
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


Washington, D. C., Aug. 6—Three decisions were reached yesterday by government agencies working to reduce the cost of living and to allay the country's unrest. President Wilson decided to address a message to Congress recommending additional legislation to aid in reducing the cost of living. Agents of the department of justice were ordered to ferret out all hoard-ers of necessaries and profiteers throughout the country. They are to be prose-cuted under the Food Control Act. Director J. H. Barnes, of the GrainCorporation, decided to maintain the government's guarantee on wheat at \$2.26 a bushel as a "reserve protection against a higher price later."

A record convention crowd of upwards of lifteen hundred delegates enthusiastic in fine fighting fettle, eager for unity of purpose and effort and insistent on strong leadership and progressive democratic Liberal policies, cheered the opening address of Premier Murray, demand-ing a return to party government and the end of "Unionism" in politics which cessarily involved compromise. They acclaimed his declaration for honesty and sincerity in government, vigorous action to protect the common people against the profiteering of entrenched predatory wealth, greater freedom in trade

and even handed justice for all classes og the people. They cheered also the references in the address of welcome from Mayor Fisher, of Ottawa, to the desire of the people for high ideals, prompt strong action and absolute integrity of purpose from the political leaders of the new day. And they applauded equally the plea of Captain Calder speaking on behalf of the returned soldiers, for truth and justice in dealing with creeds, races, and

The obvious temper of the convention from the outset was one of firm indemocratic principles of government, single eyed for the common an end to all pretence and self-seeking in parliament. And this temper was further evidenced by the fact that the delegates are taking things into their own hands. There is no cut and dried programme of policies prepared by the usiet swallowing of the convention.
