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TARIFF POLICY.

Can the tariff policy of any country stand still? To our mind it is no more possible for a tariff to remain always the same than it is possible for any other kind of legislation to be cast in stereotyped forms incapable of amendment or amendment in any conditions. Legislation of all kinds, including tariff legislation, is the wearing apparel of nationality. As a nation grows from youth to maturity, and from maturity to decay, its clothes must change with it, or it will grow ragged and uncomfortable, exposed to various dangers and diseases. Horace wrote of his own people that he had raised a monument more durable than brass and equally durable with the existence of Rome, as he understood it. Horace is still the most widely read of all the world's poets, but his Rome is—where? There are things far more durable, far less changeable, than the association of human beings in nations and empires. Beside the elemental relations of human beings one to another and "to their great mother the earth," these last are ephemeral and transitory. And history has with tolerable certainty demonstrated that those nations which are alive are industrious, have a short and glorious career, compared with those which make provision for the inevitable movement in government and policy, which is always taking place. To attempt to conserve national institutions in fixed and rigid forms is a false conservatism, against which all the present more correct translations than that made at the beginning of the seventeenth century, of whether the "authorized version" is still the version people desire to read, even if it is beyond anybody's power to authorize any particular version. We are inclined to think that more modern translations, and that for general reading, of the old version still holds the field. The old translators may not have had the same power over Greek particles and Hebrew syntax as modern critics, but they had a power over English prose never equalled by any subsequent translator. The old version is not a party in Canada (we say "was," not "is"), which claimed that Canada had taken an entirely wrong line in national development, and adopted as creed the doctrines of free trade. Power either changed the views of that party, or the party itself changed its views. The object and origin of this division of opinion is not in the least a compromise of putting its views into effect, or was compelled to compromise with the spirit of national development it found existent in the country. But a great many of its adherents have never understood this compromise, and question the right of its own party to its free trade doctrine. They are in effect, but not in power over the destiny of this country. Still, their habit of mind and political activity have taken an almost equally dangerous course. Under the guise of ability, they advocate rigidity upon the question of tariff and will not compromise upon this issue. There are many directions in which the Canadian tariff requires remodeling to suit the new conditions of the country. The last six years have been years of pulsating life and rapid growth, and young Canada's tariff structure are already above his ankles, while the old tariff delapidations in other portions of his realm. There is a large rent in the seat of the lead industry into which a silly little patch of a different material has been basted. There are shocking rents in the neighborhood of the iron and steel industry. In fact there will soon be rags and tatters, and if something is not done, the Conservative party is insisting upon a new suit of clothes and a trace to patches. It fitted well and has given good wear, and if the country is wise, it will wear, and to the same tailor, and give up the idea that there is economy in useless patches. The country cannot possibly stay in the condition in which it is. The expediency by which the government is trying to stave off the tariff is a crowding upon the people of the country are worse than useless. If it has done nothing else, the Conservative party has at least demonstrated that, at the same time, the government is not in a position to lay down a coherent policy on the tariff question. So the country is bound to suffer in many important phases of its national life that suffering is bound to become more accentuated as time goes on.

BIBLE KNOWLEDGE.

The Bible World, one of the most influential publications of the University of Chicago press, denies the truth of recent statements that popular knowledge of the Bible is on the wane. Both the number of Bibles printed and the number of people who read the Bible have enormously increased. There is a difference, however. It lies, according to this authority, "not so much in the amount of attention which the Bible receives as in the way in which the

