From the Ottawa Free Pre The proposed railroad to be built from Caledonia to the shores of Lake Temismingue, to connect with the Gravenhurst and Caledonia railway it is contended by the projectors, would be a benefit to the Ittawa valley and as a consequence the ominion government are asked for a abeidy to aid its building. With regard to whether or not it will benefit the Ottawa vailey, a Free Press reporter waited on nany of the leading lumber merchants who have a thorough knowledge of the country and its requirements to ascertain their opinion on the matter. The proposed road would be about forty-five miles in length by an air line running directly north.

"What nature of country will the pro-"What nature of country will the proposed road traverse?" queried the scribe.
"Rough, decidedly rough," answered a prominent lumberman, "still there are some parts which might be utilized for agricultural purposes, but on the whole the country intervening between the C. P. R. and Lake Temiscamingue can never be what is called a good farming locality. The country is a good deal hilly and in many parts very rocky. It gets somewhat better as you approach the lake, but the best of it in an agricultural sense is not first-class. The wealth of the Temiscamingue region lies in its timber and minerals. Owing to the rapid exhaustion of forest in the Ottawa valley east and south of Lake Temiscamingue the exhaustion of forest in the Ottawa variey east and south of Lake Temiscamingue the lumber industry has become in that region an important factor, and years will certainly see this largely developed. Now, if this railway is built the result must be that the lumber cut in the Temiscamingue that the lumber region will take this hannel that the lumber out in the Temiscamingue and Kippewa region will take this hannel of outlet, leaving its present watercourse, as at present, all square, and other lumber out in that region must pass down the river to the market, whereas if this road was in running order the Toronto frontier of Ontario would become the route of shipment."

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
