



Prince De Lieven a Gallant Soldier as Well as Able Diplomat - Bound With Human Skin-Sordid Death of German Nobleman (Copyright, 1912, by the Brentwood Com

Chief of the General Staff of the Russian Navy, to whom belongs the credit for hav-Navy, to whom belongs the credit for having brought to a successful issue the new agreement with France providing for joint action by the Russian and French fleets in the event of war, is an officer who had already won considerable celebrity.

It was he who commanding the cruiser Diana at the outbreak of the conflict with Japan in 1904, took part in that gallant dash of the blockaded Muscovite warships out of Port Arthur in deference to peremptory instructions from St. Petersburg. out of Port Arthur in deference to peremptory instructions from St. Petersburg. It will be recalled that the Russian ships were either driven back into port damaged most beyond repair, or else sunk by the enemy. Only one got away, namely, the Diana, owing to the superior seamanship of her captain, Prince Alexandre de Lieven. Fighting off and escaping at one and the same time from the Japanese cruisers sent in pursuit, he managed to navigate the Diana in safety to the French port of Saigon, thousands of miles away, where she was dismantled in accordance with the requirements of the laws of neutrality, to be held until the end of the war. While at Saigon, Lieven was joined by trality, to be held until the end of the war.

While at Saigon, Lieven was joined by his wife, who had made her escape from Port Arthur through the tightly drawn Japanese lines, by disguising herself as a Chinaman, and under the cover of a blinding snowstorm. In fact, her extraordinary adventures, and the romantic features of her escape, appealed so strongly to the powers at St. Petersburg, that they have long since forgiven her husband for wedding her, their former objectionn to her having been based upon the fact that she was a divorcee, and of birth far inferior to his own.
