New York, Aug. 7.—David Fultz, a local lawyer, who was formerly a star outfielder with the New York Highlanders and the Philadelphia Athletics, intimated last night that the rumors of activities toward forming a union of big league baseball players were true.

"There is nothing of a trade union nature about this," said Fultz. "The players are simply banding themselves to an organization to which they can look as a sort of protective association."

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WILSON IS NOT SO STRONG FOR TOBACCO-CHEWING

Democratic Nominee's Jocular Remarks Taken Seriously, to His Annoyance—Wants Vengeance

Sagitt, N. J., Aug. 7.—Governor Wilson gave the Sagitt correspondents a few of his views today on the daily newspaper of the present time.

"It seems to me," said the nominee, "that there ought to be some method of punishment meted out to those connected with the daily newspapers who are responsible for the misrepresentations and false statements printed."

"Of course, I realize the difficulty of the task set for the newspapers and I recognize the sincerity of their efforts, yet I cannot understand some of the things they do."

"During the course of an address that I made some years ago, I ventured the statement that in small communities public opinion was developed in the cross-street store, where the farmers sat around, chewed tobacco, spit in the sawdust and exchanged ideas."

"I said jokingly that no matter what might be said of tobacco chewing, it must be admitted it made men think, and that wherever you found men chewing tobacco together, there you found the real, public opinion of the country."

"Imagine my astonishment the next morning when the newspapers came out ignoring the rest of my address and featuring what I had said about tobacco chewing, declaring I had said that tobacco chewing made thinkers, and imagine my horror when I found the story following me all over the country and getting worse and worse every minute until in a Dakota paper I was quoted to the effect of a column on the great advantages of tobacco chewing. And can you imagine my chagrin when a big chewing tobacco concern made a photograph of me in a newspaper report and printed it on its advertising page, with the name of the president who advocated chewing tobacco to develop the mind."

"Of course, as you know, I do not smoke and I do not chew tobacco, and I do not intend to do so. For such work as this, I think the responsible one should be punished for that sort of thing is wrong."

WOUNDS BROKEN LEG WITH STEEL BAND AND NAILS

Doctors in Rare Operation Drive Screws into Bone of Miss Coffin of Pittsburgh

Pittsburgh, Aug. 7.—Miss Mary Coffin, daughter of William C. Coffin, of the Jones and Laughlin Steel Company, had a broken leg mended today with a band of steel and some screw nails. The bone, fractured in an automobile accident, would not heal.

Dr. William O'Neill Sherman devised a band of vanadium steel and the screws. With these he fixed the fracture, driving the nails into the bone. These will be left in the injured limb and will cause no ill effects.

The operation, according to surgeons who witnessed it, is a revolutionary one in surgery. Its adoption will mean the elimination of deformities due to faulty knitting of bones.

"The plate will be left there permanently," said Dr. Sherman. "The steel is a kind that will cause no irritation and the bone will knit quickly and perfectly."

Miss Coffin was driving a guest from the Coropola station to her father's summer home when her machine went over an embankment and rolled on her.

\$140,000 FOR KISS PAID BY A WIDOW WHO DIDN'T ASK IT

Paris, Aug. 7.—One hundred and forty thousand dollars for a kiss, and for a kiss given unwillingly. Such is the price, the largest in history, paid by a young, beautiful and tremendously wealthy Parisienne, a widow, for a salute imposed upon her lips by a bogus American banker.

She was blackmailed out of that great sum. Tricked into a compromising situation she paid \$140,000 for silence to a trio of international swindlers. A false policeman was used to scare her.

This astounding fact was revealed by the arrest of the master blackmailer who, at the moment, calls himself Pierre de Courvalles, but who has many aliases. Recently he has adopted the title of Prince De Sagan, the secondary title of Hele, Duke de Talmand, Anna Goude's husband, which he handed over to their son Howard.

When he was taken de Courvalles had \$100,000 in his possession, half a million francs, a great fortune in France.

Palace Destroyed

St. Petersburg, Aug. 7.—The palace of Peter the Great on Petrovsk Island was destroyed by fire today. The fire started in a timber yard and spread rapidly. Several buildings, in addition to the palace, were burned.

