idea.

hing so comic upon the stage as the
way that succeeding councils dis-
regard it.

A Barber's Protest
Dear Mr. Editor:
I wish to bring before the public a
true impression of the Calgary bar-
bers; it was said on Sunday after-
noon at the men's own meeting by
Mr. Crossley in his sermon stated, that
if the men were usually found loafing in
the bar-rooms and barber shops. I am
sorry to say he has put the barber
business down as not an honorable
and respectable business and has placed
it on an equal basis as that of a bar-
room. I myself, with others who will
uphold me in my statement, that it is
a disgrace and an insult to every moral
living barber and a shame to give the
public the impression that these two
should be classed alike.

The Question of Heaven
You have, it seems to me, very gen-
erously, allowed a gentleman by the
name of Burgess, to occupy about two
columns of your paper, in an objectiv-
ing to prove that there is no such
place as Heaven, that is, at least, as
it is commonly understood by the mass
of christians in this country. I would
be pleased to have a small space ac-
corded me for the purpose of exposing
some of the disastrous defects in his
theory. In the first place, it occurs
to me, that any one like Mr. B. who is
unable to distinguish between the
"Kingdom of God," and the "Church
of God" should keep out of print, when
a subject of this nature is before the
minds of the people. It is hardly nec-
essary to go into any lengthened ar-
gument as to the difference between
the two. That there is such, may be
easily discerned by any one who care-
fully and devoutly looks into the
subject. The questions of the disciples
to the Lord after His resurrection, and
His replies, indicate clearly, that the
kingdom, at least in its outward char-
acter was in abeyance, owing to the
rejection of the Messiah, by the Jews,
for the time being. Instead, the
"Church" was established, composed
of all nations, but of people
of all nations was an individual dis-
tinction as it is now called, "new crea-
tion" distinct from the
world around it. The apostles and
prophets being in the foundation, and
Christ the chief corner stone, all
christians added to it being called
"living stones." Christ was that "Cor-
ner stone," disallowed indeed of men,
but chosen of God and precious. He
is the head of the church, which is
His body. He is now seated in heav-
enly places, being raised, or exalted
to the right hand of God, and even now.

It is better to have a stand in
these days with a plumber than with
a politician, or with a coal man
than with a cabinet minister or a
king.
After the action of the Calgary
board of trade yesterday afternoon
it would be as well if Ald. Mitchell
started in to look for telephone
poles.

The strain of Castro living so long
must be somewhat severe upon the
leaders who are keeping soldiers un-
der arms to do things when he is
dead.

The Calgary Herald has taken a
firm stand on the power question. It
believes that the proposition of Messrs.
Budd and Alexander is a good one
if it would prove beneficial to the
city, and under such circum-
stances should be endorsed; on the
contrary however, if it is not a good
proposition for the city it should
not be endorsed. That ought to set-
tle it all right.

It is not surprising that the Cal-
gary Herald should favor the dis-
posal of the electric light system
to private companies. The Calgary
Herald has always been the mouth-
piece of the monopolies. It assisted
in disposing of the gas franchise to
a private corporation. It assisted in
disposing of the stock yards to a private
corporation. It opposed the in-
stallation of a municipal electric
system.

An applicant for inspection must
be eligible for homestead entry, and
only an applicant for inspection will be
received from an individual until that
application has been disposed of.

A homesteader whose entry is
in good standing and not liable to can-
cellation may, at any time, apply for
a patent on the land. If the land
applied for is vacant on receipt of the
telegram such application is to have
the necessary papers to complete the
transaction received by mail.

Applications for inspection must
in what particulars the homesteader
is in default, and if subsequently the
statement is found to be incorrect in
material particulars, the applicant will
lose any prior right of re-entry, should
the land become vacant, or if entry
has been granted it may be summarily
cancelled.

Before making application for patent
the settler must give sixty days notice
in writing to the Commissioner of
Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his in-
tention to do so.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Min-
ing Regulations.
Coal.—Coal lands may be purchas-
ed at \$10 per acre for soft coal and
\$20 for bituminous. Not more than
\$200 acres can be acquired by one in-
dividual or company. Royalty as to
each acre shall be collected on the gross
output.

Quartz.—A free miner's certificate is
granted upon payment in advance of
\$10 for an individual, and
from \$50 to \$100 per annum for a com-
pany according to capital.

