Car Service Back To Normal Again Today

Conditions As Before The Strike Are Resumed

NOT PULL POWER YET

Plenty For All Demands, However—Some Street Incidents of the Last Night—Liquor Dealers All Complied With Request

H. M. Hopper, general manager of the street railway, said this morning that the whole street car system was running on schedule, including all the branches. Asked if the conditions in the power house had returned to normal, Mr. Hopper said that it would be some time before they were normal again, but there was sufficient power being produced to meet the demands of the whole city. The appearance of the streets this morning was such that a person who had no knowledge of what had happened during the last few days, could not imagine that only a few hours before the streets were a scene of turmoil.

Many expressions of satisfaction because of the settlement were heard on all sides this morning. There are two copies of the agreement, one signed by the company directors and the other signed by B. Kneeland, C. B. McLean and F. V. Johnston, committee representing employees in the dispute.

The members of the militia who were out for riot duty were dismissed about one o'clock this morning and were allowed to return to their homes, in most cases for the first time since Thursday night.

Bars All Closed
John B. Jones, inspector of liquor licenses, this morning expressed his appreciation of the company directors in closing the bars yesterday after he had conveyed to them the wishes of the mayor. Mr. Jones said that several of the proprietors had thought beforehand that it would be a good move and all complied with the request to close at seven o'clock.

Incidents of the Night
The force detailed to guard the power house marched from the Armory in strong and made its way by way of King Street and King Street to Dock Street and thence to Union Street, where they were halted and were detailed to their various stations. The force was also made up of men from the 6th and 7th battalions with Colonel J. L. McAvity in command and with him the following officers: Major J. V. Angell, medical officer; Captain Ronald McAvity, Quartermaster; Captain A. O. Dawson, Adjutant; Captain B. A. Fleetwood, B. H. Dunfield, H. C. Sturdee, T. M. McAvity, and George Keefe; and Lieutenants J. A. Fugate, R. D. McLaughlin, A. E. Day, and Lieutenant George Morrissey, 28th Dragoons (detached). The details were quickly ranged and the men grounded arms and stood at ease to wait for developments.

The force under Captain Sturdee was stationed at the corner of Nelson Street and North Wharf, another under Captain G. M. McAvity was stationed at the corner of Nelson and Union, while the balance of the force under Captain Dunfield was placed at the corner of Union and Dock streets. From 8.30 until after 10 o'clock there was not the slightest sign of disturbance whatever, and the men, standing in broken ranks, conversed, sang songs and pulled vigorously on the cigars which had been passed around through the courtesy of Mayor Frink, who was present with the detachment at the power house in his capacity as chief magistrate of the city.

In the meanwhile the cars manned by the strike-breakers had been running a very hap-hazard service and carrying but a few bold spirits who ventured on them as passengers. About a battery placed his men on the cars to give them protection. This Colonel McAvity declined to do, as such procedure is very expressly forbidden in the service regulations and told the men to take their cars away to the North End barns. This the strike-breakers refused to do, and after swinging their trolley poles to run in the direction of the car barns in the South End and again being refused the escort they demanded they took off their controllers and their cars were stalled at the corner of Union and Dock.

With Fixed Bayonets
By this time the crowd began to thin out in Market Square and move in the general direction of the North End. Due to the efficient efforts of a detail of police under Sergeant Scott, the crowds were kept moving past Union Street and the stalled cars, but as an extra precaution

SHOULD BE CLOSED

Road House About Which Complaints Are Made

There is still work for the morality committee of the county council, according to complaints made by residents along the I. C. R. It is said that one of the most notorious of the road houses, which was not closed at the time the others were forced to lock their doors, is still carrying on its nefarious business.

The statement is made that the house is a nightly resort for men and women belonging to the city, much of the traffic being by the late train at night and the early train in the morning. On Sundays also, it is said, the place is frequented by many.

Those who have seen young people of both sexes, many of them of respectable families, going to and from this place denounce it as even more serious in its effects upon the morality of the city than in the past, and they cannot understand why the county authorities do not act.