WILSON STANDS FOR RULE OF JUSTICE AND RIGHT

Notable Speech in Accepting Democratic Nomination

Downward Revision of Tariff—Trust and Labor Laws—The Philippines—Mercantile Marine

(Canadian Press)

Sagitt, N. J., Aug. 7.—Governor Wilson accepted the democratic nomination here today in a speech in which he defined clearly his stand on the great questions facing the American people, and his interpretation of Democratic principles applied to them.

There are two great questions, he said. One is to set up the rule of justice and of right in such matters as the tariff, the regulation of trusts and the prevention of monopolies, the adaptation of our banking and currency laws to the very time to which our people must put them, the treatment of those who do the daily work in our factories and mines, and throughout all our great industrial and commercial undertakings, and the political life of the people of the Philippines for whom we hold government power in trust for their service, not our own.

"With regard to the tariff duty is the great task of protecting our people and our resources and of keeping open to the people the great opportunities which are offered them through which they must, generation by generation pass if they are to make conquest of their own health, in freedom, in peace and in contentment."

In the performance of this second great task we are face to face with questions of conservation and of development, questions of forests and waterways and mines and waterways and of the development of our mercantile marine.

"In dealing with the Philippines," he said, "we should not allow ourselves to stand upon any mere point of pride. We are not the owners of the Philippines islands. We hold them in trust for the people who live in them."

"With regard to the development of greater and more numerous waterways and the building up of a mercantile marine, the important question is the conservation of forests and waterways and mines and waterways and of the development of our mercantile marine."

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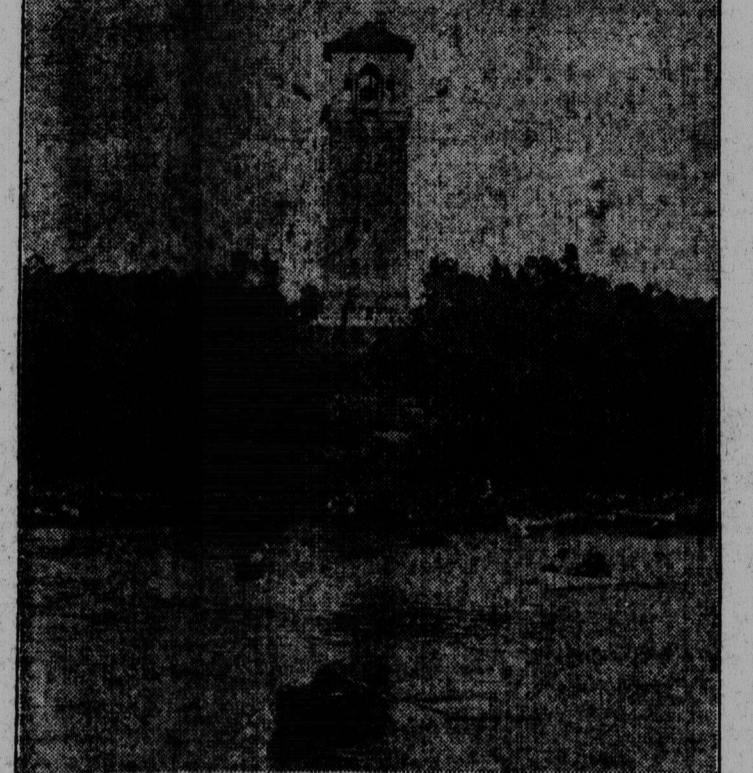
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THE HALIFAX MEMORIAL

TO IDENTIFY PRISONERS AS ROSENTHAL MURDERERS

Chaffeur, Frightened in Their Presence, Refused to do so—Private Detectives Corroborating Rose's Confession—Becker's Father Was Resident of Kingston, Ont.

New York, Aug. 7.—District Attorney Whitman is bending every effort today to secure identifications of "Whitely" Lewis and "Dago Frank" Crozier as two of the men who occupied the "murder car," the night that the gambler, Herman Rosenthal, was shot down and slain.

William Shapiro, the chauffeur of the car, after looking the two suspects over, tremblingly told the public prosecutor that he would not identify them. Shapiro seemed frightened at the sight of the two men.

The chauffeur will be given an opportunity to identify the two men. The lengthy written confession of "Bald Jack" Rose as a basis, private detectives went to work today to secure corroborative detail of his alleged relations with Police Lieut. Becker as a collector of blackmail.