FLACER mining claims generally
are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, re-
newable yearly.
A free miner may obtain two leases
to dredge for gold of five miles each
for twenty years renewable at the
discretion of the Minister of the
Interior.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5.
At least \$100 must be expended on
the claim each year or paid to the
mining recorder in lieu thereof. When
\$500 has been expended or paid, the
locator may, upon having a survey
made and upon complying with other
requirements, purchase the land at \$1
per acre.

GOOD MEETING AT METHODIST CHURCH

Rev. Mr. Crossley Preaches on The Blood of Christ

On the platform besides the evangelists, there were Rev. F. Ferrier of Brandon, Rev's Patterson, Grant, Bishop, Kerby, Mr. Hunter gave one of his pithy and pointed Bible readings, speaking of the new birth, Mr. Hunter said it was not morality, not baptism, confirmation, not penance, or joining the church.

But being born again means new nature, new principles, new affections, new desires, new life. Born from above means new feelings, fences, friends.

Speaking of God's love as recorded in John 11:16, he made a telling appeal. Rev. Crossley spoke from the words, "When I see the blood I will pass over you," and showed that the way that Israel was saved in Egypt symbolizes now that we may all be saved. He spoke on seven points.

1st. The blood was innocent blood - So Christ did no sin. 2nd. The blood was vicarious. So Christ "suffered the just for the unjust to bring us to God."

The blood of Christ means the life of Christ that was poured out for us. 3rd. The blood was sprinkled blood.

4th. The blood was saving. Christ saves us from the death of sin here and hereafter. We are saved through Christ and rewarded for our works. 5th. It was sheltering blood. So those who will be saved need to take refuge in the provision God has made for us in Christ.

6th. The way they were saved in Egypt shows how simple it is for us to be saved. They believed the truth. They were willing to be saved. They surrendered to God's method.

7th. Salvation is assured, as we have heard that Christ is the Saviour, believing that he is able and willing to save and to keep, and bring the willing to be saved down through him, let us willingly surrender to Christ now and we may know that we are "Saved by Grace"

Rev. Mr. Ferrier of Brandon spoke of the great work being done by the evangelists and also in Brandon. The town he said was moved, and upwards of one thousand persons professed conversion.

The meeting tomorrow night will be of special interest. Mr. Crossley will speak on the "Unpardonable Sin."

THE TROUBLE WAS CAUSED BY A FAULT

No Danger of any Trouble in New York Says a professor

Christiania, Jan. 15-Herbert D. Pierce, the American minister to Norway, and ex-Third Assistant Secretary of State, in an interview today with the correspondent of the Associated Press relative to the charges made before the house committee on ways and means at Washington yesterday by Prof. H. W. Abbott, of Cleveland, in connection with a hearing on the resignation for the further protection of fur seals on the high seas, made a statement substantially as follows:

"The charge is simply a rehearsal of the old malicious attack which was freely ventilated and satisfactorily explained in Secretary Root's letter to the President, January 28, 1906."

Mr. Pierce added that he necessarily acted as counsel for both the government and the claimants before the Hague tribunal because the claims of these private individuals were presented under the protection of the government and the had to appear in an authorized capacity in acting on behalf of individuals. In both capacities he acted with the full authority of the late Secretary Hay, and upon the formal request of the claimants that in their interests he be authorized to do so. Mr. Pierce also said that he received no compensation as counsel for the government, it being expressly stipulated that he was to receive compensation from the claimants outside of an award and such compensation had Mr. Hays' written authority to receive.

Mr. Pierce pointed out that he had succeeded in securing large damages for his claimants, some of whom attempted to collect their share and remove the money out of the district of Columbia. He obtained an injunction and the matter was then settled by mutual agreement.

Mr. Pierce said he had all the documents in the case, including a copy of Secretary Root's letter, which he showed to the correspondent.

TREAT ROBBERS LIKE CAYOTES

A Story From China Revealing Chinese Character

Vancouver, Jan. 14-After cutting a robber's ears off, a party of Shuntak, China, citizens shot the man dead and then sent the ears to the nearest hokting and demanded a reward for their gallantry.

