QUEBEC COMMITTEE ADOPTS N. B. BILL

PROVINCE MADE CONCESSION TO OBTAIN SUPPORT

Will Hold 5,000 Horse Power at Frontier For Quebec

STORMY SESSION Several Amendments Opposed By Cannon and Michaud, Voted Down

QUEBEC, March 5.—With an important concession to the province of Quebec, the bill of the New Brunswick Hydro Electric Commission went through the private bills committee of the legislative assembly today, but only after a stormy passage, the final vote being 16 to 15 to kill an amendment to which the New Brunswick people objected.

As the matter stands the New Brunswick people agree to hold at the inter-provincial frontier 5,000 horse power at the disposition of the Lieutenant Governor in council of Quebec, this power to be held for a period of three years from completion of the works.

Will Sell at N. B. Price. If the province of Quebec wants the 5,000 horse power, it can obtain it at the same price per horse power, as power is sold for by the New Brunswick Hydro Commission in the Province of New Brunswick.

Representatives of the counties of Rimouski, Temiscouata, and their friends wanted a clause to the effect that the New Brunswick Company, which is now getting Quebec incorporation, must sell power in the territory through which its transmission lines pass in the Province of Quebec.

Lucien Cannon, K. C., M. P., who appeared for the promoters of the bill, led by Hon. J. E. Michaud, minister without portfolio in the Province of Quebec, objected that the Province of New Brunswick could not be expected to go into the retail electric business in the Province of Quebec. It would mean that it would have to make contracts with individual Quebec citizens to supply light and power and generally enter into a series of business deals with companies doing business in Quebec.

Wants Compensation. Jules Langlois, of Temiscouata, argued that three of the parishes of his county would be badly affected by the damming of Lake Temiscouata, which it is proposed to do, and that by way of compensation, in addition to compensation for damaged property, the general law, New Brunswick should support.

WEARING 'EM HIGHER THAN EVER IN PARIS

What? Those skirts? Mrs. Bertram C. Parker, European fashion editor of a New York publication dealing with women's furnishings, was asked if the Olympic passengers' skirts were fair samples of the Parisian designers' latest.

"What? Those skirts?" she asked. "Why, they're only up to the knees. In Paris they come above the knees."

NEW FACIAL MAKE-UP. The increase in facial make-up was described by Miss Nina Boldin, a beauty operator, speaking before the Master Hairdressers Association convention.

The new Paris make-up, she said, includes, in addition to bright red lips, reddened ears and nostrils and blue or brown lidded eyes.

KISSES PROSECUTOR. Abducted Girl's Mother Happy as Prisoner Pleads Guilty.

NEW YORK, March 5.—Gratified by the forcing of a plea of guilty from the abductor of her daughter, Mrs. Anna Broshausen of Brooklyn hugged and kissed the prosecutor, F. X. Goshe, who had been returned to her seat in the rear of the room.

The prisoner was remanded for sentence. Last summer he was acquitted by a jury on a similar charge. At that time he was accused of abducting Ruth Buehling, 9 years old. He also took her out of town, but sent her back to her parents in care of a railway conductor.

TRAINS ARE LATE

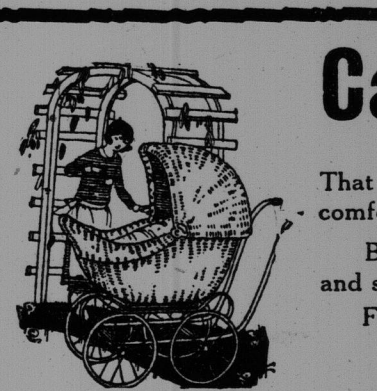

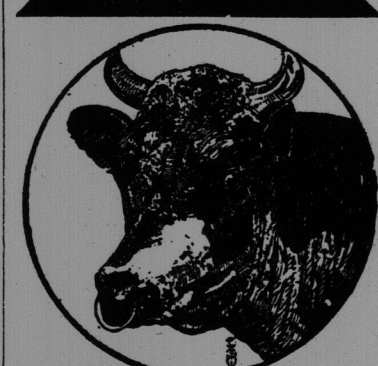

BERLIN, March 5.—Denied permission to have their hair bobbed, high school girls in the downtown section of Berlin have resorted to a novel expedient to bring fulfillment to their desire.

Complaints were made to the police the last 10 days that a supposed Jack "Ripper" had cut off the hair of a number of girls. An investigation was made, and the suspicion of the police was aroused when they learned that, in each case, the girl had brought home the braid of hair which was supposed to have been cut off by the "Ripper."

It did not take long to find that the girls, their parents having refused them permission to have their hair bobbed, snipped off each others' hair. THE COOLIDGE MESSAGE

While the inaugural message of President Coolidge dwells at some length upon what he regards as the importance of maintaining a position of political detachment and independence, the President nevertheless makes some useful and encouraging statements bearing upon world peace.

There is no portion of the message referring to international affairs of more importance than this clear-cut opposition to the theory that the "enjoyment of peace can be maintained only by a great and threatening array of arms."