Rose gave the names of ten or more gamblers from whom he had collected graft. These detectives believe that important corroborative information can be obtained from these gamblers, but from members of Rose's household, who Rose says saw him give money to Becker.

Kingston, Ont., Aug. 7.—Employed as a trainman on the Kingston & Pembroke Railway, the father of Lieut. Becker of the New York police force, who has been arrested on a charge of causing the murder of Herman Rosenthal, was for some time a resident of Kingston. He came here from New York state, and in the early nineties, went from here to Redford and then moved back across the border. Lieut. Becker married a girl from Frontenac county.

Waiting for the evacuation by Mexican rebels. Locomotives Ready With Steam Up—General Rabago Moves Northward to Relieve Salazar's Forces

Justus, Aug. 7.—Five big locomotives are held with steam up at the railroad yards here and railway equipment awaits the evacuation of the troops under General Orozco, commander of the rebel forces in the north.

On the checkerboard of the ensuing campaign in the state of Chihuahua there was one move yesterday. General Rabago with his rebels moved north towards where federal, under General Sangines, are supposed to have caught Inez Salazar and his 1,000 troops. Salazar's forces remain at Santiago, according to rebel reports here, and are only a few miles from the federal led by Sangines. It is for this move of Rabago that Orozco has evidently been waiting. Not until yesterday was there any actual preparation for departure here. Now all is ready to leave at an hour's notice. It is clearly a game of check.

Mount Etna Active. Rome, Aug. 7.—Mount Etna is again in eruption, fire, smoke and lava having suddenly burst forth from the crater last night. Several earthquakes, one of them severe, following the eruption, aroused the population of Catania, who rushed into the streets, panic-stricken.

A dense column of smoke was rising from the main crater at midday, and a new mouth has opened on the north-east side of the mountain, throwing out lava and hot stones. At present there seems to be no danger from the disturbance.

Egyptian Cotton Crop. Cairo, Aug. 7.—From reliable data already to hand, it is certain that the cotton crop this year will show a considerable increase over last year's crop, and the quality will be superior.

WHITE SLAVE TRADE IS FLOURISHING IN SWITZERLAND

Many Girls Lured Away by International Gang—Caught by Attractive Advertisements

Geneva, August 7 — In the summer months the Swiss papers contain a large number of alluring advertisements for young girls who are offered splendid places in Spain, Hungary, Argentina, South Africa, etc. Side by side of these advertisements may be read the warning of the Federal Department of Justice and Police to the Swiss girls not to accept a place without full inquiries.

Not only the police, but the Swiss homes in the chief towns in Europe and America, besides several women's societies, undertake inquiries gratuitously on behalf of the Swiss girls going abroad.

In spite of these institutions and notices many Swiss girls are lured away by the international white slave traffic gang, which, like an octopus, has feelers in every large Swiss town.

There are at present many advertisements in the Swiss papers for waitresses in Spain at high salaries, but the Swiss Consuls report that only men are employed in Spanish cafes. Another recent example is that of a well-educated Swiss governess being trapped in Egypt, where her "employers gave" her jewelry and dresses, and then presented a large bill with an ultimatum. The girl's relations and friends subscribed the sum and saved her from a life of shame.

Unfortunately, the penalties in Europe in connection with the white slave traffic are in force only in which are promptly paid, and the persons implicated disappear, to be replaced by other agents of the gang.

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PERSIAN TROOPS REPULSED BY THE EX-SHAW

Turkish Government Denounced by Young Leader

London, Aug. 7.—A mass of Persian police under the command of two Swedish officers, was repulsed today while endeavoring to dislodge Mohammed Ali Mirza, ex-Shah of Persia, from the strong position he occupies in the mountains ten miles south of Shiraz, the capital of the province of Persia, according to a news agency dispatch received here today.

The Constantinople correspondent of the Daily Chronicle, telegraphs an interview with David Bey, one of the Young Turk leaders, whose appeal in parliament to the army has made a deep impression. He stated that the government is plunging the country to ruin by the disregard of law and by its forgetfulness of the enormous services rendered to the Ottoman empire by the committee

ROOSEVELT BEFORE HIS CHICAGO CONVENTION

Leader Wildly Cheered—His Confession of Faith—Panacea for all Industrial and Political Problems—Caters to All Classes and Interests

Chicago, Aug. 6.—After a demonstration which lasted forty-seven minutes, Colonel Roosevelt today delivered his "Confession of Faith" to the "Bull Moose" convention. Colonel Roosevelt's declaration that the ballot was "just as necessary for one side as another" brought a great cheer from the delegates, particularly the ladies.