Such is the story brought from the Orient by the last Express steamer. A man named Au was on his way to market at Shuntak when five robbers held him up and took all his money. The thieves made off but Au followed them, shouting for assistance. Au chased and succeeded in capturing one of the robbers, whom they treated in the way described.

The relatives of the slain robber have protested to the authorities, but the officials are classed as being unwilling to meddle, as in China it is regarded as an act of bravery to chase and succeed in capturing one of the robbers, whom they treated in the way described.

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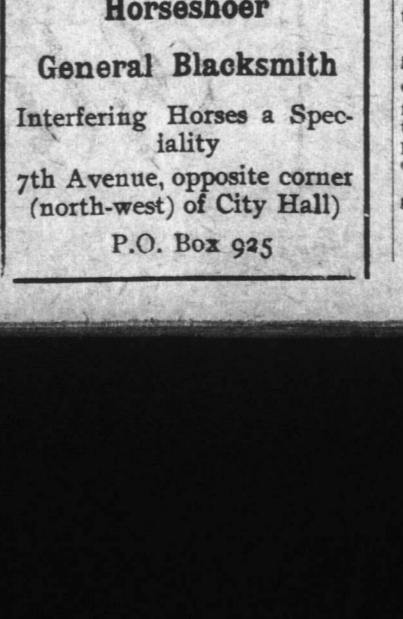
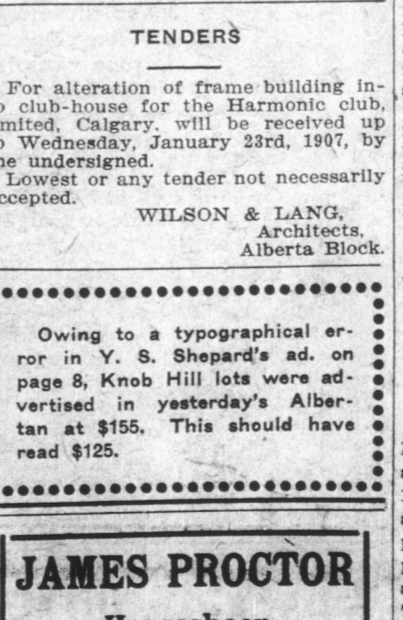
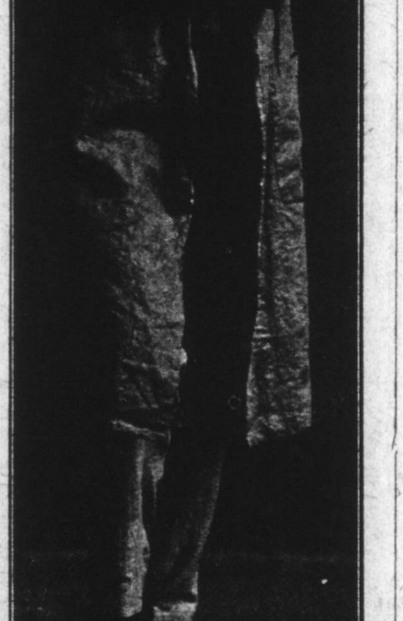

To provide that the Poll tax shall only be collected from those who have resided within the city for at least thirty days and who are between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years and who are not already tenants paying rent.

To provide in cases of persons declaring that they are unable to pay the cost of the same that the city may continue water and sewer connections from the property line to the cellar line, and charge such cost against the property, to be payable in three yearly instalments, and to make the necessary financial arrangements for the same.

To provide for the making of the voters lists within three months from the confirmation of the assessment each year and that a copy be posted up in the city hall and at least four other places to be designated by the Council.

To provide for the assessment, rating and taxing of all real estate belonging to the city and levying water rates and charging electric light bills against the same.

To provide that in all cases of improvements local or otherwise that where the city is to pay any proportion thereof that a By-law authorizing the same to be previously submitted to the electors.

To provide that on a By-law approved by the electors the term of office of Aldermen may be extended to two years.

To provide for the levying of and validating the By-law 679 respecting the floating debt and the issue of bonds thereunder and also of By-law 676 and the bonds issued thereunder.

To provide for the submission of the assessment roll to a committee of the Council of not less than four for examination and report and for the Council quizzing, raising or lowering the assessment, or any portion thereof without the formality of a complaint.

