TWENTIETH YEAR

JOHN SHAW SCORES

There Was a Hot Hustle for
Votes at the Last.

25,399 BALLOTS WERE CAST

Shaw Polled 11,341, Macdonald 10,253
and McMurrich Got 3805.

The Old City Council Practically
Goes Back, Only Two Men Who
Sought Re-Election Being De-
feated, viz Leslie and Richar-
dson in Ward No. 1—Ald. O. B.
Sheppard Got a Whopper in Ward
No. 3—Ex-Ald. Steiner Takes the
Seat Formerly Occupied by Ald.
McMurrich—Notes of the Fight.

The majority fight in Toronto yesterday
was one of the hottest on record, the total
vote cast being 25,399. Of this aggregate
Mayor Shaw received 11,341, E. A. Mac-
donald 10,253 and Ald. McMurrich 3805.

A year ago the total vote polled for the
mayorcy was 21,042, the figures being Shaw
12,646, Macdonald 8400.

This is Mayor Shaw's third term, while
E. A. Macdonald goes down for the third
time and Ald. McMurrich has met his sec-
ond defeat in the race for the Mayor's
chair. Ald. McMurrich has not yet an-
nounced his intentions for next year, but
Macdonald writes that he's already in the
race.

FEARFUL TY IN COREA

Anti-Russian Party Have Resorted to Outrageous Torture and
Followed It Up by Murder in Order to Shield Themselves.

London, Jan. 3.—The St. Petersburg cor-
respondent of The Novoye Vremya
at Seoul, the Korean capital, relates ter-
rible crimes by the anti-Russian party,
viz, since the departure of the Russian
financiers and drill instructors, have wreck-
ed vengeance, by vile deeds and barbarous
cruelty, on the Korean ex-Dragonman of
the Russian Embassy, the official who at-
tempted the removal of the Korean Em-
peror to the Russian Mission House.

The official, his wife and other Koreans
were mercilessly tortured, with a view of
compelling them to confess to a false charge
of poisoning the Emperor's coffee, in order
to shield the real criminals, who are among
the high officials. The ex-Dragonman was
finally brutally murdered, mutilated pub-
licly, and made sport of in a savage and
disgusting manner. All this, the writer
says, occurred in a country blessed with
American and other Christian missionaries,
and where American officials occupy im-
portant posts in the Korean Government ser-
vice.

With the noise-wave had begun to re-
cede you caught—

AN AWFUL PREDICAMENT

Coal Shaft Caught Fire and Caused
a Terrible Scare, Though No
Loss of Life.

Carlinville, Ill., Jan. 2.—The shaft of the
Carlinville Coal Company caught fire to-
day by a can of lubricating oil being
heated on a stove in the top of the shaft.
A strong wind blew through the shafts
to all parts of the wooden works, which
are on an acre of ground. The fire caught
in the pulleys, and there was no water
in the mines. The men were in a panic,
and many fled to the shaft. One
hundred men were rescued, but
were unable to see to the shaft. The
fire pulled out four of those who got
into the shaft. The loss will aggregate
\$10,000.

WERE IN AN ICEBOATING PARTY

Burlington Bay Adds to Its Victims
Peter McKenna, Aged 38, and
John Dorman, Aged 13.

Hamilton, Jan. 2.—To-night two persons
were added to the list of victims who
died in the ice on Burlington Bay this
winter. Their names are Peter McKenna,
who boarded at Wm. Dillon's hotel, Bay-
street North, and John Dorman, John-street
North. The former was 38 years of age
and the latter 13. They were sailing in
Dillon's iceboat about 7 o'clock with five
other persons, including John Hinchcliffe,
McCauley-street. McKenna was at the
helm, and ran the boat into open water,
being unable to see to the darkness, at a
point midway between the slip at McNa-
bney-street and Bay View Park wharf. Hin-
chcliffe pulled out four of those who got
into the water. The two men who were drown-
ed got under the hull of the boat and could
not get out.

PETE POLLOCK KILLED.

Did Not See the Fast Express on
the M. C. R. Approaching and
Drove on the Track.

Dunville, Jan. 2.—Peter Pollock was
killed this evening while attempting to
cross the M.C.R. tracks in Moulton.
A freight was standing across the road,
and when it backed out of the way Pollock
drove on the track, not seeing the fast
train approaching on the other track. The
train struck the wagon, killing him in-
stantly.

His Injuries Proved Fatal.

Robert Russell, the man who was ter-
ribly hurt by a huge block falling on his
head on Saturday evening last while working
in the new plant on Dundas-street, died
last night in the Western Hospital, after
regaining consciousness. Deceased was 20
years of age and boarded at 521 Adelaide-
street west. He was unmarried. Corner-
er will hold an inquest this afternoon at
the hospital.

IMPOSSIBLE TO SAVE ANYTHING.

About Two Hundred and Fifty Hands Have Been Thrown Out of Employment.

St. Catharines, Jan. 2.—Just about 9 o'clock this morning fire broke out in the boiler room of the Toronto Rubber Shoe Manufacturing Company's works at Port Dalhousie.

A strong wind was blowing and fanned the flames to fierce heat, and the quantity of oil, asphalt, etc., augmented the fury of the fire.

The whole of the Toronto Rubber Company's buildings, with the plant and a large amount of raw material was consumed by fire this morning.

The fire was caused by a boiler exploding, which was caused by the boiler being overfilled with water.

CANADA'S NICKEL INDUSTRY

Mr. S. J. Ritchie Shows How There Can Be a Great Future for it in Europe.

HOW A MONOPOLISTIC COMPANY

Editor World: The policy of imposing export duties upon nickel and copper matte, the refining and manufacture of nickel and copper and the manufacture of nickel steel in Canada are still vital and important questions. The people who for ten years have...

be done in Canada, and England would then buy the refined matte as well as its manufactured forms from Canada, and as already stated, she now neither buys the matte nor the refined nickel.

You will want the proof of this. Let me give it to you: The history of nickel with steel, making the product known as nickel steel, is now assuming immense proportions in European countries and the United States.

Why should Canada seek it? The United States imports nickel matte from Europe. The matte is refined in Europe, and the refined nickel is then imported into the United States.

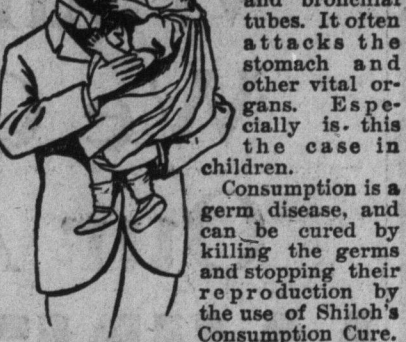
