HAMILTON NEWS

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STRIKERS DECLARE MEN ARE STAYING OUT

—Officials Announce the Return of Many.

TRAIN WRECKED AT CRANBROOK.

Two Sectionmen Arrested at Fredrickton, N.B.—Reports From Along the Line.

In the Canadian Pacific Railway men's strike both sides continue to claim to be winning. There is as wide a difference as ever in the reports handed in by the men and the officials as to the situation of the strike. The men in Toronto appear as confident as ever that they will win and are holding out to a man.

Yesterday Chairman Wilkinson of the local strike committee stated that he had not received any notice as to any men returning on the system outside of Toronto. He was sure that the strikers would not return until the demands were acceded to.

Engineer William T. Upham of the C.P.R. yesterday stated that the engineers had not endorsed the action of the trackmen in striking.

A meeting of representatives of the various railroad organizations was held yesterday afternoon at the Hotel Cecil. A report was given as to what, if anything, was done.

Chief Justice Bradley yesterday reported that on the line west of Toronto 27 men had returned to work. On the other divisions the men said the officials were giving back.

Wrecked a Train.

New Brunswick. The Commercial has the following special from Vancouver: Word was received from Nelson, B.C., yesterday that some of the thousand trackmen on strike on the Canadian Pacific Railroad wrecked a train at Cranbrook.

The engine was a heavy freight "O. K." at the Cranbrook. They then opened the switch, and as the engine jumped the track they fired volley of stones into the engine, and it fell down the embankment and was wrecked.

The engine was dragged from the embankment and the train was recovered.

Storekeepers Wandering.

MONEY FOR STEEL STRIKE.

Lodges Being Assembled to Prepare for the Big Strike—Fund in Now \$300,000.

Pittsburg, July 2.—President Shaffer says no decided results from the steel strike are expected for ten days or two weeks. Lodges have been instructed to pay assessments on their members to prepare for the big struggle. The strike fund amounts now to \$300,000.

The cutting of prices by the combine is said to have had a deep effect on the independent manufacturers who have signed the strikers' scale.

REGRET MR. ALLAN'S DEATH.

Directors of the Merchants' Bank of Canada Passed a Resolution of Condolence.

Montreal, July 2.—(Special.)—The directors of the Merchants' Bank of Canada have passed the following resolution: "That the board have heard with deep regret of the death of their esteemed president, Mr. Andrew Allan. He was one of the original founders of the bank, and its president for the last fifteen years. He was remarkable for the conscientious discharge of all his duties, and for his unassuming manner, and sound judgment. His kindly disposition, his mild and fair contact with everyone with whom he came in contact, his high character, his integrity, and his long life in public service, his deep sense of the great loss which the community at large, the directors, and the bank have sustained, and his personal sympathy and cordial relations with the family and relatives of the deceased, to whom the chief consolation can only be the honored name which the deceased has left behind."

LEADER BORDEN'S BANQUET.

Halifax, N.S., July 2.—Mr. R. L. Borden, M.P., leader of the Opposition, was banqueted to-night by the Liberal-Conservatives of this city at the Halifax Hotel. Over 200 couples were laid. Speeches were made by Mr. Borden, H. A. Townshend, M.P.; P. D. Monk, M.P. of Quebec; A. C. Bell, M.P., and Messrs. Wilcox and Turner, M.P.s. The affair was a big success.

CAUGHT LIKE RATS.

Pittsburg, July 2.—Ten boys were caught like rats in a trap in a tunnel leading to the old Kooling Mine, owned by the Pittsburg Coal Company, today. Two were killed and eight were overcome by the fumes of the place. Anthony Miller, aged 15, was killed instantly and Patrick Gallagher, aged 14, died at the hospital within an hour. The boys who were overcome will recover.

LIGHTNING KILLS THREE.

St. Louis, July 2.—A bolt of lightning instantly killed three men, fatally injured a boy, seriously injured a man and a boy, members of a St. Louis fishing party, who had sought refuge from the fierce storm of this afternoon beneath the shelter of a massive sycamore tree on the banks of Dead Creek, at Cahokia, Ill.

HELPLESS ARMENIANS.

Constantinople, July 2.—Reports from Mush, in Kurdistan, say that the Kurds are plundering villages and have killed 14 Armenians in the course of the pillage. The latter number of a Kurdish noble who was murdered at Agha.

GERMANTOWN ROLLED UP 297 AGAINST 168 AND THE VISITORS FOLLOWED ON.

SECOND INNINGS YIELDED 197.

QUACKERS HAD PLENTY OF WICKETS TO SPARE, BUT NOT THE TIME TO SCORE 60 RUNS.

Philadelphia, July 2.—The Canadian cricket team concluded its second game here today with the Germantown Club, the result being a draw. The Quakers yesterday batted first and rolled up a total of 297. Against this the Canadians made 168 for four wickets. At this stage of the game the Canadian batsmen were going in the third wicket down and remaining till the end, being the last man out. The Quakers also played well, making 60 in 25 minutes.

This gave the Canadians a lead of 60, with Germantown at bat in hand. The local men essayed the impossible task of trying to break down the Canadian batsmen. In this they failed, and lost three wickets for 19 runs.

PLAN TO CONTROL THE BITUMINOUS PRODUCT IS CREDITED TO MORGAN.

Cleveland, July 2.—Before the 1st of September all the big companies producing bituminous coal will have been gathered into one organization, similar to the United States Steel Corporation, according to a story printed in The Leader today. The capitalization will be enormous, probably only to that of the steel trust. As an auxiliary to this movement being carried on by the promoters of one of the constituent companies of the great organization, a pool of all the retail soft-coal interests in Cleveland will be effected within the next ten days.

J. P. Morgan started this combination three years ago, making the first movements along the line of controlling the production of the Ohio and West Virginia fields. One year ago all the coal properties in the Pittsburgh district that ship coal to the lakes were collected into one organization, known as the Pittsburgh Coal Company, and all the coal that ship coal down the river formed the Monongahela Coal Company. In Chicago ten days ago was formed the Illinois Coal Company, which owns two-thirds of the coal land in Illinois and western Indiana. About the same time M. A. Hanna and others completed the absorption of most of the coal properties in the Massillon district.

These concerns are all to be collected into one big organization, which will be the accomplishment of this end Mr. Morgan is said to have given himself without reserve and will take up the work as soon as he returns from Europe.

RUSSIAN SCHEME MAY SUCCEED.

Finally Finds a Way to Secure of Station in the Gulf.

Therian, July 2.—Mira Bala Khan, Persian Minister at St. Petersburg, has begun negotiations with the Russian government for the purpose of obtaining a loan of 20,000,000 roubles (\$10,000,000). It is stated that, should Russia comply with the request, security will be offered in the shape of the customs revenues of the Port of Bender-Abbas in the Persian Gulf.

Russia has long desired to obtain a foothold in the Gulf of Persia, and her aspirations for that quarter have hitherto been baffled by Great Britain. Some time ago the Russian government, through the British Premier, told the British people that they might expect to see history made in the region of the Persian Gulf. The British government, however, followed the Russian request to the purpose of obtaining a loan of 20,000,000 roubles (\$10,000,000). It is stated that, should Russia comply with the request, security will be offered in the shape of the customs revenues of the Port of Bender-Abbas in the Persian Gulf.