After talking an hour and a quarter, Colonel Roosevelt started to close his speech. He had omitted about one-half of the prepared speech and some one pointed out that he had forgotten to discuss the tariff.

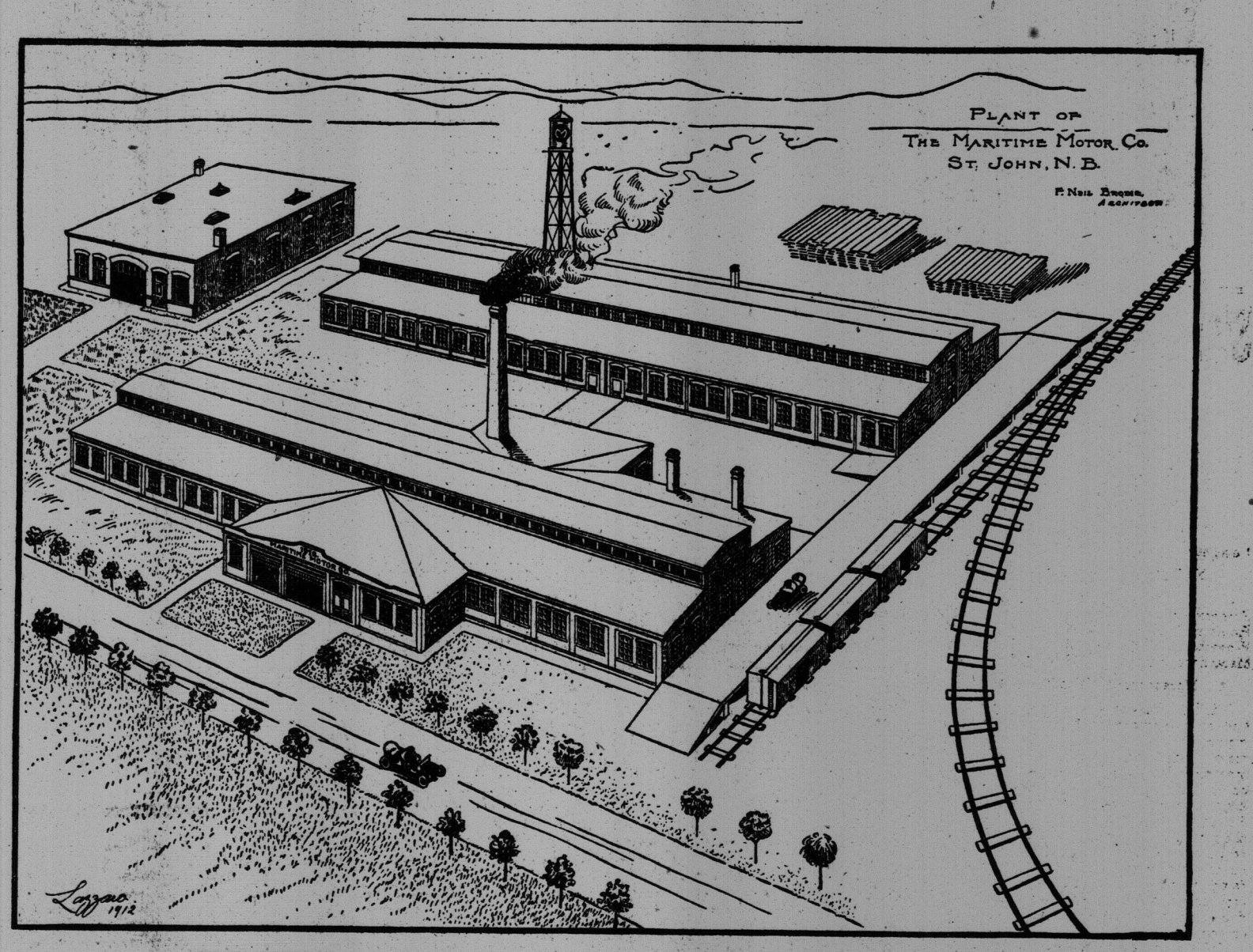

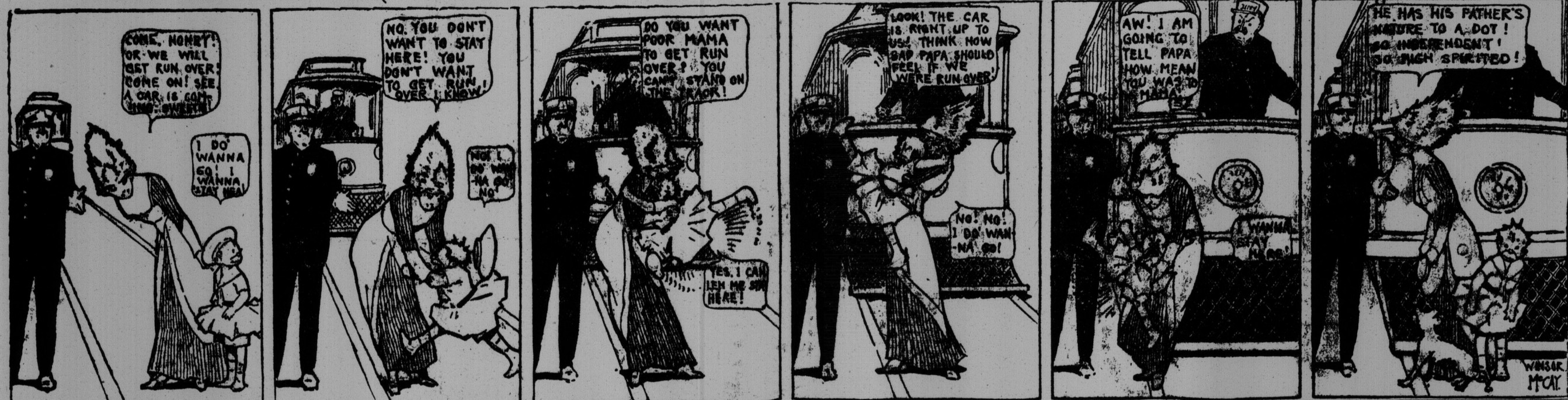

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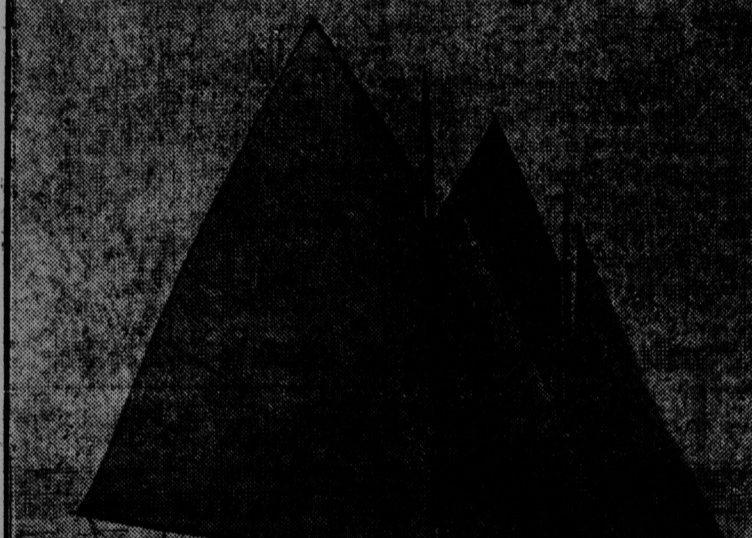

WILL ST. JOHN TAKE A HOLIDAY TO GREET THE ROYAL PARTY?

Merchants and Manufacturers Have Not Yet Decided, But Idea is Received With Some Favour

The question as to whether or not they planned on observing the holiday declared by Mayor Frink on Monday, August 19, when the Governor General and party will be in the city, was asked by the Times of several local retail and wholesale merchants this morning. Some of them seemed to think the query premature, but as the date is only twelve days distant, and from the general feeling of the last so-called holiday during the Old Home Week, there is general anxiety that there should be a definite understanding some time before the event takes place.

