DAMAGES FOR FALSE ARREST

Arthur Reesor of Markham Township Will Have to Pay \$100 to John Clodd.

THE "DIGGER" CASES ON THURSDAY

True Bills Against Lewis D. Bailey and Harvey W. Rummen—Cases in Court of Appeal.

The grand jury of the Criminal Sessions on Tuesday returned true bills against two former conductors employed by the Toronto Railway Company. The men indicted are: Louis D. Bailey, charged with these thefts: April 19, 25 cents; May 20, 15 tickets; June 5, 5 tickets; retaining 148 tickets during the month of June. Harvey W. Rummen, May 6, 8 tickets; May 17, \$2 and 15 tickets; May 24, \$2; June 3, 43 tickets. There are fifteen such cases against as many men, and some of them are charged with more than one offence. They are known as the "digger" cases. The trial of Bailey and Rummen will probably commence tomorrow morning.

Rehearsal in Barber Shop. In May last John Brown of Malton, Peel County, came to Toronto with \$300 in his inside pocket. He brought it down to pay for a little village home. He put it all in the bank except \$50, which he kept with him. Some one whom he can't recall, took him by the arm, told him to come and have a hair-cut. He was escorted to O'Brien's barber shop on Yonge street against his will, thrust into a chair, and a hair-cut was made. While he was in the chair another barber, who has not been found since, snatched Brown's roll of bills from his pocket, inch meanwhile, holding the customer. This story was told to a jury in the Criminal Sessions, where Inch was on trial on Tuesday charged with stealing the money, or having a hand in the theft. The evidence was all in when the court adjourned.

Judgment for False Arrest. A jury in the Civil Assizes awarded John Clodd of Markham Township \$100 damages in his action against Arthur Reesor for alleged defamation, character and false arrest. It was claimed that Reesor had accused Clodd of stealing \$25 of the funds of the Sunday school and caused him to be detained by County Constable Burns until the case was investigated. Clodd's boots did not correspond with the footprints of the thief, and he was released. Littlejohn v. Tool was settled, and Stone v. Brooks, Abraham v. Toronto Railway Company and Edmondson v. London Free Press were adjourned to the next court.

Appeal Against Award. The appeal of the Kingston Heat, Light and Power Company from the judgment of Mr. Justice Louth, upholding the refusal of three arbitrators to allow the company \$80,000 for their franchise, which was taken over, together with their property, by the city of Kingston, was heard in the Court of Appeal. Judgment was reserved.

HELP FOR FIREMEN'S WIDOWS.

Trustees of Permanent Fund Decide as to Distribution. The trustees of the Firemen's Permanent Benefit Fund met in the Mayor's office Tuesday afternoon. There were present: His Worship the Mayor, A. E. Ames, H. D. P. Armstrong, Chief John Thompson and Secretary Jarvis. The merits of those desiring to participate in the fund were considered with the following results:

During the year commencing Aug. 8, 1902 the following sums will be disbursed monthly, viz.: Widow of F. G. Russell, \$80 per month; widow of Harry Clarke, \$50 per month; widow of Walter Colford, \$15 per month; the husbands of the above perished in the McIntosh fire; the orphan children of D. J. Nolan, who perished in the Lindebeck fire in March last, \$30 per month; the widow of Thomas Deacon, who lost his life at the fires here, \$12 per month.

The City Treasurer was instructed to make payments accordingly. It was also decided to have the City Solicitor draft a form of legislation to provide for the incorporation of the trustees pursuant to the trust deed, for the ratification of the city's grant and the future administration of the fund. Several other applications were considered, but were found to be excluded from the benefits under the terms of the trust.

NEW MEN FOR POLICE FORCE.

Commissioners Send Up a Number of Applicants for Examination. The Board of Police Commissioners, at a meeting held on Tuesday afternoon, examined a number of applicants with a view to bringing the force up to the establishment of 300. These were sent in for medical examination: J. H. Cotton, F. Reilly, H. E. Power, C. H. Pencock, W. J. Horan, G. Cook, M. MacIntyre, W. J. O'Rourke, G. E. Ewin, A. Specht, A. Sothorn, E. Koster, H. O. Latremouille, W. Chappelle and J. F. Marshall.

A number of expressions petitioned for a higher tariff, particularly for moving furniture. A legal question is involved, and the matter was referred to the City Solicitor. The tariff for automobiles will be treated the same as for two-horse carriages. President McNair wrote, thanking the police for their services at the Exhibition grounds. Inspector Hall, who was in charge, was highly spoken of. Contrary to expectations, no promotion was made to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Sgt. Waughan and the promotion of Patrol Sgt. Watson.

LIVING WALL OF PICKETS.