Bible is used and viewed. Family worship is not so common as a generation or two ago, but this is not because piety has declined, or the Bible become less valued; rather it is due to the changing customs in family life and the modern rush of business, school, and society. The committing of Scripture to memory is also less frequent than formerly, but this is not because the Bible is thought to be supererogatory by other religious literature; rather because "committing to memory" is in these days a "disputed" pedagogical method. Undoubtedly there is a loss that comes from the decline of family worship and of Scripture memorization. Both should be re-established. This loss, however, has been more than compensated by a better way of reading and applying the Bible. Whereas formerly it had been read as a devotional book, and as a sort of mystical guide to conduct and belief, the rise of the modern historical spirit has brought thinking people largely to view the Bible from a historical standpoint, and to study it in its historical setting. The Bible has come to be regarded as antiquated and having no present value, but that its value for the present must be ascertained by an intelligent understanding of its origin and characteristics, and its meaning to those who wrote the several books. In other words, the Bible has now come to prevail improves the use and extends the influence of the Bible in a way never before attained. The Bible, in short, is now regarded no longer as a book in which certain religious dogmas are triumphantly demonstrated, and all other religions discredited, and which is to be read as a sort of inflexible creed, but for a revelation in historical records of the development of our knowledge of God, and a justification of His ways to man. The modern conception of the Bible has perhaps diminished the arbitrary authority it derived from a doctrine of plenary inspiration, but it has greatly increased its real authority derived from the message it contains, and its influence with all classes of readers. We ought to be able to protect ourselves—rich enough and strong enough to do that. The Colonist therefore ought to add to the naval strength of the Empire the equivalent of their requirements for defence in case of war. But the Colonies would naturally require some guarantee that the Empire should be able to protect them, and should not be withdrawn for other purposes through the possible exigencies we have described, except in a grave emergency and with the consent of the Colonies. This point of view has been ably put forward by Senator Magnuson of Australia, in advocating an Australian navy, and it has not been met. We do not ourselves see how it can be met. Colonial seaports are subject to attack by the roving cruisers of an enemy, and a naval strength that is equally strong, particularly if Great Britain is short 100 cruisers, under which they would be incapable of defence. As the Naval and Military Record puts it, "there is a reasonable presumption that a Colony might be neglected if the people of these islands expect from us protection to protect the routes converging upon the United Kingdom. Mr. Matheson and his friends cannot conquer the apprehension that one or two powerful cruisers of the enemy may invade the British navy and prey upon Australian shipping and coast trade. In short, they want a local navy, or, failing this, some definite assurance that a local navy will never be needed. If there is any such guarantee, why do not the Admiralty state it so clearly that the Colonies may understand it? That is the position exactly. Obviously, we have no right to expect Great Britain to extricate us from it any more than she is now doing, subject to the rightly paramount demands of her own position. On the other hand, Great Britain has no right to expect from us contributions of such a character as would fail to extricate us from this position, except to a very indeterminate degree. We ought to do our share to protect the Empire, but we naturally interpret that obligation primarily in terms of that portion of the Empire contiguous to the British Isles. In an emergency, we might denote ourselves to guard the centre. But we should have to be ourselves the judges of the gravity of such an emergency. The question of Imperial Naval Defence is at present in a very chaotic condition, and a number of perfectly frank and able people are expressing their views on the subject. It is not a question of the Colonial subsidization of Great Britain; others are apparently willing that the present condition of affairs which is radically unjust to Great Britain, should continue. We cannot do better than again quote from the Naval and Military Record, and sum up the question as it does. "Mr. Chamberlain's recent speech," it says, "fore-shadowing a possible change of policy, may well give pause to those who urge that the Colonies should gradually increase their direct contributions towards the navy. Within the next few years the British government are quite unlikely to assume substantial proportions, but there are other ways in which our Colonies may be able to take their share in Imperial defence. But Mr. Chamberlain's scheme is based upon certain rather startling modifications of the free trade principle, and it is not as yet, feel any confidence that his views will be accepted in this country. But Mr. Chamberlain has the Colonies at his back, and he may succeed in solving the difficult problems of Imperial federation, which includes Imperial defence."

A CLOSE CALL.

