THE PEOPLE'S PASTIMES.

WHAT IS GOING ON IN SPORTING CIRCLES THE WORLD OVER.

Preparations for the Season—Annual Meeting of the Toronto Cricket and Other Clubs—Can Hanlan Give Ross Five Seconds?

The time of the Oxford and Cambridge boat race was 21.38. Springfield, Mass., is going to give \$6000 to the bicycle riders in September.

At least 700 entries are expected for the St. Louis dog show which opens April 22. The winter meeting at New Orleans completed 21 days' racing. The meeting was a financial failure.

It is likely that Lee, Stevenson and Peterson will soon contend together in a sculling handicap. John L. Sullivan appears in New Orleans Saturday and Sunday nights. He made \$15,000 by ten exhibitions in Texas.

John Conner, the English wrestler, now at Scranton, Pa., offers to wrestle Matsuda Sorakichi, the Jap., any style, for over \$500 a side. Forty gentlemen met at Detroit Monday evening and organized the Michigan yacht club. Henry C. Hart is commodore and A. I. MacLeod secretary.

The Cincinnati baseball club intends to give concerts on its grounds. It has engaged the Cincinnati orchestra reed band and Levy, the cornet player. Matsuda Sorakichi, the wrestling Jap., is under engagement to Richard K. Fox for three months, at \$50 a week. Fox has already made nearly \$4000 out of him.

Winthrop has joined the Northwestern racing circuit and will hold his summer meeting the second week of July, Minneapolis holding its meeting the first week. James Pilkington, Wallace Ross' backer, offers to bet \$5000 that Hanlan cannot give Ross five seconds' start and beat him. The bet is a safe one. Hanlan is in Australia.

The Toronto gun club will have a shooting match at Bayville on the 15th inst. in Woodbine park to-morrow. The tramway leaves the Don bridge at noon, 1.10 and 2 p.m. Jack Stewart sends a challenge to Mervin Thompson for a knock-out match with gloves, under Queensberry rules, at Boston. But such a match is impossible, as Thompson is in bed and unable to move his right arm.

Some California sporting men have got up a scheme to take a pack of greyhounds to the eastern states to give exhibitions of coursing in the large cities. Coursing has long been an established sport in California. The Randolph barriers handicap of three miles, run to England last week, was won by E. F. Painter (30 seconds start) in 15m 59.4-5s. C. E. Gray (scratch) was third in 15m. 44s. The fastest time made in the race.

A singular mistake was made in the meagre associated press report of the Oxford and Cambridge boat race, which was published in all our contemporary papers. It spoke of the race as having been rowed with a start instead of straightaway.

The Toronto bicycle club will meet at their club rooms, 100 King street west, on Monday morning, Good Friday, for club drill or a short run, and at about 2.30 in the afternoon they will meet again for a run into the country if the weather keeps favorable.

At a meeting of the Royal Oak baseball club at Cuyler's, the following officers were elected for the season: Frank Spalding, captain; J. Little, secretary; T. Mower, treasurer; W. Stoneham, A. Spalding and H. Griffin, managing committee.

Trinity college school, Port Hope, is looking forward to a brilliant cricketing season. The dates of one of its thirteen fixtures have already been arranged. Its first match will be played on its own grounds May 24, when the Toronto school is expected to play the Toronto juniors are to oppose the school on the 26th. In answer to an interviewer, Wallace Ross said: "I rowed at 166 lbs. I trained harder for my race with Babier than I ever did before. I was determined to win, and knew I must be as fit as possible to defeat the Englishman, who rows fast and stays well. You can see I am fit now. What I want to do is to build up a little before commencing to train again." Wallace also said he rated Babier as a sculler as about equal to J. A. Ten Eyck.