To provide that in elections for Aldermen no ballot shall be counted unless it discloses a bona fide vote or mark in favor of as many candidates as there are vacancies.

To provide that the Returning Officer at election shall appoint Deputy Returning Officer and select Polling Booths.

That Council have power to compel the erection of buildings in certain areas to be erected ten feet from the street line.

To provide for making supplementary assessment and collector's Roll to include persons coming to the City or starting business after the Assessment Appeal Court has confirmed the original Roll.

BIG IMPROVEMENTS IN U. S. HARBORS

The Appropriations Will Approximate \$81,000,000

Washington, Jan. 14.—The largest river and harbor bill in the history of the country was reported to the house today Chairman Purton's committee, which has been holding sessions during the holiday recess. The appropriations made in it will approximate \$80,000,000. About three-eighths of the appropriations in the bill will be for cash expenditures, and the remaining five-eighths will be authorized for projects extending out a number of years, some of which are now under way.

Not for fourteen years has such a big budget been prepared by the Rivers and Harbors committee. Ten years ago \$12,650,350 was appropriated in cash. The bill which was passed in 1905 carried a total of \$35,166,533.

This afternoon the matter will be discussed and it is expected there will be a vote on the bill. The adoption of the plan for the fourteen-foot waterway from Chicago to St. Louis, costing thirty-one million dollars, the members from the Mississippi Valley will favor the project but it looks as if the measure will not receive recognition at this session. The prevailing idea is that only such undertakings as can be finished within a reasonable time will receive sanction. A member of the committee this morning said that it would be the policy to finish all the most important improvements now under way and that steps will be taken as soon as possible to improve New York harbor.

This plan includes the enlargement of Ambrose Channel, from a point just below the narrows at a point easterly direction to the sea. This was originally estimated to cost \$11 million, but a contract was entered into for four thousand dollars, and it is probable that a test case will enter the supreme court in a few days. Decisions of the lower courts have sustained the new law. These officers say that the natural increase is only a small part of that due to the law. There was no or greater pressure for river and harbor legislation than at present and among the new projects that will probably carry are a new Soo Lock and alternate channels in the Detroit River at a cost of \$10 million dollars, the deepening of the harbor at Boston, and extensive improvements of the Delaware and Mississippi rivers.

MINNESOTA FARMERS LIKE THE CLIMATE

A Number of Visitors Express Pleasure at their Visit During Last Few Days

A large number of American farmers from Minnesota left the city last evening for their home after spending three days in Calgary purchasing farm lands.

The party arrived on a special car some few days ago being brought up by the Canadian Pacific Irrigation Colonization Co. for the purpose of looking over this part of the province, to purchase irrigated lands for farming purposes.

The party included some of the best people of that state including A. S. Burrows who was the only one of the party living outside of Minnesota, coming from N. Dakota; E. M. Walsh, W. M. Low, and mayor J. H. McPhee of Crookston, Harry Stain, N. Rabin, and A. Thompson, and C. H. Hitchcock ex-mayors of Crookston, A. P. Toupin, Chas. Bourdon and E. Estel from Red Lake Falls, with W. M. Dewing, J. Meers, Walsh and Low, Crookston, are the companies agents and both accompanied the party, they say that during the next three months they themselves will have large parties coming to this province. They have all the advantages in starting here, and this will have a great tendency towards bringing settlers into Alberta.

Mayor McPhee in conversation with the Albertan said: "This is a great country and I am greatly pleased with the prospect in store for this province and especially Calgary. The weather has been very cold, but we were unfortunate in striking here when a cold snap was on. I can judge what the weather conditions are by today which I think is ideal for this time of the year. I have been following this part of Alberta for some considerable time and know that it is not often you get such a snap as we have experienced these last two days. Still the cold did not trouble us, and we have been round, and had a thorough good time. Last evening we were entertained by the Elks in the Norman block, all of us took in the theatre and afterwards adjourned to their rooms where we spent a thorough good time."

Mr. Hitchcock another of the party who purchased 400 acres of land, spoke in loud praise of the country, and was especially pleased with farming conditions of Alberta.

The C. P. R. Irrigation Colonization Co. were expecting three or four special cars with farmers from different parts, but have been compelled to wait them to wait a few days, owing to snow, as it is impossible to examine the ground properly in the present conditions.
