

Finally, on Dec. 28, a lock-out against the union tailors was declared, and then a reference to the Board of Arbitration was asked by the journeymen.

From all that has transpired before the arbitrators they are of the opinion that if at the commencement of the dispute or within a short there would have been no great difficulty in the way of reaching a result satisfactory to both parties."

As many of the locked-out tailors as could regain their situations have taken out work from their old employers. Mr. R. J. Score, who was interviewed yesterday, said: "Those who have returned to work have been taken on as non-union men. The Merchant Tailors' Association, after the refusal of the men to sign the proposed agreement, refused to deal with them as an organization and they are being given work only as non-union tailors."


