THEY SING "AMEN" NO MORE.

Toronto Junction Presbyterians Protest Against the "Amen" in the New Book of Praise.

The members of Victoria Presbyterian Church, Toronto Junction, do not appear to be at all unanimous in sounding the "Amen" at the end of the hymns in the new book of praise. Yesterday morning was the third Sunday since this new book has been in the hands of the congregation, and after the close of the first hymn there was a little diversion from the ordinary routine of the Presbyterian service. Mr. T. G. Wilson, a respected member of the congregation, was noticed to sit down in his pew before the rest of the congregation drew out the "Amen" and, as soon as they were seated, he arose to protest against the use of the "Amen" in the Presbyterian Church, as savouring of Episcopalianism. The church is a very large one, and its acoustic properties are not of the best, hence, when Mr. Rae's hands were crossed in supplication to the most High, Mr. Wilson's sudden jump to the floor very naturally created a little unlooked-for surprise. However, the "Amen" was sung until the end of the service. Then the session met, and in deference to the views of members in the congregation they decided that the "Amen" should not be sung in future; and now there is a "lost chord" at the end of each hymn.

The Action of the Town of Welland Against William Dismissed With Costs - To-Day's Lists

Chief Justice Meredith gave judgment in Welland v. Willson, tried at Welland, dismissing with costs the action of the corporation. The learned chief justice is of opinion that the plaintiffs have failed to establish the existence of a natural or legal water course, and the waters which the defendant is charged with obstructing the flow are mere surface waters, not flowing in any defined channel or having banks containing them.

The chief justice also gave judgment in Trenton Electric Company v. Town of Trenton, dismissing the action, without costs. Justice Ross gave judgment in Hurdman v. White, tried at Ottawa. He holds to the opinion expressed at trial that the defendant in question has not established the facts which he alleges. He dismisses the points raised at the trial on that point which may have a reference to the judgment and that he elect further directions and costs are reserved, but otherwise the action is dismissed with costs.
