NEWS AND GOSSIP OF THE SPORTING WORLD

Puzzle: Was the Moose Jaw Baseball Confab a Meeting or Was it Not?

According to Latest Reports, It Was Merely a Friendly Gathering in a Hotel Lobby, Which Lasted But Fifteen Minutes, But Was Not Official

THE echoes of the meeting, confab, or whatever the gathering of baseball magnates in Moose Jaw last week can properly be called, are just beginning to arrive. It now appears that the meeting was not a meeting, but only an informal gathering in the hotel lobby, which lasted but fifteen minutes, during which time a peace was patched up largely through the efforts of Sammie Savage, of Calgary, Alberta, who acted in the device of a peacemaker.

Frank Gray, when he returned to Edmonton, was captured by The Edmonton Press man and when cross-examined gave out a story of the meeting which lacked some of the details with which Calgary was already familiar but which also included several facts which were overlooked by Sam Savage in his interview with The Albertan.

The following is The Bulletin story of the meeting: "President Frank Gray of the Western Canada League returned to Edmonton on Saturday morning and other points which he visited during the past few days. Mr. Gray denied that there were any star chamber proceedings and that the story which came over The Bulletin's leased wire yesterday morning was correct in practically every particular.

"It is true that the magnates gathered informally for about fifteen minutes, but it could not be called a meeting. There was no secretary and no minutes were taken. I was in my hotel when I received a telephone message saying that the various members of the board of control in the city would like to get together and talk things over and you know what understanding was reached. There were no fireworks and everybody showed a desire to keep the league going instead of breaking it up if possible."

He was firm in his statement that the salary limit would not be raised. To force such a thing on the Medicine Hat club and even the Calgary club at the present time would be suicide. He was completely satisfied with the league. To have baseball in Western Canada the league must have Medicine Hat.

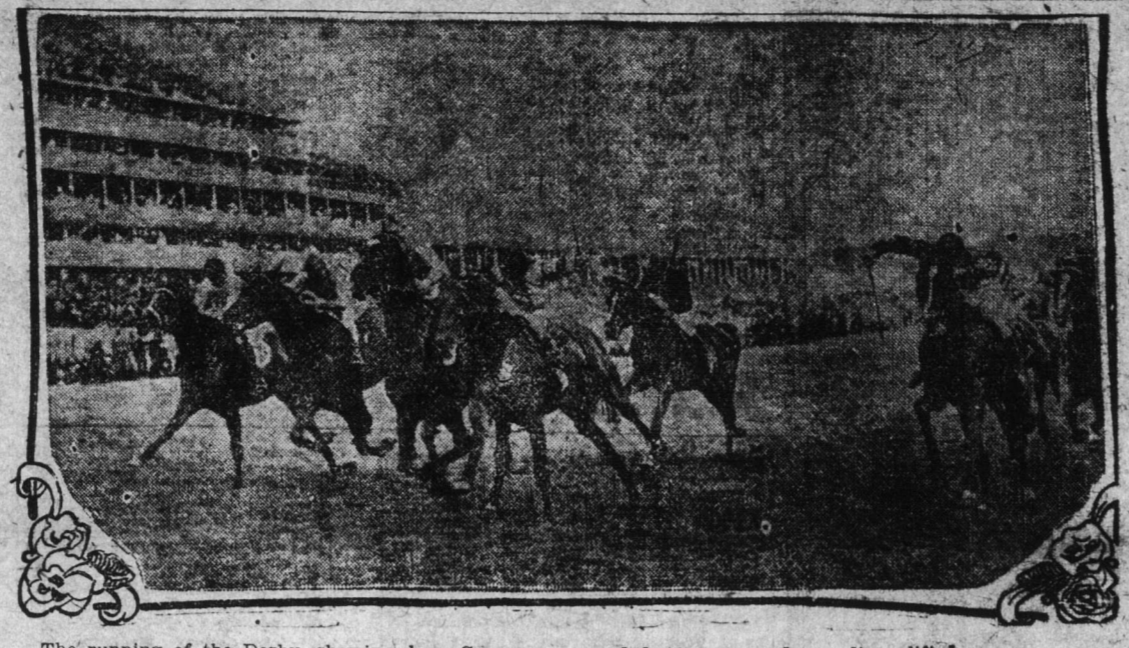
When it came to a question of reinstatement, Mr. Gray at first held out for the reinstatement of Hurley, Harper and Collins of the Saskatoon club, but Mr. Cairns would not consent, and the president gracefully withdrew. "Earlier in the day a peaceful settlement seemed absolutely impossible. The league and Saskatoon delegates spent all night in the city without reaching an agreement. UNION MEN ARE NOT APPROVED FOR CITY POWER STATION

