Strong Protectionist Speech Delivered By the Member for North Norfolk in House of Commons on Monday, February 24.

John Charlton, M.P., (N. Norfolk), delivered his notable speech on "Reciprocity in Trade" in the House of Commons on Monday, Feb. 24. Following is Hansard's report of his speech:

Mr. John Charlton (North Norfolk) moved:

"That this House is of the opingion that Canadian import duties in the same year were \$40,000,000, while the exports from the United States were \$28,000,000, will et he exports from the United States, to enormous trade transactions. 




