OTTAWA, Dec. 12-An official de nial was given this evening to the statement, published in Toronto and Winnipeg to-day, to the effect that Winnipes to-day, to the effect that the Dominion board of customs appraise. Sive years ago had secretly passed a resolution that invoices covering agricultural implements imported from the United States into Canada should be advanced five to temper cent, and upon this the duty levied, so that instead of Canadians paying the authorized duty of 17 1-2 per cent, they had paid from 20 to 25 per cent.

It was pointed out that the board of customs apprairs meets once a month, in public, not in secret. These meetings are usually attended by parties who have complaints to make regarding the exercise of the tariff, and points of difficulty which are continually cropping up.

It was stated that, two or three years ago, it was found necessary, in order to bring imports up to market value, to advance the invoice values of all goods entering Canada, consigned to territorial agents of firms in other countries, when these values were the agents prices, and not the market values.

The law says that goods must be appraised at market value. The order, which was published broadcast at the time, was welcomed as remedying an existing evil, and has not been appealed against.

SEA COAST OF BOHEMIA. Humorous Errors in Geography of the Older Writers.



MOUNT SINAL IDENTIFIED

Prof. Muell of Vienna Thinks He Has Solved a Great Biblical Puzzle.

VIENNA. Dec. 12.—Dr. Aiois Musil, who with a scientific party left Vieuna in April to explore Northern Arabia, has made a thoro examination of the little-known area from Maan southward to El Ghor and the Red Sea, and eastward to Jeima and the Warli Sishim. Besides the collections he has made, he has gathered much linguistic, ethnological and geological material.

He believes he has identified the ramous Biblical Mount Sinal, regarding the precise situation of which a great controversy has been raging for some time. Eminent geographers, notably Sir Richard Burton, have maintained that it is fulle to try to discover the exact spot, as all attempts at identification are necessarily vain.

It is maintained, however, that it is in

reporter, soldier, playwright and inventor. He was born at Fort Union, N.M., June 21, 1856, his father being Gen. James H. Carleton, an Indian fighter. After leaving Santa Clara College, California, he did some special writing for The San Francisco Chronicle, and then in accordance with his father's wishes, entered the army, taking part in several campaigns against the Indians, and in the cattle thief fights along the Rio Grande.

On resigning from the army he became associate editor of The New Orleans Times, later The Times-Democrat, and was the New Orleans correspondent of The New York Times in the yellow fever epidemic in 1878. From then until 1882 he worked for nwespapers in Chicago and New York, and in the latter year took editorial charge of Life.

The wrote his first play, "The Age of Gold," when he was 15. In 1880 he wrote "Memnon," a tragedy which was never produced. His next play, "The Lion's Mouth," was produced by Frederick Warde in 1891, and in 1884 Lester Wallack produced Carleton's "Victor Durand." After that came "The Pembertons," "Ye Earlie Trouble" "The Princess of Erie." "A Glided Fool." in which Nat Goodwin made a success. "The Butterflies," written at Charles Frohman's request for John Drew, and a success: "A Bit of Scandal," "Lem Kettle," "That Imprudent Young Couple," "Ambition," "Two Men. of Business," "Colnette" and adaptations of "Never Again," "Ladies First" and "The Girl From Maxim's," most of the latter for Charles Frohman.





C. N. O. Railway Gets Order From Railway Board, Approving it.

The company is to instal gates at Bramosa-road by June 15, to be operated day and night, the city to pay 20 per cent. of installation and maintenance. The plans of the new G.T.R. passenger station at Guelah were approved.

Price changes to-day were not significant compared with those at the end of last week. Speculative turns were impossible except to floor traders, and in may one or two instances was this possible for them.

The beginning of the week withessed about the average amount of business in domestic securities markets had a sluggish appearance in the late dealings. The abatement of election influences was reflected chiefly in consols which were strong. Covering took place in Grand Trunks, and Americans, which had been heavy in the official session, displayed a disposition to raily on the curb. Continental bourses closed steady.

Readjustment is Not Complete.

As to the future of the market, the outlook is promising for rather more activity and a fair advance, altho in view of leasened satisfactory conditions of business no very pronounced upward movement is yet in sight. Readjustment is not yet complete, and inflation has not been entirely eliminated, but there is nothing seriously unsound in the situation; and if commodities can only be brought to a more reasonable basis, there is nothing to prevent a restoration of business activity.— Henry Clews.

Dull Times and Lower Prices.

No improvement in the business situation is evident and the sentiment in commercial circles is pessimistic. In the stock market, after two weeks of reaction, the technical position shows for a swing, or, at least, a creep, upwards. We are approaching the period when much money will be released and bonds will probably be the favorite form of investment, which should make for more activity in these issues.—J. S. Bache & Co.

stating that a large majority of the engineers employed on the western roads had voted to strike, sent prices of active issues to the lowest level of the day, and caused a weak closing. Financial interests concurred in con-

mending President Tatt's judicial selections, and indulged in some conjecture with regard to their bearing on the more important anti-trust suits now pending. The attorney-general's annual report, devoting considerable space to the prosecutions undertaken against offending corporations, and his refusal to take drastic action in cases involving only technical infractions, was well received.

Reports dealing with western rail-road conditions during the past week indicate that traffic-is holding well on the lines west of Chicago, with some slight improvement in the section east of that centre. Local institutions called some loans, and their action found reflection in the slightly firmer tone for money on call. Domestic exports, for November showed fairly large increases in shipments of corn and cotton, with an extraordinary failing off ir wheat. Shipments of this cereal were over 5,000,000 bushels below November, 1909. Total exports of foodstuffs for the 11 months of the calendar year are less by over 50,000,000,000 bushels than in the corresponding pariod of last year.
