Report of the Directors For the year ending December 1st, 1870.

THE Directors of the HALIFAX DISPENSARY, at the commencement of another year, beg leave to present, for the information of the subscribers, the Corporation, and the Legislature-from which sources their funds are deriveda brief account of the working of the Institution since the date of their last report. They feel satisfied that all con cerned will agree, after perusing the annexed document from the Medical Board, that money was never better bestowed in the city of Halifax than that which has been applied to this Institution. When it is considered that no less than fourteen medical practitioners-eleven of them gratuitously-have been engaged from year's end to year's end, in carrying out the objects of this charity; that on every day of the year, the poor and the stranger, afflicted by disease, have resorted to the Dispensary for relief if able to come, or otherwise have been attended to in their squalid dwellings; that in this way no less than 6,164 applications have been received, 2,902 visits paid, 7,052 prescriptions dispensed; 346 prescriptions for other charitable institutions; and 507 cases of dentistry attended to; besides a large number of vaccinations during the small pox visitation; and when the long catalogue of diseases dealt with by the medical officers of the Institution,

as detailed in the annexed list, is perused, the Directors feel that no further argument is necessary to elicit the continued and enlarged support of the charitable community of Halifax. What indeed, it may be asked, would have become of these thousands of sick and suffering poor if the doors of our Institution had been shut against them? Some might have had their wants relieved gratuitously through the well known humanity of our city practitioners; but it would have been utterly impossible for them. in addition to their private practice, thus to overtake onetenth part of the work now performed at the Dispensary, even if the same certainty and readiness of access could have been insured to the applicants. Now, however, they all know where to find relief, and when the midday gun gives the signal that their Bethesda-their house of mercy-provided for them by the public and private bounty of our country, is open, they may be seen, of all ages, and both sexes, the lame and the halt and the blind, wending their way to the place where they are sure to find those in attendance who will do their best to help their infirmities, and, from the plentiful stock of medicines at their disposal, will send home with the poor patients, the needful remedies for their manifold ills. Whoever desires to satisfy himself of the necessity of this Dispensary, and of its practical working, should drop in between 12 and 1 o'clock, and take note of the class of applicants there to be daily found, and of the systematic attention which is promptly given by the Physicians in the front, and the Apothecary in the rear, to the motley group that come to be relieved. And here the Directors beg to call the attention of the Meeting and of the public to the absolute necessity for providing at once, a suitable building for the purposes of the Dispensary. A giance at the premises now in occupation is enough to convince any one of their absolute unfitness, as to their surroundings, capacity, healthiness or any

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thing else, for a Dispensary enjoying the patronage of the Legislature, the civic Corporation and the wealthy and charitable inhabitants of the city of Halifax.

It is absolutely necessary, for the credit of the community, and the comfort and health of the medical men employed, the suitable accommodation of the patients, and a due regard to their classification, that the establishment be removed as soon as possible to some more eligible building. In this connection the Directors call attention to the suggestion of the Medical Board as to the desirableness of obtaining the present Engine House, if the City Corporation will grant it, when vacated by the Fire Companies. The Directors lost no time in sending an earnest application to the City authorities on the subject, and it is hoped that they will accede to it. If that plan proves impracticable, then it is hoped that a vigorous appeal will be made to the community to obtain means for the erection of such a building as will be worthy of the object, and ornamental to the city of Halifax. A suggestion has been thrown out, which has very generally commended itself, that such a building might not only promote the interests of the Institution, but be converted into a suitable memorial of those lamented fellow-citizens who, in the inscrutable dealing of Providence found a watery grave about a year ago, some of them long associated with the benevolent enterprises of our community. Among these the Directors feel that the name of Mr. John Barron, one of their own members, is deserving of special remembrance, as having always taken a personal interest in the institution, and as having expressed the hope, just before he left us, never to return, that a suitable building for its reception might be erected. Such was also the earnest desire of another

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s havn, and never might nother friend of the poor, the late Mr. Brookfield, who has also passed away. Now that they are gone, may those that remain, and are perhaps soon to follow them, be up and doing in this and every other good work, while the short day of life lasteth.

In conclusion, it only remains for the Directors to commit the Institution under their care to the continued patronage, the sympathy, and the prayers of all christian people in this community, confined as it is to no sect or creed, or nationality—that the blessing of Him who is the Creator and the great Physician of ALL may rest upon it in the future as in the past, and make it instrumental to the relief of His poor who dwell among us.

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL BOARD.

The Medical Board of the Halifax Dispensary beg leave to submit the following as their Report for the year ending November 30th, 1870:

The number of patients treated at the Dispensary has been one thousand seven hundred and sixty-four, while seven hundred and twenty-seven have been visited at their homes. The entire number of applications for advice at the Dispensary, and visits made, amounts to six thousand one hundred and sixty-four; of these three thousand three hundred and one have been treated at the Dispensary, and two thousand nine hundred and two at their places of residence.

The number of prescriptions dispensed by the Apothecary for Dispensary patients during the year, amounts to

seven thousand and fifty-two; and those for other charitable institutions, three hundred and forty-six. Five hundred and seven dental cases have been treated at the Dispensary. Appended is an alphabetically arranged list of the diseases treated, the number of deaths, fourteen in all, and their cause.

The Medical Board would again call the attention of the Directors to the want of proper accommodation, and would urge the necessity of its being obtained as early as possible.

The Board would suggest that as the Engine-house on the south-west corner of the Parade will, in all probability, be soon vacated by the Engine Companies now occupying it, your body should make application as early as convenient to the proper authorities, to ascertain if that building cannot be obtained, and rendered available for the use of this charitable institution.
