

WHAT THE DRUGGISTS ASK.

At yesterday's meeting of the council of the College of Pharmacy a special committee consisting of J. W. Slaven, F. Jordan and John A. Clark, appointed to consider the advisability of reducing the annual fee, reported very strongly against such action, but expressed the belief that such a course would be possible when the liabilities of the college were reduced.

On motion of Mr. D'Avignon, seconded by

On motion of Mr. D'Avignon, seconded by Mr. Petrie, the council decided to instruct the registrar to publish notices in the trade journals and to notify by circular every registered druggist in the province, calling attention to the provision of the Pharmacy. Act, which comes in force on June 1 next, and declares that apprentices will be registered only on receipt of certificates of educational qualifications.

and declares that apprentices will be registered only on receipt of certificates of educational qualifications.

Dean Scott reported that there were at present in attendance at the College 99 junior students and 94 seniors.

The Committee on Legislation reported, averal proposed amendments to the Pharmacy Act. Mr. Poison objected to the clause providing for three meetings of the council per year. The extra meeting was "a fine picnic" for the members, but a tax on the druggists of Ontario and one cause of the maintenance of the high annual fee. The time of the council was frittered away by some of the members. The council had not sat for six hours yet during this session. The clause, however, was passed by the council.

Mr. Polson also objected to the registration of persons holding diplomas in the various states of the union being permitted to practice in Ontario, simply because those state colleges had no power to grant permits to their own graduates to practice in their respective states. Mr. Mackenzie, on the other hand, urged that the students of the Ontario College should have as wide a field for work as possible in order to prevent the crowding of the trade in this province.

Another restrictive clause to be asked for will prevent medical men from becoming druggists in cities and towns unless they cease to be physicians and surgeons. Still another would seek to prevent all persons from selling Paris green or London purple within five miles of a drug store, Mr. Polson said he would like to see those become law, but had no idea that the Legislature would pass such a piece of class legislation.



The Toronto Street Railway Lines Encronching on Their Franchise.

The Mayor is in receipt of a letter from Messrs. Bain, Laidlaw & Co., on behalf of the Toronto Street Railway, drawing his attention to the fact that their franchise is an exclusive one and requesting that no application for any other franchise inside the city limits shall be entertained by the council until reasonable notice has been given an opportunity of presenting their views on the subject.


