IMPOSSIBLE TO SAVE ANYTHING.

About Two Hundrd and Fifty Hands Have Been Thrown Out of Employment.

St. Catharines, Jan. 2.-Just about 9 o'clock room of the Toronto Rubber Shoe Manufacturing Compuny's works at Port Dalhouse. Every effort was made to stop the fire, but this could not be done, so then the efforts of the employes were directed to preventing the spread of the fiames to the main building. For a time it looked as if their efforts would be successful, but the fire communicated wan the varnish room, and then it was all over. Enforts were directed towards saving the manufactured stock in the building, and much of this was got out, though all the goods in process of manufacture were destroyed.

A strong wind was blowing and fanned the flames to fierce heat, and the quantity of oils, naptha, etc., augmented the fury of the fire. The flames communicated with the Wood grist mill, and this was totally destroyed, in addition to the oil house of the rubber factory across the road. All the hands were at work when the fire broke out. No one was hurt seriously, though William Crawford badly sprained his ankies by jumping from a window. What was this morning a fine building and a hive of industry is to-night a smouldering mass of ruins.







United States Failures in 1898.

Failures in the year 1898 have been 12,192 in number, with liabilities amounting to \$148,684,251, against \$182,581,771 in 1897.

\$276,814,975 in 1896, \$192,906,270 in 1895, and \$198,658,891 in 1894. In this statement banking failures are included, with liabilities of \$18,705,580, against \$28,249,700 last year and \$50,718,915 in 1896. The commercial failures were 12,112 in number and \$120,984,251 in amount, against \$134,332,071 last year and \$226,096,069 in 1896. Manufacturing were \$56,761,692, against \$34,492,071 last year and \$93,463,851 in 1896, and trading were \$61,896,943, against \$34,490,098 last year and \$100,046,620 in 1896. The ratio of defaults to solvent payments is only \$1.80, against \$2,60 last year and \$4.27 in 1896. [The number of failures, 1.06 percent, of the firms reported in business, though smaller than in any other year since 1892, is somewhat swelled by the multitude of small traders who start without adequate conital, so that the average liabilities per failure is smaller than in any other year of the 24 for which full records exist.
