

SYNOPSIS OF MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION.

The annual meeting of the congregation was held on the

evening of Monday, Jan. 16.

Before commencing the business, devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. Dr. McTavish, who then announced his intention of vacating the chair. Mr. R. Donald was, thereupon, requested to preside, and the Secretary of the Managers was appointed Secretary to the meeting.

The report of the Session for the past year was presented by Dr. McTavish, who moved its adoption, seconded by Mr.

H. Meldrum. Carried.

The adoption of the annual report of the Managers was moved by Mr. Donald, seconded by Mr. Creelman and carried.

Reports of the results of the work carried on during the year by the various organizations connected with the church, were presented and adopted, and it was decided that these, in addition to the reports of the Session and Managers, should be printed in pamphlet form and distributed among the members of the congregation.

It was also decided that a full list of the names of all the members and adherents of the congregation, together with the names of the members of their respective families, should be

embodied in the printed report.

A motion was made to the effect that the number of Managers should be reduced from sixteen to twelve, six being elected this year instead of eight, and six next year. The proposition was not acceptable to the congregation, however, and the motion was withdrawn.

The following gentlemen were elected by acclamation to act on the Board of Managers during the next two years, viz., Messrs. C. B. Petry, L. M. Livingston, Jas. Hedley, A. H. Crawford, W. D. Wilson, Donald Bain, F. C. L. Jones,

and G. H. Meldrum.

Votes of thanks to the members of the choir and auditors for valuable services rendered during the year, and to the ladies of the church for providing the excellent entertainment which preceded the meeting, were unanimously passed.

REPORT OF THE SESSION.

The year that has just closed has been marked by opposite experiences of sorrow and gladness. Death has visited a number of our homes and carried off some whom we would all naturally have wished to have continued with us. The "In Memoriam" list appended to this report, containing as it does the names of Mrs. Robert McPherson, Miss Minnie Jeffrey, Dr. Hugh Robertson, John Mather, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Beard, and Kate and Olive Loudon, besides the dear little children gathered home, shows how heavy has been our loss. Some of our brightest and best have gone but we do not "sorrow as those who have no hope." Sickness more than usual has brought anxious hours of pain and watchfulness to many a home.

But causes of special joy have not been wanting among us. The work of renovating the church, which was undertaken with a little anxiety, has been carried on to a most successful completion, and the liberality with which the people have contributed to this work is very commendable. It gives us now, without extravagance, one of the neatest and most comfortable churches in the city. Then we have had the regretful pleasure of bidding God-speed to another of our dear young people, who has gone to the Foreign field. Miss Minnie Hodgins, one of our most faithful Sabbath-School teachers and workers left us in October, and is now the wife of our beloved Missionary, Rev. N. H. Russell, B.A., at Mhow, Central India.

The work in the domestic mission on Elizabeth St. is being carried on with more than usual evidences of success. A gratifying report has come through Rev. Dr. Robertson of the work at Whitewood, N. W. T., where we are helping to support a missionary, Rev. M. Turnbull. All departments of the Church's work have been carried on with efficiency. The regular services and the Sabbath-School and Bible Classes were upset a good deal during the summer by the renovating of the church, and we were unable to hold our August communion. But the advantages arising from the improvements, will, we are confident, more than compensate for any diminution, in the near future. The membership is now 558. The Sacrament of Baptism has been administered to two adults, and to nineteen infants. The attendance at the various Communions was as follows: February 314; April, 317; June, 330; October, 316; December, 336.

As the various reports will partly show, a large amount of faithful self-sacrificing work has been done in connection with the congregation during the year, but much of the very best work cannot be tabulated in reports.

With all these evidences of activity the Session feel the need of more spiritual power to overcome the deadening influence of worldliness, to lead unconverted sinners to Christ, and in short to make our beloved church what we all desire it should be, a centre of real spiritual life and activity in this city.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MANAGERS FOR THE YEAR 1892.

In presenting their Report for the past year the Managers have to record a slight increase in the deficiency which existed at the close of 1891, and which now amounts to \$111.07. On comparing the financial statement of the year with that of its predecessor, some few differences are observable, but the only one of these to which reference need be made is the item of "Special Collections," which it will be seen amounted, in 1891, to \$520.28. This item has disappeared from the statement of receipts for 1892, owing to an understanding arrived at with the congregation, that if a substantial increase were made in the weekly envelope contributions, this method of augmenting the ordinary revenue of the church, would be discontinued. The increase asked for was made in quite a number of cases, but it was not as general as was hoped for.