PLANS FOR DOMINIONS ROYAL COMMISSION ON VISIT TO ST. JOHN

The members of the Dominion Royal Commission are expected to be in St. John on August 11th, 12th, 13th, and 14th and will hold sessions in the board of trade rooms during those days. They will be welcomed by Lt. Gov. Wood, Hon. George J. Clark, Mayor Frink and J. M. Robinson, president of the board of trade. Evidence will be taken on a number of subjects having an imperial bearing. One of the most important of these subjects will be our forest resources. Among those who will be heard on this will be Col. T. G. Loggie, deputy minister of lands and mines; department; Angus McLean, of Bathurst; and J. T. Gregory, St. John. Mayor Frink will speak of harbors. James Gilchrist, superintendent of immigration, and S. L. Harrison will on immigration. Hon. Mr. Murray, J. B. Daggett, secretary of agriculture, and A. G. Dunne, horticultural expert, will deal with aids to agriculture. F. P. Gutelius will apply himself to the subject of government railways. There will possibly be other witnesses. The commission members will be given an auto ride and will also have an opportunity of inspecting the harbor works from the government cruiser Curlew. Mayor Frink will likely entertain the members at luncheon. On Friday, August 14th, the provincial government will take the party for a sail to Fredericton. The Fredericton Board of Trade will show the party attention on arrival. They will return to St. John next day by C. P. R. and will then proceed to Charlottetown.

GOING TO HALIFAX
About fifteen insurance men from this city will leave for Halifax on Monday evening to attend the annual meeting of the Dominion Life Underwriters' Association, which will open on Tuesday morning. Among those to attend from this city will be the president, Charles A. Ovens; the vice-president, Roy L. Sippell; the treasurer, W. M. Titus; and F. C. McLean, manager of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co.

The detail at the corner of Union and Dock streets were called to attention at the power house in their capacity as chief magistrate of the city. By this time two batteries of the Artillery under Colonel B. R. Armstrong and Major W. H. Harrison and J. S. McGowan had marched from the head of King Street and up Dock to Union. After consultation of the officers commanding and the mayor it was decided to escort the two stalled cars to Westworth Street. So after one battery had lined up ahead and one behind the stalled cars, their temporary motormen and conductors came from the company's office, and while the men of the 62nd detachment held the crowd back the two cars were escorted with all due military ceremony to Westworth Street, by way of Prince William and St. James.

A False Alarm
The last shot from the rioters was a false alarm of fire, rung in about midnight from box 184. The chemical responded, but learned to the chagrin of the firemen that would-be jokers had been responsible for calling them out of their beds. The alarm is at Long Wharf.

One of the men running a bus line in Douglas Avenue told a Telegram reporter that he had taken in fares for one bus alone \$18 between two o'clock in the afternoon and eight in the evening and that he expected to take in at least \$2 or \$3 after that when the people were beginning to return from the city.

ANOTHER DAY OF SENSATIONS IN NOW NOTED PARIS TRIAL

One of the Judges Challenges Another To Duel and Mme. Caillaux Collapses In Court

Paris, July 25—A challenge to a duel was sent today by Judge Louis Albanel, presiding judge of the court trying Madame Henriette Caillaux for the wilful murder of Gaston Calmette, to Judge Louis Dagory, one of the three judges, sitting on the bench with him. The quarrel arose out of an incident at the Palace of Justice, late last night, the nature of which could not be ascertained.

The second appointed by Judge Albanel are General Jules Dalstein, former military governor of Paris, and Emile Brunel Labori. Madame Henriette Caillaux, soon after she was brought into court today, for the sixth day's hearing totally collapsed when the reading of letters handed in by Madame Gueydan began. She was carried insensible from the court.

THE KNOWLEDGE OF THE ANCIENTS

London, July 25—The dancing is not a comparatively modern French invention, as is popularly supposed, since a place of Egyptian pottery more than 2000 years old now exhibited by the Institute of Archaeology, shows a girl taking such steps in modern ballet style. The antiquity of ice dancing is only one of the things revealed by the Egyptian collection brought from Merne in the Sudan by Prof. John Garstang. Some astronomical buildings there show considerable knowledge of the heavens—one stone was sketched an instrument for measuring angles and taking crevices, while another drawing tends to show that an effort was made to make the circumference of the moon. Strain marks measuring the shadows of a sun indicate an effort to get the latitude and longitude of Merne. An entirely new language, which is at least a mystery, was also discovered by archaeologists in certain inscriptions.

