Prof. Adler has plans by which the new mother of the new race will be scientifically trained. She will be an improvement, an advanced expression of the divine purpose of motherhood.

"We may assume that every woman desires a calling, a central expression of her being, which is motherhood. She does not always recognize this at first. Girls who work in factories, in shops, in offices, pursue their calling for the most part listlessly or half-heartedly, but toward middle life we find most of them fulfilling their obligations to the new-born being whom they themselves were born to cherish. It is then they discover that a woman's greatest desire is to work for the best of her offspring.

"It is not enough, however, merely to have the will, the mother must know how to fulfil her desire. She must be able to have a knowledge of the mental life of the tiny baby, as also of the character molding of the child. Finding herself face to face with this tremendous problem she frequently realizes that she has no training, no adequate plan of active management has been set forth. Nature has provided a way of safety for the child by compelling mother love, so that the infant does not come into

That much motherhood accomplishes, but it is not enough, for look at the failures, in spite of the mother love that fostered them. The vocation of motherhood must, therefore, be recognized as imperative to the progress of the human race. There will be a new study in the vocation of motherhood, that I should call human horticulture, the evolution of natural laws by mental process of discovery and improvement in mother love. It is the mother who must be trained in guidance, even more than the child. The mother's contribution to the race is a child adored, but what more must she do? What are known in London as 'women's hostels" are said to be grow-"women's hostels" are said to be growing more numerous in the English metropolis and are helping to some extent in solving the problem of housing the underpaid woman worker.

The rent of a cubicle in a hostel, according to The London Times, averages about ninety cents a week, which rent must always be paid in advance. A reference is required with each intending resident from some responsible person, and the matron writes for this reference before the would-be resident takes up her abode at the hostel.



Was Hard to Find.



"It is the function of every great university," said the lecturer, "to discover for its students the why and the where fore of everything; the aim of every institution of learning is to try to discriminate. In the presentation of dragmatic masterpieces what part has the art? what part the actor?"

The Rhythms of Life.

"The Tempest" was spoken of as being Shakspere's conception of the evolution of all creative things, as the history of the evolution of the human soul. It forbade condemnation, saying that this was right and that this was wrong, but endeswored thru its arc to present all the rhythm of life. SEA TRAVEL SAFER

Many Important Recommendations Agreed Upon by U.S. Experts

WASHINGTON, Oct 28.—(Can Press.)—The U. S. delegation to the International Conference on Safety at Sea has agreed upon a program of measures to press upon that meeting, which will convene in London, New. 12. Probably 15 countries or more will participate in the conference, and the outcome is expected to be a co-operative movement among leading nations to safeguard lives and property in ocean traffic. The American delegation will urge as of first importance a greater number of watertisht compariments and bulkheads a subject on which British admiralty experts have been working at considerable expense for some time. Laws intended to be as rigid as possible to brace against defects in hull construction along this line, and yet not too drastic to interfere seriously with cargo requirements, are to be pressed.

Other reforms to be urged include a readjustment of steamship lanes on the ocean, changing the northern reutificat certain seasons, adequate protocotion against fire, a requirement that every ocean craft shall carry sumcient lifeboats and rafts to accommodate all passengers and crew, adequate wire less telegraphy equipment and managers.

Russian Refugee's Contrivance Saves Much Hard Labor.
