## CANADIAN PHILATELIC LITERATURE OF TO-DAY.

III-The Cinaman Philatioic Review.
In Derember 1897 the initial issue of the Roys Own Philatelist appeared, it contained only four pages and cover. A fine half - tone of Mr. H. A. Chapman with a good write up was given. A list of the charter members of the Boys Own Philatelic Asociation was also published. The January number contained eight pages and cover. Mr. W. A. Lydiatt took editoral charge with this number lut only for one month. The May number contained the Canadian Philatelic Annual. It contained tweaty mares and cover and contained a number of half tones and sketches. As a monthly the B. O. P. was far from a success, it did not :ppear regularly and did not recoive very muci: support. On Oedober first 189 N the paper was changed to a weekly and for a time appeared quite regularly. It cont tined some very good reating matter in the slape fo notes from Philatelic centres, and instrnctivearticles notable among which is the " Encyclonedia of Philatelic Terma" still running in the piper. The name was chunged to the Cansdian Philatelic Weekly with the issue of November 2 nd. Soon after this Mr. W. A. Lydiatt brought out a paper
of the same name and the two papers did battle royal as to who uas rightful owner of the name. This was settled soon after the demise of the Toronto product after issuing four numbers. The C. P. W. continued until January 19 th. $1 \times 99$ which was the last number as a weekly. And in the next issue dated Febriary 10 th. we find that another change in name has taken place. It is now The Canadian Philatelic Review, publisherl semi-monthly. The two numbers iswued under the new name make a sery creditable appearance and I believe, the paper has a bright future before it especially if $i_{i}$ continues to give us numbers like the last one which contained eight pages and cover. Nome new departments are being addel and I am sure the Review will ere long become one of the most popular American stamp papers. It is the only semi-monthly in Amprica aud has a field to fill and present indications point to a successful filling of the xime.