WORLD'S GREATEST ELECTRIC LIGHT

New York, July 24—The largest electric lamp in the world has been placed in the New York navy yard. The beam of this giant searchlight cutting the skies will be visible under favorable conditions more than 100 miles away. There is no other lamp like it in existence. It is called the Beck searchlight and is the invention of Heinrich Beck, a German scientist, who is here conducting these tests of his lamp for the United States government.

WOULD HAVE LONDONERS ADOPT SENSIBLE GARB FOR THE HOT WEATHER

London, July 25—England's hot spell has started an agitation for reform in men's summer dress. For some time has had courage to follow the American fashion and wear a light-colored shirt and belt. An Englishman never dispenses with the coat except when visiting friends and cricket, and looking on the river. To appear without a coat on the links is quite as unpardonable in England as to go without a hat in the street.

FEMALE POLICE FOR LONDON

London, July 25—Female "bobbies" will be a feature of London life if Lord Bessborough's amendment to the criminal justice bill is carried by parliament. He proposes that each metropolitan and county borough should have at least two women police constables. In the general bill, which is considered certain to pass, women officers are provided to look after women prisoners out on probation, and each police station would have its matron.

TOOK IN \$20,000 IN DAY

Paris, July 25—An army of 6,000 women selling artificial flowers in a single day in Paris gathered more than \$20,000 for the French Red Cross Society. The campaign was a special one for the benefit of the sick and wounded French soldiers in Morocco. The women charity workers sold the little flowers not only in the streets but in the theatres, the principal cafes and restaurants, and the richest harvest was at the Velodrome on the night of the Johnson-van Righ. Although the flowers were sold for only two cents many of the retailers in the ring-side seats dropped silver and gold into the collecting boxes.

EACH COUNTY TO VOTE ON HOME RULE MATTER

Chief Secretary Announces Government's Intentions in Regard To Ireland

London, July 25—Augustine Birrell, chief secretary for Ireland, in a speech in Cambridge yesterday, said the government will go forward with its proposals in regard to the amendment of the home rule bill. This will enable each county in Ulster to vote itself in or out of home rule. Mr. Birrell warned the public not to be bamboozled by the newspapers into believing that there would be a civil war in Ireland. He was convinced that such a thing would not happen. If it did the government would inevitably interfere.

NEW BRUNSWICK TO SEND TWO CURLERS

London, July 25—The report of a proposed visit of Canadian players to Scotland next season was presented to the Royal Caledonian Curling Club in Glasgow on Thursday. Invitations have been accepted for the Canadian, Ontario and Manitoba branches to send eight players each, the Nova Scotia branch, four players, and New Brunswick two.

Grave View Taken In The Chief Capitals

RUSSIA MAY INTERFERE

Servia in Defiant Mood Over The Demand of Austria—On London Exchange Demoralization Set in This Morning

London, July 25—In all the European capitals today there has been a very grave view of the Austro-Servian situation, arising out of Austria's presentation of a virtual ultimatum to Servia, demanding the suppression of the Pan-Servian movement and the punishment of those concerned in the assassination of the heir to the Austrian Imperial throne. Diplomatic circles see in the dispute and in the added possibility of Russian interference on behalf of the little Slav nation, the danger of a general European war.

On the London stock exchange demoralization set in this morning, owing to a rumor that Russia had begun to mobilize her great army in preparation for eventualities. Dealers offered everything and British consols fell 1 1/2 per cent to 78 3/4. Rio-Tinto lost three points, Russian bonds 2 1/2, Austrian and Hungarian bonds two points, while the leading American stocks were quoted at \$1 to \$3 below parity.

Canadian Pacific, however, showed the most loss. A fractional hardening occurred before noon, but the market remained nervous and excited. Servia Defiant

The Servian government had not until this morning given any hint as to what its reply to Austria's note would be, but in quarters which are not official it is held out that the answer will be favorable. It is held out that this turn out to be the case, unless Russia should be successful in her efforts to have the time limit extended in favor of Servia. Austria will, it is pointed out, before many hours, take steps to enforce her demands.

It is argued in authoritative quarters that Austria-Hungary, if left alone, could crush her diminutive neighbor in short order, but it is feared that Russia may find herself unable to stand idly by and see a Slav nation practically extinguished.