A meeting was called for yesterday in the office of the mayor when public spirited citizens interested in the arrangements to be made for the coming of the Duke and Duchess and party were asked to attend, but the number was small. It might be taken from this that but little interest is being attached to the royal visit in some quarters such as to be the case, for some merchants asked this morning, "When are they coming?" However, it is generally thought that the mayor will be supported in his request to have the day observed as a public holiday.

A leading King street firm when asked this morning said that the members had not discussed the matter as yet, but there was every likelihood that the nineteenth would be taken as a holiday in their store, and the same was said by two or three other business and industrial establishments, and these are generally the firms from which many of the smaller establishments take their lead. It is thought that the coming of H. R. H. the Duke of Cornwall and the Princess Patricia will be a matter of more general interest if the holiday is given and the reception would be more cordial and hearty if larger numbers of people are freed from their daily toil.

BRINGS CHEERFUL REPORTS OF THE WESTERN CROPS

Accompanied by his two small children, J. W. Forbes, formerly of New Brunswick, arrived in the city this morning from Winnipeg, where he is now connected with the Immigration department of the Dominion government. He is registered at the Royal, Mr. Forbes when asked as to crop conditions in the west replied in most conditions at present were most promising, but all depended upon the weather. With proper weather conditions the harvest this year would be the greatest ever known and would tax the railways and elevators in its delivery and storage.

Both wheat and barley had prospered remarkably, he said, under the weather conditions and there was general satisfaction throughout the west concerning the crop, although farmers were anxious for a period of dry warm weather to finish the season. Wheat was standing to a distance of some feet and was beginning to bend, so heavy was the burden. A few days of fine warm sun would cause further prosperity to the crop and in the harvest. Every arrangement possible to promote the delivery of the heavy crops was now being made by the railways, and it was no mean task to cope with he said.

LOCAL NEWS

FLOUR CHEAP.
A decline of twenty five cents a barrel in Ontario flour was made this morning. This is the first slump for some time, in fact the first change on the market listing, and it has really been expected in consequence of the encouraging reports from the west regarding the growth of wheat.

FURTHER PROMOTION.
Friends of Wm. J. Doherty, formerly of Douglas avenue, will be pleased to learn that he has been given further promotion in Montreal, where he has for the last few years been in the employ of the C. P. R. He has for some time been in the engineering department, but has recently been promoted to the position of chief clerk to J. E. Gillis, the terminal agent.

ANOTHER GAME ADDED.
A basket ball outfit has been added to the equipment at the Aberdeen playground, to the great delight of the larger children. Mrs. Biliard and Miss Foulis were at this playground last evening, and the teachers and the members of the Every Day Club, is present every evening to ensure good order and free play among the children.

A HINT FOR PARENTS.
The schools open on the 20th of the present month and while there are about 800 to 900 pupils to be taken out, less than fifty have been issued up to the present time. The staff of the school office are anxious that the permits should be taken out early, as it will otherwise mean that all will come together at the last moment. The school board offices are open from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. daily.

TODAY'S POLICE COURT

Five prisoners occupied seats on the prisoner's bench in the police court this morning. James Doyle, aged 40, charged with being drunk and also with using profane and obscene language, was fined \$1 or two months in jail for the drunkenness and a similar amount for the bad language. George Myles, aged 18, charged with being drunk in Brook street, and also with breaking a pane of glass in William Worden's house in Simonds street, was fined \$8 or two months in jail. John Elton, aged 21, charged with lying and lurking in Charles Howard's house in Elm street, was not being able to give a satisfactory account of himself, was also fined \$8 or two months in jail. One prisoner charged with drunkenness was fined a like amount.

James Fox, aged 41, charged with being Captain Griffin of the schooner Rodney Parker for refusing duty on the ship, was ordered to go, as no one appeared against him.

We have also a couple of boys in Charlottetown that will make these St. John lads trot, and if it is speed they want, no doubt they will get on the list. It is pleasing to note the interest the St. John people are taking in the championships.

OTHER LIVES IN DANGER

In connection with the drowning of the little McMillan boy in Kennedy's slip yesterday it may be stated that many residents of Lower Cove have been complaining that almost every day many youngsters congregate about the wharves in the vicinity of Kennedy's slip and often ten times go in swimming there without bathing suits on. That the boys are in constant danger of their lives is illustrated by yesterday's accident, and it is suggested that the police should keep an eye on them, especially as a suitable place for bathing is found in the vicinity at Rockaway Beach.