Civic Officials Feel That Control of Plant by Electrical Union Would Be Unfavorable to Operation of Station in Interests of the Public

Terms asked for are mostly observed now. Employees are asked to wait on commissioner Graves and explain their grievances. If any deputation to council consisted of men outside.

An attempt to effect a recognition of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers by the city, in the power station staffs of the city, reached a climax yesterday when the officers of the local union presented an agreement embodying the union schedule and union conditions to the mayor and commissioners and Superintendent McCall of the power plant, and City Electrician Brown.

The agreement was not acceptable to the city's representatives, for the reason that the implied recognition of the union in this department of the city's municipal utilities is regarded as unwise from a public standpoint.

Union Control Not Approved. While willing to do everything possible to improve working conditions and to meet the salary schedules of the union, Commissioner Graves is not willing to place the operation of the power station entirely under union control.

"It is not done in any other Canadian city with the exception of Vancouver, where the utility is privately owned," said Commissioner Graves, "and I cannot in the interests of the public consent to the unionizing of this staff."

Key to Much Power. In the event of any trouble the commission pointed to the power station as the key of the situation, and a very important asset in the preservation of law and order. If this station were under union control an attempt might call out the operators on a sympathetic strike and leave the whole city in absolute darkness—a condition not to be thought of. The police and fire department would be maintained for the safety of the citizens, are prevented from forming unions. The power station is the next in importance as an agency for the preservation of public safety and must be conducted under as similar rule.

Commissioner Graves intimated that he would not receive any deputation of the operators from time to time to hear their complaints, or adjust any differences which may arise between the operators and the superintendent. There would be no discrimination among the men. But the city's power station must remain open in the interests of public safety.

This was the pith of a long conference between W. Dyson, Parker, Evers, and Pearson of the local Brotherhood of Electrical Workers and the city officials.

No Employees Hired. Before the deputation presented the details of the proposed agreement, City Electrician Brown objected, on a point of order, that the deputation being from the power station department.

"We have never had a complaint from any representatives of the power station operators. I think a representation should come from the men who are affected rather than from another department of the city's services," said Mr. Dyson, who represents the electric light department, which is in no way connected with the power station.

Mr. Dyson insisted that they came with the authority of the other staff, and Mr. Parker explained that it was usual for the official of the union or an authorized deputation to present grievances rather than for the men affected to come.

Terms of Agreement. The agreement presented provided for an eight hour day, the union scale to be paid for the overtime work, and two weeks vacation pay. The operators would be paid monthly, and two-fourths of the operators on each high tension wire in place of one at present.

On these occasions it was stated that the operators had taken up this agreement with Mr. Call, and in each case they were courted with the same result. The union in this department was denied.

Part Now in Operation. Part of the schedule in operation and according to Superintendent McCall, the operators are to be paid weekly. The schedule will be adopted whenever the city council has approved.

coming.

