Parish Notes

EASTER VESTRY.

The Easter Services this year were in every way successful, there being a large increase both in the number of communicants and in the amount of the offertory.

The music was quite up to its usual high standard, reflecting much credit upon the organist and choir.

The infant son of Capt. and Mrs. Wyatt was baptized on Easter Sunday afternoon by the Rector.

The Easter Vestry took place as usual on Easter Monday. There was not a very encouraging

attendance, but the proceedings were in every way pleasant and harmonious. Very hearty thanks were accorded to our retiring Churchwarden, Mr. Weller. Few know how much the Parish is indebted to Mr. Weller for his skilful management of the finances of the Parish during two very anxious years. In spite of unusual and very heavy expenses the funds of the Parish are by some \$1,200 in a better condition than when he undertook the office. A welcome is given to Mr. R. A. Baines to his second year of office, and no less hearty a welcome to Mr. McMurray who has accepted the position of Rector's Warden. Every parishioner should deem it his duty to give every support to the new Wardens—both financially and otherwise—in their difficult positions. Mr. Huson Murray, K.C., was also heartily thanked for his valued services as Chairman of the Sidesmen.

The three representatives of the Parish to the Synod were reappointed.

The Sanctuary Guild wish to thank the following members of the Church who kindly sent donations of flowers and money for the Easter decorations: Mrs. Robinson, \$2.00; Mrs. Campbell Reaves, \$2.00; Miss Begg, \$2.00; Mr. C. D. Corey, \$1.00; Mrs. Watt, 50c.; Mrs. Da Costa, Easter Lilies. It is sometimes suggested that flowers could be left out of the Easter decorations, but as St. George's Church was the first Church in Toronto to decorate, it seems very late in the day to omit doing so now. Of course it is sometimes very hard to make both ends meet under the increased expenses, but so far the Sanctuary Guild has managed to do so, and whereas in the past they were given a special Sunday for extra offertory; now owing to the special appeals at Eastertide this offertory had to be stopped, so the Guild will always be most grateful for any extra subscriptions towards their fund.

REPORT OF ST. GEORGE'S BRANCH, 1903-1904.

This branch was organized in 1885, and ranks among the first branches formed by the Woman's Auxiliary. For eighteen years the same work has been carried on by its members under careful Presidents and Officers, assisted by active workers in the Dorcas department.

The membership has fluctuated from time to time, leaving a sweet memory of those who have passed away, and a regret that circumstances have compelled others to sever connection with it. Weekly sewing meetings are held from October to April, with a brief interval for Christ-

mas holidays. The inclement weather has prevented four meetings, and reduced the number to eighteen, average attendance sixteen. Branch membership amounts to ninety-one.

The third Monday in each month is devoted to business, the President announces all communications from the Diocesan board, these are discussed and opinions expressed, the Treasurer's statements are given, correspondence read, also the notes taken during the monthly Board meetings. The President extends a cordial welcome to the members who cannot attend each week, to come once a month, and thus keep in touch with the obligations placed upon her, and also help to further the work we have in hand.

One special duty, and willingly discharged, is to provide clothing, groceries, and Christmas gifts for distant or Diocesan Missions. Two bales are sent to St. Luke's Mission, Qu'Appelle Diocese, one in May, the other in November. The former contained 57 new articles of clothing, and 39 second-hand, also groceries value \$20.07, to which must be added freight and cartage. Value of bale sent in November, \$29.90. It contained 92 articles, 18 second-hand, 25 presents. These are for the children at the Gordon Indian School, under the care of Principal Williams, who desires to thank St. George's Branch for everything, especially the complete outfit for four Indian boys.

The Diocesan Dorcas Secretary asked for Christmas presents for Mountain Lake Mission, Toronto Diocese. 36 gifts, 44 articles of new clothing, and many second-hand, made a bale valued at \$12. This was most gratefully acknowledged by Rev. G. D. Summerhayes, of Minden.

Another bale was sent to Shequana Indian Mission, Manitoulin Island, Algoma, valued at \$8.89. 23 articles of clothing and 56 gifts were sent, for which the missionary in charge returned his very grateful thanks. "Everything was so good."

A parcel of clothes was sent to the Central Rooms for the Indian Mission, Wapaska, which was destroyed by fire in November, leaving the inmates destitute and homeless.

Members who have kindly assisted to fill these bales can rest assured that they have gladdened the hearts of many, who need all that is given to them.

Another primary object in our organization is the fulfilment of the pledges, and \$130 is required for the four Missionary claims, \$75 for Diocesan Missions, \$25 for Temiscaming, \$30 equally divided between the Blackfoot Home and the Matron. This is an anxious care for our Treasurer, as the present subscribers are not sufficient

to make up the amount promised. The Emergency Fund is set apart to meet expenses for which there is no special provision. The first call on this reserve fund was a floral offering, a beautiful cross, an expression of sorrow and a tribute to the memory of our late Diocesan President, from the President and members of St. George's Branch. The boxes were redistributed after having been opened in March, the sum in many instances far exceeded a cent a week.

An invitation was sent to and accepted by the Diocesan Board last October to hold the monthly Board Meeting in St. George's Sunday School-room. On that occasion we had the honor of entertaining members of the Central Board of Management, and Mrs. Young from Athabaska. The duty of presenting a United Thank Offering at the Triennial Meeting in 1905 was strongly urged. The very small sum of five cents from each Auxiliary member was suggested. Will our members please bear this in mind, it only needs a little more self-denial. The offering will be devoted to the expansion of Church work in the North-West Territories. To save collecting at different times it can be given with the member's fees in October.

At the Semi-Annual W. A. Meeting held in Port Hope last November, our Branch was represented by Mrs. McMurray, who was told that the President of St. John's and St. Mark's Branches inaugurated "a pound party," and this was an opportunity to collect groceries, so successfully managed that some hundred pounds were packed in the Christmas bales. Would not this be an example for us to follow, soon after the autumn work begins?

Anyone who reads the leaflet must be struck with the special thanks returned for groceries and medicines. In the past, St. George's Branch has willingly responded to many appeals, which is an encouraging hope for the future. Number of subscribers to the Leaflet is 45.

Before closing this report, the President and Officers wish to thank all who have contributed money, materials, plain and fancy work, books, toys, donations, etc., or in any way assisted to promote Auxiliary work.

Prayer and work must, to show a healthy condition of our Auxiliary, keep pace with our increasing privileges in this work for God, and let us remember, it is the love of Christ that constraineth us.