How the Striking Miners Put it About Idle Collieries. Mahanoy City, Sept. 23.—Wed in its working and effective in its execution is the new plan adopted by the striking miners to checkmate the attempts of the operators to resume work at the North Mahanoy and St. Nicholas collieries. In brief, the idea is the shutting out of non-union workmen from these mines by a living wall of strikers.

So complete is the blockade made by thousands of pickets that no one has run in the last forty hours. Deputies with ready Winchester rifles and rifles that are eager for the trigger, nightly chafe on the inside of the picket circle, while the men of the Second Troop of Philadelphia City Cavalry gallop restlessly along its outer side.

Death is in the Air. In the darkest hours of the night begins the situation becomes tense. Moments of wounding and death is in the air at the hands of indignant strikers for the non-unionist who attempts to pass thru the lines, death for the strikers when violence brings rifles and sabres to the rescue.

As the double and sometimes triple line of pickets maintains its nightly vigil, the men keep in touch with each other by the calling of regular intervals and by meeting at regular intervals at the ends of prescribed beats. As they move along in total darkness the silence is relieved by the telling of stories or, maybe, the spirited singing of "The Red Rover" by a party of Welsh miners, or the humming of a Lithuanian.

The pickets have been out since 9 o'clock, and their vigil will not end until long after daybreak, but there is no complaining. The stress of war is on the souls of these men, and they know neither fear nor fatigue. To them the strike is a struggle, not only for their own daily bread, but for the betterment and independence of their children.

Non-Unionist Held-Up. A slight commotion brings together a dozen of the pickets nearest to the point of disturbance. The others are too well disciplined to leave their posts. A man carrying a bag, screen and hat, has been caught trying to slip thru the line.

Who is he, Jim? "Shut your mouth! Do you want to bring the soldiers on us. Now, you tell us quick who you are and what you are doing here." "Me do coal pick. Me no scab."

In an instant, the bag is emptied and its contents examined. If the man proves to be only a coal picker, he is sent home with a warning not to go out on the cum dump until after 9 o'clock in the morning. If it is found that he intended to work in the mine, he is urged to give up his non-union employment and join the union.

Vigilance Prevents Clash. That there has been no serious clash between the pickets and deputies nor between the pickets and troops is due to the untiring vigilance of a peace committee whose duty it is to repress all forms of violence. The danger is that of these line pickets, who are peace committee will not be able to check the anger of the men or that some over-zealous deputy or trooper will shoot into the pickets. The direct consequence of any one of these occurrences will be general ructions, shooting down of unarmed men and a riot that will startle the nation and precipitate the settlement of the strike.

Halifax Regiment Disbanded. Ottawa, Sept. 23.—A special militia order was issued this afternoon disbanding the Special Service Battalion, Royal Canadian Regiment, at Halifax. Lieut.-Col. White will resume control of the St. John military district and the officers of the permanent corps will resume duty at their former stations. There will be vacancies for 250 men in the permanent corps if they desire to re-enlist.

Improved Service—No Increase in Fare. The addition of a dining car on evening train from Toronto for New York has materially improved the service, but the fare remains the same and is no higher than other lines. As C.P.T. agents about it.

WOULD LIKE STANLEY PARK

Proposal to Add a Portion of the King-St. Playground to the Cattle Market.

DEALERS ARE NOT SATISFIED

Tenders to Be Asked for Cold Storage Plant for St. Lawrence Market—City Hall Notes.

A proposal to use the lower portion of Stanley Park as an extension to the cattle market was discussed Tuesday afternoon by a sub-committee of the Property Committee, and it did not meet with very much favor. A plan showing that part of Stanley Park south of King-street laid out in an addition to the cattle market was presented by City Commissioner Coatsworth, who recommended it. It would cost \$28,000, and would provide \$8,000. If the extension was made it would amply provide for the expansion of the market for several years.

He thought that this space could be turned into office space, and that the building would have to be enlarged.

Liquor Men Call for Funds. Ontario Dealers Will Give \$35,000 to Fight Prohibition. Secretary E. Dickie of the Ontario Licensee's Association has issued a circular to the trade, calling for funds with which to put up a fight against the referendum. Toronto dealers have been assessed for \$100 each to meet the expenses of the campaign, and as there are 214 of them the sum received from this source alone will be \$21,400. Other Ontario cities, according to the assessment, will provide \$8,500, and members elsewhere other than in towns and cities will come up to the extent of \$5,000, so that the funds immediately available will be in the neighborhood of \$35,000. The first assessment will be levied on Oct. 5, being payable in two equal instalments. Of course, this will not include what the brewers and distillers will give, but \$35,000, with the aid of the Ross handling, ought to go a long way towards putting the temperance question out of action on the first of next December.
