FORTY DIE AS GAS EXPLODES IN CHICAGO TENEMENT

Twenty-Four Flats in House and Sixteen of Them Occupied—Mercury 10 Below as Tenants Rush Into Street Scantily Clad

Chicago, Feb. 2.-Forty persons are believed to be dead and as many are njured as the result of a gas explosion and fire that wrecked a tenement building at 813-23 14th Place, in the heart of the west side early today. Injured persons and residents, forced from their homes scantily fered miserably in a temperature of ten degrees below zero and the cold hin-

dered the work of firemen and rescuers. Burning gas from a main prevented search of the ruins and at daybreak only two bodies had been recovered—those of an unidentified man about fifty years old, who was crushed when walls crum bled, and Mrs. Charlotte Stitaley. The explosion was heard for miles and by some freak of the shock buildings a few yards away were undamaged while windows were broken many blocks farther distant. Hundreds of Hebrews, Lithunian, Polish and Russian

enants of the district rushed into the street scantily clad. The explosion wrecked one end of the tenement building, which contained twenty-four flats, sixteen of which were occupied.

Firemen attacking the ice-covered wreckage penetrated through the outer crust at 10 a. m. and declared they could distinguish what seemed to be voices beneath them. Efforts to remove the debris were redoubled and ambulances were sent for in the hope that victims still alive might be rescued.

Cleveland, Ohio, Feb. 2—Six hundred and eight grade school teachers who for a year or more have been receiving \$1,-000 a year will get a \$50 a year increase starting Feb. 1, school board members said on Saturday.

The board's business management and

educational committees late Friday decided upon this increase in raising the elementary teachers' maximum salary from \$1,000 to \$1,200. from \$1,000 to \$1,200.

Teachers who get \$1,050 a year beginning Feb. 1, will continue to get raises at the rate of \$50 a year until they reach the new maximum of \$1,200. The raise will cost the board \$15,200 extra between Feb. 1 and the end of this school year.

Increases to other grade teachers are promised by the board members as soon as Superintendent-elect Spaulding gets on the job, if the legislature increases public school funds.

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





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NO PRIVATE PARCELS FOR WAR PRISONERS

New Regulations Prohibit Ship ments of Food or Clothing for Prisoners in Germany

Ottawa, Feb. 1-The Postmaster Gen-

ral has announced that on and after ebruary 1, no parcels containing foodtuffs or clothing can be received at any post office in Canada to be despatche address of any Canadian soldier who is a prisoner of war in Germany. who is a prisoner of war in Germany.

This action was taken on the recommendation of the Imperial authorities. At present all parcels passing from Great Britain to Germany have to be forwarded under the supervision of the Central Prisoners of War Committee. The Canadian Red Cross Society at London, irrespective entirely of all parcels sent from Canadian Red Cross Society at London has been authorized to supervise the packing and forwarding of parcels to Canadian prisoners and under the regulations all such parcels as received have to be censored and repacked before forwarding. 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

Public Accounts for Fiscal Year

War Taxes Meet Increased Expenditures on Ordinary Account -Capital Account Swallows

Ottawa, Feb. 1-The public accounts for the last fiscal year were tabled in the commons this afternoon by the minister of finance. Total receipts on account of consolidated fund were \$172,147,838, while the total expenditure for the ordinary expenses of administration amounted to \$130,350,726. The surplus was therefore \$41,797.112.

Capital account expenditure totalled \$38,566,950 on public works, including the following: \$7,078,000 on the National Transcontinental, \$7,635,000 on the Intercolonial, \$4,887,000 on the Hudson Bay railway, and \$4,909,000 on the Wel-

land ship canal.

The railway subsidies paid during the year totalled \$1,400,000. The war expenditure was \$166,197,755. The total expenditure under all headings was \$209-350,000. The increase in net debt of the dominion was \$165,780,000 or practically the same as the amount set down for

war expenditures.
Under the heading of war expenditures the militia and defense department was responsible for \$160,433,000, the justice department for \$1,287,000, the naval department for \$3,274,000 and the dominion police for \$201,000. Pay allowances and sustenance of the troops cost \$100,-788,000, transport \$8,686,000, clothing \$13,194,000, small arms and ammunition \$7,766,000. The war expenses of the justice department include, of course, the cost of looking after the interned pris-
