EIGHT IN GUN FIGHT IN A NEW YORK

New York, July 15—Eight men, each armed with a pistol, fought a duel in the middle of a lower west side block late last night, four standing on one side of the street and blazing away at the opposing quartette on the opposite sidewalk. 
32 Other Schools to Cost Over Ten Million Have Been Authorized.

BRITISH COAL IS SENT TO AMERICA

Brisk Business Expected at New York if U. S. Strike Continues.

New York, July 15—Because of the congestion and shortage of motive power due to the railroad strike and the observance of the fourth of July by the miners, the output of bituminous coal fell off from 1,000,000 to 1,500,000 tons during the last week, it was estimated in coal trade circles here. As a result it was stated prices again moved upward, despite Secretary of Commerce Hoover's figure of \$3.50 a ton, going as high as \$5.25 in some non-union districts.

A feature of the week was the arrival of the first cargo of British coal in New York harbor since the national miners' strike. This coal was being offered from \$6.20 to \$7.75 a ton, as compared with the range of \$5.75 to \$7.50 on American fuel at the piers.

"A brisk business in English coal seems likely if the strike continues," said the market report of the Coal Trade Journal. "The comparatively small quantities offered the local coal trade last week were readily absorbed."