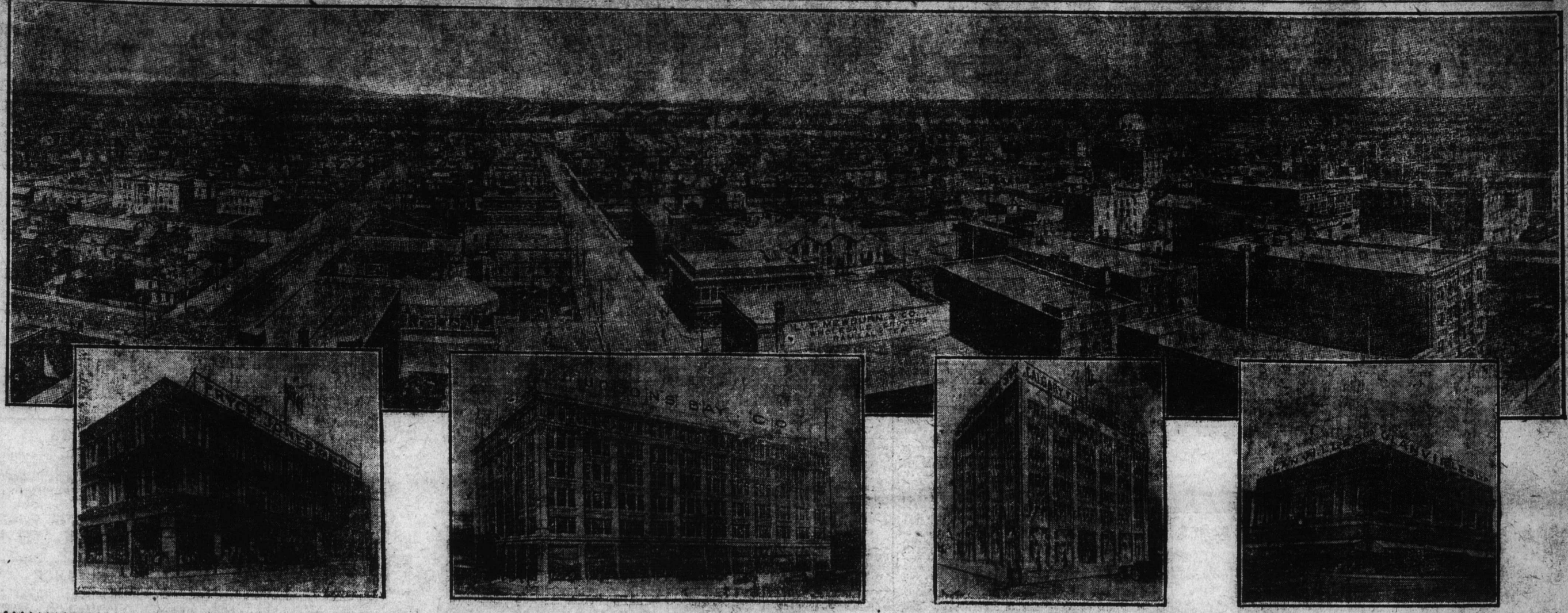
DISCOVER HISTORIC

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The Markets

CROP REPORT OF THE CANADIAN PACIFIC IS OF A VERY OPTIMISTIC CHARACTER

Winnipeg, June 24.—The C.N.R. crop report for this week indicates that, although moisture was badly needed during the last two or three weeks, the crops have not, as a rule, suffered very severely, and Sunday's rain put them in splendid shape again. In many of the Manitoba farmers' districts, the crops never looked better. The optimistic reports are to be general, however, as the main line of the C.N.R. crops are in excellent condition, many farmers having wheat up to ten inches high. The most favorable reports come in from the district all along the Hartney, Oak Point, Brandon, Kipling, Emerson, and Regina sub-divisions, and the crops in these localities will make great progress since the recent heavy rain. Altogether there is hardly a district which reports unfavorably regarding the crop. Rain was greatly needed during the last few days and Sunday's deluge will insure a quick growth for several weeks. The report from Moose Jaw district states that the crop there is growing very rapidly, and is two weeks ahead of last year. The report from Regina is in progress throughout the west, weather conditions for this week being all that could be desired.