It is somewhat remarkable that a government with a nominal majority of 125 in the British House of Commons should only have been saved from defeat by the tactics of the Irish party, and that the scheme was only carried up a majority of 41 by an urgent whip. Yet that is undoubtedly what happened in the House of Commons on Wednesday. The government has brought in a Land Purchase Bill for Ireland, which pledges the credit of Great Britain for a very large sum to assist in the Irish landlords and tenants. The Irish members voted to get this Bill passed, and are now surrounded by a defeated until it is passed. But the Irish members wish to secure the most desirable and a separate and different purpose from their point of view no doubt, but one upon which the British House of Commons has been consulted also. No matter what sort of Bill the government brought in, a point of order was raised, and the Irish members were bound to show it, unless, indeed, the Irish party had actually been expelled from the House. That point of divergence was arrived at in an amendment proposed by Mr. John Redmond, the Irish leader, and which the Bill to explain clearly the extent of the Bill to the House of Commons, but it is in the nature of the case, a secondary function. Colonial local commerce and seaports might be ravaged and destroyed, but if the country doing so, were eventually subdued by Great Britain, these ravages could be repaired. Whereas, if the nucleus of the Empire were defeated through inadequate protection, the damage would be absolutely irreparable. It is this fact which gives importance on the subject of Imperial Naval Defence, to the statement of Admiral Sir E. R. Fremantle that, to adequately protect her commerce, Great Britain requires 100 more cruisers than she has actually got. If that is true, even if it is not true, but merely an opinion honestly but incorrectly held, a change of government, and a general election, would be a disaster, and the last thing immediately desirable. A crude verdict from the British House of Commons upon the Bill, would mean a serious blow to Mr. Chamberlain's government. The British in general, and the British Empire in particular, is firmly believing, and has confidence in great statesmen, but his recognition of ideas is a terribly slow process. We are not ourselves, however, Mr. Chamberlain's ideas to be triumphant upon the first appeal to the House of Commons. It is a disaster, and a disaster, for which we have no hand, desire to see them so hopelessly beaten through lack of comprehension of the part of the British House of Commons will be no nucleus left for their growth and development in the national mind. An election in Great Britain, would result, in such a stunning triumph for the anti-Imperialists, as to put back

the clock for a generation. There is a long and arduous struggle ahead of the British Empire, a struggle chiefly in the mind of Mr. Chamberlain, the sole repository of truth.

They one and all asserted their belief in the principle of a united party, and their willingness to assist the party in every way possible. They received a very enthusiastic welcome. 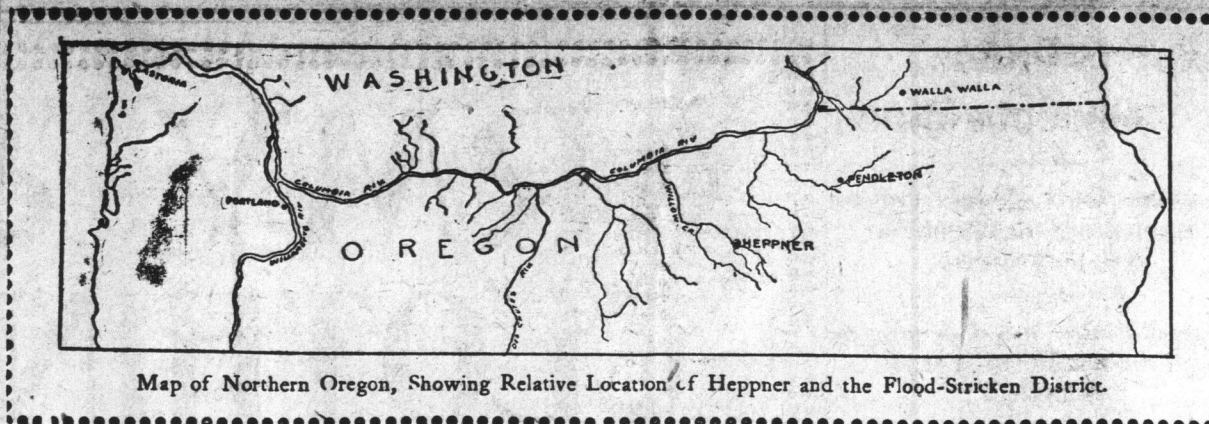