It is estimated that the expenditure for the ensuing year will be about \$6,150, necessitating a weekly revenue of \$117, and the Managers have pleasure in stating that if the present rate of giving is maintained, this amount will be forthcoming. With the view of keeping the envelope contributors informed as to the state of their accounts with the church, the Managers would advise that a quarterly statement be sent to every contributor, showing the amount paid and amount due (if any) at the end of each quarter. It is almost necessary that some such plan as this be adopted, owing to the irregular manner in which a number of the members make use of their envelopes

It will be remembered that on the 11th May last the congregation, at a meeting duly called for the purpose, authorized the Managers to proceed with the work of renovating and improving the interior of the church, on the lines of a proposal which was submitted at the meeting. The work was commenced during the first week of July, and was so far finished by 18th September that public worship was resumed in the church on that date. The estimated cost of the improvements, leaving out of account the sum of \$492.95 for new plumbing,

etc., which was paid early in the year, was about \$6,000; the actual cost, including the item for plumbing just referred to, was about \$7,800. The Managers estimate has therefore been exceeded by about \$1,300, and in explanation of this it may be said that it became apparent as the work progressed, that if a thoroughly satisfactory result were to be attained, outlays would be required, which were not at first thought necessary. That the result has fully justified the additional expenditure, the Managers think there can be no doubt. Cash subscriptions have been received towards the cost of the improvements, to the amount of \$1,964.67, and a further sum of \$2,779 has been promised, so that there still remains about \$3,100 unprovided for. The Managers would recommend that a strong effort be made to pay off this amount either by special quarterly collections, or by weekly sums, contributed in special envelopes, which could be furnished those members who have not already subscribed a definite This plan has been adopted by other churches, and is found to work very satisfactorily. The cash receipts have only been sufficient to pay off a portion of the indebtedness incurred, and it was therefore found necessary to arrange with the bank for a temporary overdraft to pay the contractors A statement of the cost of the improvements is accounts. appended to this report.

No change has taken place in the mortgage on the church property during the year, the subscribers towards this object having consented to allow their subscriptions to go into the Renovation Fund. An effort is being made to have the rate of interest now paid on the mortgage reduced, with good prospects of success.

For some time past the question of reducing the number of Managers has been before the Board, and a resolution dealing with the matter will be presented at the annual meeting.

The following Managers retire by rotation at this time:
Messrs. Petry, Bain, Hedley, Livingston, Denoon, Peter,
Wilson and Meldrum.

I liberality and honesty of purpose, in that our collections are very nearly as large as last year, despite the fact that no calls have been made. The committee have repeatedly called the attention of the congregation to the fact that there are a number of members who do not contribute anything and who must be able to do something—if it is only 5 cents a month. We will not dwell on it this year, further than to say that "There is that withholdeth and yet tendeth to poverty," and as a congregation we cannot expect a full and perfect blessing until we present our bodies a living sacrifice upon God's altar. When we do do that we will withhold nothing. For the coming year the committee have prepared a set of envelopes for each contributor, consisting of 12 blue envelopes (monthly) for the general schemes of the church, 4 red envelopes (quarterly) for salary of our foreign missionary, and one envelope (yellow) for salary of our North-West missionary. If everyone would try and use these envelopes on the dates as printed on them, it would save a great deal of confusion and trouble. We have held our missionary prayer-meetings monthly and without a doubt they have been well attended and ably conducted, and the committee have to heartily thank those members who gave us such excellent papers throughout the year. Our foreign missionary, Mr. Russell, has kept us in full touch with his work in India, and we can only thank God for His goodness to him and take on renewed courage for the future.

ANNUAL REPORT OF LADIES' AID SOCIETY.

At the close of the twelfth year of its existence, the annual report of the Ladies' Aid Society is presented for the approval of the congregation.

Fifteen regular meetings, with an average attendance of twelve members, and one emergency meeting, have been held. In 1891, our average attendance was sixteen, but we trust that the falling off during last year was not due to a decrease of interest in the work. We have attributed it to the large amount of sickness prevalent in the city during the early part of the year.