Already part of the Russian press has assumed a defiant attitude, demanding that the government in St. Petersburg undertake the protection of Servia. That a clash between Slav and Teuton would not be an unwelcome one in some quarters, where war is ordinarily regarded with repugnance, is obvious from despatches from several continental capitals. It has long been felt that a gigantic struggle between the Slavs and Teutons is bound to come, and there seem to be many reasons for supposing that the present is widely regarded as a favorable moment for the inevitable outbreak. It is felt that it would end the recurrence of a crisis which appears everything.

Paris, July 25—The Austro-Hungarian ultimatum to Servia has caused the gravest situation in which Europe has found itself for a long time, is the general contentment of the newspapers this morning. The opinion is expressed that whether there will be a conflict depends almost entirely upon the attitude of Germany and Russia.

A PLAID VOILE

This lovely afternoon dress is made of plaid voile combined with plain silk crepe de Chine. The skirt is of the fashionable waiting-maid design, while the bodice features the Japanese collar. The waist is also a splendid model to use separately, therefore today's lesson will deal principally with its cutting and construction.

Four yards of 44-inch checked material are needed for waist and bodice and 5 yards of 44-inch crepe for the lower part of the skirt. The voile is folded to cut the shoulder, collar and back, each of which is laid along the lengthwise fold. The vest is placed on a lengthwise thread. Opening the goods, the outer front, sleeve and flare out are laid upon it and then cut.

The lining is used as seams taken up and the front hemmed. The under-arm seam of the outside is then closed, after which the shoulder seam is closed. Turn under front edge on slot perforations. Sew Japanese collar to neck and front edge, center-back and notches even. Turn under edge of vest on slot perforations, lap on shield, notches and edges underneath even and stitch. Adjust vest and shield to position, lapping folded edge of front to small "o" perforations, notches even and stitch, leaving edges on left side free for opening. Gather lower edge of waist between double "x" perforations and, if desired, 2 inches above. Join standing collar as notched.


Close outer sleeve seam as notched. Sew flare out to lower edge as notched. Sew in armhole of outside as notched, easing in any fullness.

Arrange outside on lining, center and under-arm seams even; stitch lower edge together. Large "o" perforations in pleat indicate center-front. Turn hem at notches. Close back seam, new to lower edge of waist, centers even.

Trim with a satin belt and add a bow of the same trimming to the skirt, where it is looped at the back.

It is possible with the use of the cotton voiles, which come as cheap as 19 cents a yard, to duplicate this dress for less than \$2. They ruffles of fine lawn and batiste, finished with hemstitching or a plait edge are ideal finishes for the neck and sleeves when either expensive or inexpensive materials are used.

Afternoon dress in plaid voile and silk crepe de Chine trimmed with plain satin. The waist has a Japanese collar.

A Shelf of Jelly.

Pick fruit just before it is ripe. Use only enough water to cover fruit when putting over to cook. Berries make best jelly by putting through fruit press to secure juice. Make jelly on clear dry day. Be accurate in measuring both material and time. Never gather fruit for jelly right after a rain. Jelly once begun boiling should not stop until done. Use wooden spoon for stirring jelly. Make small quantity each time. Sweet apples will not jelly. Skim jelly carefully. If jelly seems too thin set in hot sun for several days.

HOUSEHOLDERS OF HALIFAX HAVE FORMED A LEAGUE

One Thousand Members is the Slogan of the Organization

Mrs. E. M. Murray Elected President—One of the Objects is to Endeavor to Reduce the High Cost of Living

(Halifax Chronicle.) Most encouraging of those interested in the movement, and prophetic of vigorous and active efforts toward the reduction of the present high cost of living in Halifax, performing at the same time such adjunct services as demanding clean and sanitary shops, careful inspection of food, proper conditions relating to the markets, and the placing of propaganda teaching women who have the responsibility of buying, the best methods to pursue, and the places where the lowest prices are obtainable, was the organization meeting of the Householders' League held last night in the Technical College.

One thousand members is the slogan of the League at present, and the aim is to organize the women of Halifax in a co-operative body with power and influence enough to effectively combat the unnecessary high price of many commodities that are in common use with all householders, and the price of which particularly affects the pockets of the average family, and is also felt by the rich. Such, at least was the expressed aim of the meeting held last night.

Many Women Present. There was a good attendance of women from all parts of the city, representative of all walks of life. There was enthusiasm and determination, and with a general willingness on the part of the women to work in the efforts of the league to improve conditions in Halifax.

