GUNS IN TERRIFIC BATTLE IN POLAND

Much Depends on Outcome of Gigantic Conflict Which is Steeping the Earth in Blood-Less Intense Today on Western Front

Petrograd, Feb. 6—More than a million picked troops, and more than 1,000 heavy guns are engaged in a terrific battle in the region of the Bzura and Rawka Rivers, in Poland, and upon the outcome of this conflict hangs the fate of the present campaign for the mastery of Western Poland.

For a week the heavy artillery has been shaking the blood-soaked earth with its thunder, and the attacks of the Germans and the counter attacks of the Russians have left the battlefield covered with corpses.

New York, Feb. 6—Unless there is actual destruction of neutral ships, marine insurance underwriters here express the opinion that the shipping between this country and Great Britain and France will not be lessened in volume because of the German admiralty blockade declaration.

THE HERALD'S WARNING

Under the caption of "Whom the Gods would destroy, they first drive mad,"

"Do Americans realize the full meaning of the German official announcement published yesterday that the seas surrounding Great Britain and Ireland, including the whole English channel, are hereby declared to be a military zone?

"It means that Germany declares war upon the entire world. Ships belonging not only to the nations with which Germany is at war, but also those belonging to neutral nations—to the United States, to Italy, to Holland, to Sweden, to Norway to Denmark, to Greece, to Spain—are' according to this flendish document, to be destroyed even when it may not be possible to preserve crews and passengers from danger. It means that every American going to northern Europe or leaving it, even by a neutral vessel, will take his life in his hands because Germany, a people of 'kulture,' has decided to set at defiance every law, human and divine, and treat all international conventions bearing her signature as so many 'scraps of paper.'

There Should be Opening For New Industries Here

A prominent thread manufacturing firm in the United States, having expressed a desire to establish a spool manufacturing plant near a dependable white birch supply, the industrial commissioner of the St. John Board of Trade opened a correspondence with the company, suggesting that they should look into the question of establishing a plant at St. John, near which there was an abundance of the kind of wood that the irm wanted.

In years gone by, shipments of spool wood had been made from St. John to Great Britain, but this trade had fallen off. 

The heaviest fighting continues to be in the eastern area, where the Germans are making a desperate effort to break through the Russian lines. The heaviest fighting since the early part of December is said to have taken place during the last two days, when the Germans threw enormous forces against one point in the Russian line, and where in the terrific fighting whole companies were destroyed. The losses on both sides must have been very serious, but since the Germans were the attacking party their loss would be much the greater of the two. England's answer to Germany's paper blockade of British ports is of a character to show to the world and to Germany especially that the game of blut is a very poor game to play when the interests of humanity are at stake. PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that a bill will be presented for enacment at the next session of the Legislature intituled "An Act in further amendment of 'The Saint John City Assessment Act 1909' and to amend the laws relating to civic franchise."

The object of the bill is:—

1. to exempt all incomes from personal labor and occupation up to and including \$1000 per annum; also to exempt \$500 of each such income above \$1000, and not exceeding \$2000.

2. to impose a poll tax of \$2.00 and no more upon all persons whose incomes are totally exempt from taxation.

3. to exempt all household furniture from taxation where the value does not exceed \$500.

4. to provide that the last day in which the Common Council shall have power to determine and direct what assessments shall be levied in the City of Saint John shall be the 30th instead of the 15th day of January in each year.

5. to provide that the poll tax of \$2.00 shall give the same right to vote at civic elections which the \$500 poll tax now does.
