London, July 25—Toe dancing is not a comparatively modern French invention, as is popularly supposed, since a piece of Egyptian pottery more than 2,000 years old now exhibited by the Institute of Archeology, shows a girl taking such steps in modern ballet style.

The antiquity of toe dancing is only ne of the things revealed by the Egyptin collection brought from Meroe in the idan by Prof. John Garstang. # WORLD'S GREATEST

New York, July 24—The largest electric lamp in the world has been placed in the New York navy yard. The beam of this giant searchlight cutting the skies will be visible under favorable conditions more than 100 miles away.

There is no other lamp like it in existence. It is called the Beck searchlight and is the invention of Heinrich Beck, a German scientist, who is here conducting these tests of his lamp for the United States government.

Measured at two miles from the lamp 450,000,000 candle power is obtained from a lamp with a 44-inch reflector. The present 44-inch lamp in use on the world's best ships, gives only 60,000,000 candle power. For coast defence at 60-inch reflector is now in use. Such a reflector hitched to the Beck searchlight street is fillion candle power as against 180-000,000 candle-power now obtained.

During the last four years loans had been sanctioned by the local government board to the amount of £1,400,000 for the building of houses, and the rate of expenditure was increasing with great rapidity. In five and a half months of this year the loans sanctioned amounted to £997,000, of which £166,000 was for rural districts. Contrasting the recen record with that of the twenty years from 1890 to 1910, Mr. Samuel pointed out that during the twenty years only £2,000,000 was expended on the building of new houses, compared with nearly \$21,000,000 in the first few months of this