It is with regret we chronicle the fact that our very efficient, devoted and self-sacrificing second Vice-President, Miss Mickle, has left the city, and so been obliged to sever her connection with us. We also grieve to say that one of our most active members, Mrs. George Burns, has been an invalid for months.

The year's work has been extensive. Sixteen families have been assisted in different ways. Food for the hungry, fuel for the cold, clothing for the naked, as well as nurses and medicine for the sick, have been provided.

Owing to the kindness of the City Council, we have been able to obtain admission to the Hillcrest Convalescent Home for three of our people.

As in former years, a large quantity of clothing has been made at our meetings and sold at the Mission on Elizabeth Street, the price charged barely covering the cost of the material. The plan of charging a small sum for articles of cast-off clothing has worked admirably, quite preventing any feeling of jealousy on the part of those benefited.

We have supplied work to some of those needing help, and thus prevented any tendency to pauperism.

We would thank the congregation for the handsome collections taken up on New Year's Day and on Thanksgiving Day. We do not think that there is any direction in which the well-known liberality of our people can be better extended than in helping our own poor.

A special vote of thanks is due to the members of the

choir who so kindly gave their services last May at a concert for the benefit of our Society.

We are again called upon to acknowledge our indebtedness to friends in the congregation for donations of ready-made garments, material for work, groceries and vegetables, besides

numerous large parcels of cast-off clothing.

Before closing this report, we would urge upon all, especially the women of the congregation, the needs of this Society. Though money is a very necessary agent in the work we have to do, we would impress upon each and every one the idea that "hearts and hands" are also very important factors. Interest is needed, and we feel convinced that if the lady members of the church would only come to our meetings and hear of the many cases of suffering humanity needing our assistance, a great impetus would be given to the work.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

As a Society we have every reason to be thankful for the success which has attended our efforts in endeavoring to help

our pastor and our Church in every way we can.

The Committees have each been enlarged so that more efficient work may be done in every department. During the past year thirty-four active members have been added to our roll. The membership is thus well maintained, although a number have left the city, principally students who have completed their term of studies in Toronto. We have eighty-four active, eight associate, twenty-nine junior and five honorary members making a total of one hundred and twenty-six. Two delegates were sent to the Christian Endeavor Convention in New Yo k, in July, and three represented our Society at the Provincial Convention at London in October.

These are invited to our Church. A list is kept and they will be called on by our pastor.

The Junior Society of Christian Endeavor meets every Sunday afternoon at 4.15, and lasts half an hour; a suitable subject is studied, and with the assistance of two or three of the Seniors, proves to be very interesting and instructive. Many poor homes were made glad at Christmas time by the visits of our Juniors.

As individuals we are endeavoring to live up to our pledge, and as a Society we desire to show that we are in earnest in our endeavor "For Christ and the Church."

SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CENTRAL CHURCH MISSION PENNY SAVINGS BANK.

At the close of this our seventh year, we are able to report a satisfactory amount of business done, though we cannot show the same progress which we were pleased to report for the previous year. Deposits made by those who use our savings-bank to accumulate money are liable to be drawn upon during a year such as this has been, and this fact will partly account we think for the difference between the receipts for this

and the previous year.

Our deposits during the year, inclusive of interest, amounted to \$1,543.18, while withdrawals, totalling \$1,774, were This leaves the balance now due depositors \$1,551.75, compared with \$1,782.57 at the end of November, 1891. To meet this liability we have cash deposited in the Bank of Commerce, and People's Loan and Deposit Co., and on hand amounting to \$1,291.11, and a mortgage of \$300, with accrued interest of \$7.56. We have also an investment of \$35 in a fire proof-safe, which we purchased to protect our books in case of fire. Recognizing our obligations to those who had improved our facilities for doing business we voted \$25 towards the expenses of the improvements. Our current expenses for the year were \$5.25, and the profits from interest \$27.12. This now leaves a surplus of cash and investments, over the amount due depositors of \$81.92. The members of the staff have given good attention to the work of the Bank on Saturday evenings, and we trust that during the coming year we will be able to keep the duties so light that no one will have reason to be absent.