Mrs. E. M. Murray, the convener of the committee which brought together the initial meeting, and one of those responsible for bringing Mrs. Wilson from Ottawa to lecture before the women, and who has been actively interested in many ways in the movement, was unanimously elected president of the new league.



WHY GAG THE PREACHER

Writing in the current issue of the "Canadian Courier," "The Monocle Man" protests against the hue and cry which has been raised against the appearance of the preacher in politics. He winds up as follows: "Moral issues! Let us not bog down over that fence. Let us not attempt to decide what issues are 'moral' and what are not. We might have trouble. If it hurts religion, to bring it into contact with life and employ it as a guide to humanity in the selection of the right course at moments of crisis, then the sooner we fatally hurt religion of that useless description, the better will it be for the people who are being 'gold-bricked' into paying for it. The religion which cost Wolsey his position, Knox some little courage, and John the Baptist his head, is the only kind worth paying for—or living by."

Compromise Reached, Strike Is Settled And Men At Work Again All Employes of Street Railway Company Reinstated, With Exception of Ramsay—Another Display of Riotous Spirit Last Night

A feeling of intense relief pervades the city this morning and the end of the terrible happenings, which have marked the last two weeks, has been reached this morning the whole street car service was running on its usual schedule and those who were striking from and to their homes all day yesterday and part of the day previous, were this morning seen traveling to work on the street cars, in most cases with the smile of happy contentment evident.

At 11:30 o'clock last evening the strike was declared settled and an agreement was signed by the representative of the company and of the strikers. There was danger of another outbreak last evening when several cars were brought out and put into service. In King street, they were surrounded by a howling mob who yelled "scab" and a few stones were thrown. The police protection was increased and fully ninety cars for the force were about the city last night. The militia also were on hand to prevent trouble. The agreement for settlement of the strike was drafted as a result of conference between Recorder Baxter, acting in the city's interest, the men and the directors of the company. At a meeting earlier in the day Mr. Ramsay himself submitted his resignation to the union and asked that it be accepted for personal reasons, he said.

The text of the agreement is as follows: Agreement made this 24th day of July, A. D. 1914, between the John Railway Co. and its employes: 1. All men except Ramsay to return to work forthwith. 2. Before men return to work nine of the eleven men who have been discharged will be reinstated, the other two, Brasilian and Blendon, may appeal to the board of directors and have a prompt hearing. 3. No discrimination to be made against any employe because of membership in the union or because of having taken part in the existing dispute. 4. All charges heretofore preferred against employes shall be investigated by an official selected by the company and after the investigation should the accused be found guilty he shall be reinstated for all time lost.







HOUSEHOLD HELPS Blocks of camphor dispersed in all corners of damp rooms in a new house will effectually banish damp in a very short time, even when fires have proved ineffectual. They should be simply laid on paper, or on the bare shelves of a damp room or linen closet. The blocks gradually decrease in size, and when they finally disappear should be replaced until their purpose is served. Cracks in furniture should be filled in with beeswax. Soften the beeswax until it becomes like putty, then press it firmly into the cracks, and smooth the surface over with a thin knife. Sandpaper the surrounding wood, and work some of the dust into the beeswax. This gives a finish to the wood, and when it is varnished the cracks will have disappeared. Putty used in the same way soon dries and falls out.

ARE USING THE CLIMB

The mountains of culm or coal waste which break the sky line throughout the anthracite coal region of Pennsylvania and which were for many years considered a nuisance, are now being made to serve a very useful purpose. There is at present a market for almost any grade of anthracite that will burn, and no more coal goes to the culm bank except for temporary storage and subsequent recovery by washers. Those ranges of artificial hills, unsightly monuments to former waste, are contributing their share to the total coal production and are rapidly disappearing. Even the waste from the culm-bank washers is being utilized, for it is flushed into the mines and partly fills old workings where it cements together and furnishes support to the roof where the coal previously left for pillars is removed.—Geological Survey.

