OVERRULES THE ONTARIO
COURT OF APPEAL.

A History of the Case—The Question Involved—What the Outcome Will be.
OTTAWA Nov 28—In the supreme court to-day decision was rendered in the case of McLaren v. Caldwell. The full bench of judges was present, and the court was unanimous in reversing the judgment of the court of appeal of Ontario and affirming the decree of the court of chancery, which graats to Mr. McLaren a perpetual injunction restraining the defendant Caldwell.

Some three years ago the Messrs Caldwell commenced driving their logs as usual,
when they were stopped by Mr McLaren,
who refused to allow them to use his improvements unless they would first formally admit his right to the absolute control of them. This they declined to do, as the control of certain points meant the control of the whole stream for log driving purposes and would enable Mr McLaren to charge what tolls he pleased. After lengthened negotiations failed to bring about a compromise the case was carried into court and was brought up for trial before Vice-Chan cellor Proudfoot on a motion for an injunction. A great deal of evidence was taken as to the value of the works in question, and also as to the character of the stream for floatability before the works were constructed. If the evidence did not establish structed. If the evidence did not establish that the stream was not, in a state of nature, fitted for carrying logs, it at least leit the matter doubtful, and V. C. Proudfoot gave Mr McLaren the benefit of the doubt. He decided that without the improvements owned by him the stream was not floatable, and he took his implied definition of floatability from the decision of the court of common pleas

decided in 1863. It becomes necessary at
this stage to recall briefly the facts of that this stage to recall briefly the facts of that now important case. Boale was the owner of a slide on a branch of the Mirsissippi river, and Dickson, after passing his timber through it, declined to pay the amount de manded by Boale as slidage dues. The latter carried the case into court and it ultimately came before the full court of common pleas, which decided that as logs could not be floated past the obstructions without the aid of Boale's slide, even during high water, he was entitled to even during high water, he was entitled to a "reasonable" remuneration for the use of his improvements. The judges did not at that time decide that Boale had absolute control of the river in the sense of being in a position to charge what toll he pleased or to stop timber from passing altogether if he wished to do so. That issue was not then raised, and the judges did not, as too many judges are in the habit of doing, indulge in any obter dicta outside of the record. LUMBERING USAGE.

The decision in Boale v. Dickson

was based on an enactment in the consolidated statutes of Canada (1859) regulating dated statutes of Canada (1859) regulating the construction of mill dams and enforcing the construction of aprons for timber-floating purposes. There was at that time (1863) no provision in the statute law of the province for the assessment and collection of tolls or slidage dues. The amount to be collected by the slide-owner and paid to the timber-owner was surely a matter. to be collected by the slide-owner and paid by the timber-owner was purely a matter of agreement, and it is a striking proof of the sensible and law-abiding character of the peo le of Canada that with the exception of the dispute between Boale and Dick on, and one or two others of a less important character the business of stream-improving and log-floating had been carried on harmoniously from the earliest times down to the attempt of McLaren to prevent Caldwell from driving his ogs in 1880.

WHAT V. C. PROUDFOOT DECIDED.

Vice-Chancellor Proudfoot did not in his decision either approve or disapprove of the previous finding of the court of common pleas. He merely stated that, as a single judge, he felt himself bound by it, and advised the parties to go direct to the O. tario court of appeal without waiting to argue the matter before him and this advice was accepted. What Mr Proudfoot virtually decided was (1) if a river is not passable for logs in its natural condition in a time of high water the owner of necessary artificial improvements is entitled to reasonable compensation: (2) that his title to compensation implies his right to control the WHAT V. CANADA PACIFIC BAILWAY Pushing Forward the Work-The Lin

500 Miles Beyond Arabi. Winnipeg Free Press Nov. 25. Mr. Egan, acting manager of the Canada Pacific railway, having been interrogated as to the progress being made on the main line stated that up to Thursday night the track was laid up to a point 585 miles from Winnipeg, of which mileage 419 miles were laid by Langdon, Shepard & Co., the railway contractors. Grading has been fully completed to Maple Creek, forty-five miles further west and forty miles east of Medicine Hat crossing of the South Sas-katchewan. Fifteen miles in patches of the last forty miles of the five hundred mile contract are also graded; and coulees in it, the cuts and fills are necessarily heavier as the crossing is approached. The contractors however feel satisfied that in the course of the winter the whole five hundred miles will be graded and the rails laid within a year from the time the contract. but as this section has a number of bluffs year from the time the contract was signed; and this when accomplished will be unequalled in the history of rail. road construction in the world. 