SALARY LIST OF \$2,400,000

Manager A. H. Woods Controls Vast Interests MANY STARS ON PAY ROLL

Again Uncle Tom's Cabin is in The Spotlight—Some Coming Attractions in The New York Theatres

Some idea of the magnitude of the interests of Manager A. H. Woods and of the army of men and women who will be on his pay-roll during the coming season may be gathered from the fact that if the New York Workmen's Compensation Law, which has just gone into effect is construed to include actors and actresses among the beneficiaries Mr. Woods will be compelled to pay more than \$12,000 for insurance premiums alone. Just what the actor's status is under the new law is now being considered and the decision is awaited with interest by all managers, but particularly by Mr. Woods, whose salary list looks more like that of a railroad or an army paymaster than a theatrical producer. Mr. Woods will employ more than 600 actors and actresses, ranging in salary from the modest stipend of the chorus to the "four figure" honorarium of the "star." A rough estimate of the weekly pay-roll during the season puts it at \$60,000 and for a season of forty weeks (and some of Mr. Woods' attractions are now booked solidly for more than a year ahead) that would amount to \$2,400,000.

In addition to the question of the insurance of the actors, there is a question as to whether or not the mechanical force or "crew" comes under the new law. Of the thirty odd companies in which Mr. Woods will be interested this season, twenty-five will be continuously "on the road," which brings up the question of interstate liability. The crew are already insured under the old liability act, but the underwriting companies have declared a higher premium on policies under the state compensation law of New York, which, in the case of the 100 or more employees involved, will amount to another tidy sum.





J. B. M. Baxter In Disturbed Mood

He Makes Something of a Scene Before The Royal Commission—Will Be Heard In Turn

ONE OF THE THINGS THAT CAUSED THE STORM



R. D. Hoban, accountant for the construction company in charge of building the Valley Railway, gave evidence on last Wednesday at the Duval inquiry of a check for \$500 sent to J. B. M. Baxter, M. P. F., for St. John County on Feb. 6, 1914, and returned by the local member March 25, 1914. The above is a facsimile of the check identified in court yesterday afternoon by Mr. Hoban.

J. B. M. Baxter, M. P. F., in an angry mood created a scene at the session of the Duval inquiry yesterday afternoon. He interrupted the evidence to demand a hearing of his statement regarding matters which have come before the court and proceeded with an attack on the leading counsel for Mr. Duval. Mr. Carvell did not take this quietly and gave as good as he received until the chairman found it necessary to order both gentlemen to sit down and to call upon the constable to preserve order. Mr. Baxter was finally told that he would be heard when his turn came.

One of Mr. Baxter's complaints was that he had been treated differently from other solicitors for the railway by having his accounts published. To meet this objection the account of Barnhill, Ewing & Sanford was put in evidence and a comparison revealed the interesting fact that Mr. Baxter had two more conversations with the other firm than they had with him.

The second contract between the railway company and the construction company, showing the advantageous terms given the latter company was put in evidence yesterday.

The examination of R. D. Hoban, accountant for the construction company, who has been on the stand since Wednesday morning, was completed and his cross-examination begun.

Before the court adjourned, to resume at two o'clock on Monday afternoon, it was announced by Mr. Carvell that he hoped to complete his evidence next week.

Mr. Hoban continued his evidence at the afternoon session. In reply to Mr. Stevens witness said that the \$15,000 entry for J. D. Seely's claim was taken out of the books in February.

The \$4,000 entry removed from the interest account on instructions of the auditor, was paid on account of the \$85,000 loan. This was said to be a mistake in charging and was later credited to general expense and charged in the proper account.

Witness explained that his statement of the cost of the railway submitted to the shareholders under date of Feb. 10, was a copy of the statement sent to the government for that month. It showed the revenue received from the provincial government through orders in council.

Such orders, when received by the company, were sent to the Prudential Trust Company at Montreal.

Witness did not know whether the securities mentioned in the minutes of the meeting of April 7 were the securities he had already mentioned as having been loaned to the company.

J. B. M. Baxter Appears.

Witness was continuing his evidence when J. B. M. Baxter stepped forward and said he would like to make an application.

"I hear you are considering the fixing of a day for the closing of the evidence in this matter. I submit that it would be unfair to allow the conduct which has been pursued in this case of issuing to the public material simply for the purpose of political exigencies. I submit it is unfair to apply to people who, like myself, are not parties to the case and whose reputations are attacked in the most cowardly and unfair way. It would only be just to let them appear before your tribunal and infuse into the evidence some injective of truth, a thing which it has not had in the conduct of the case hitherto. I was first attacked in an obscure paper, the Carleton Sentinel, which published before evidence had been given before your honor, a varnished and distorted version of what afterwards came out in evidence.