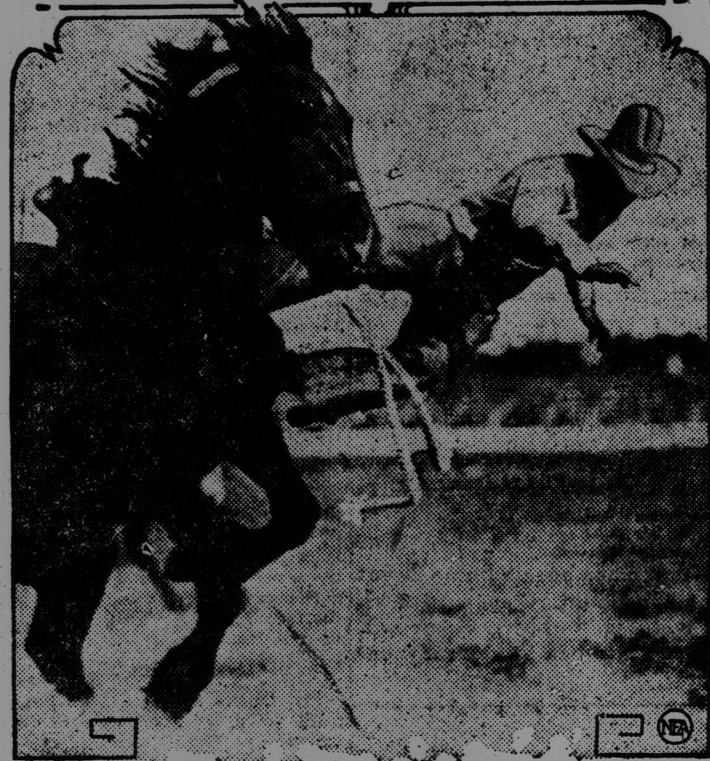

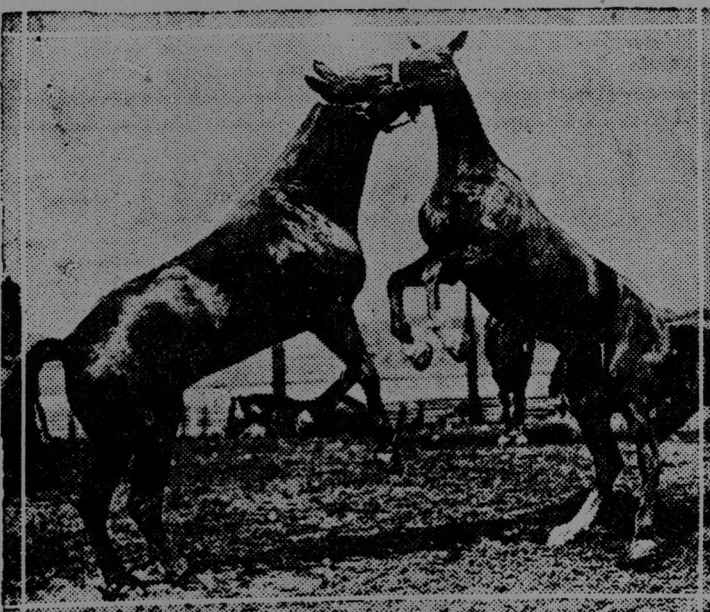

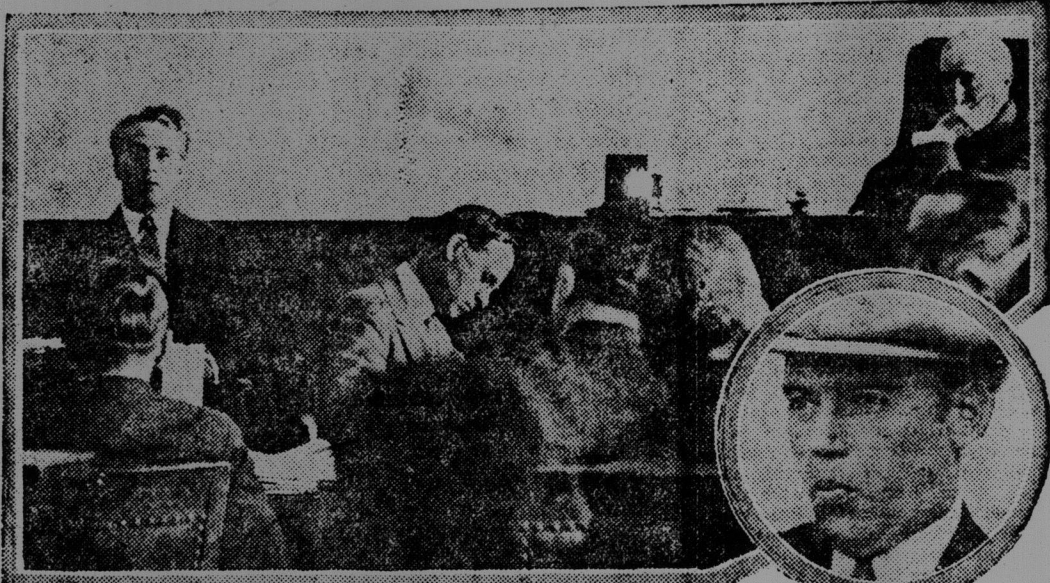

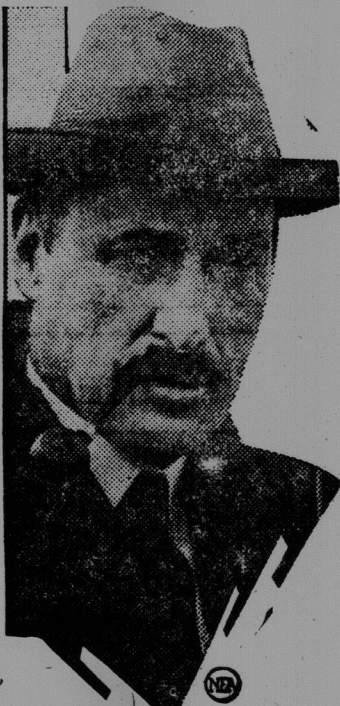

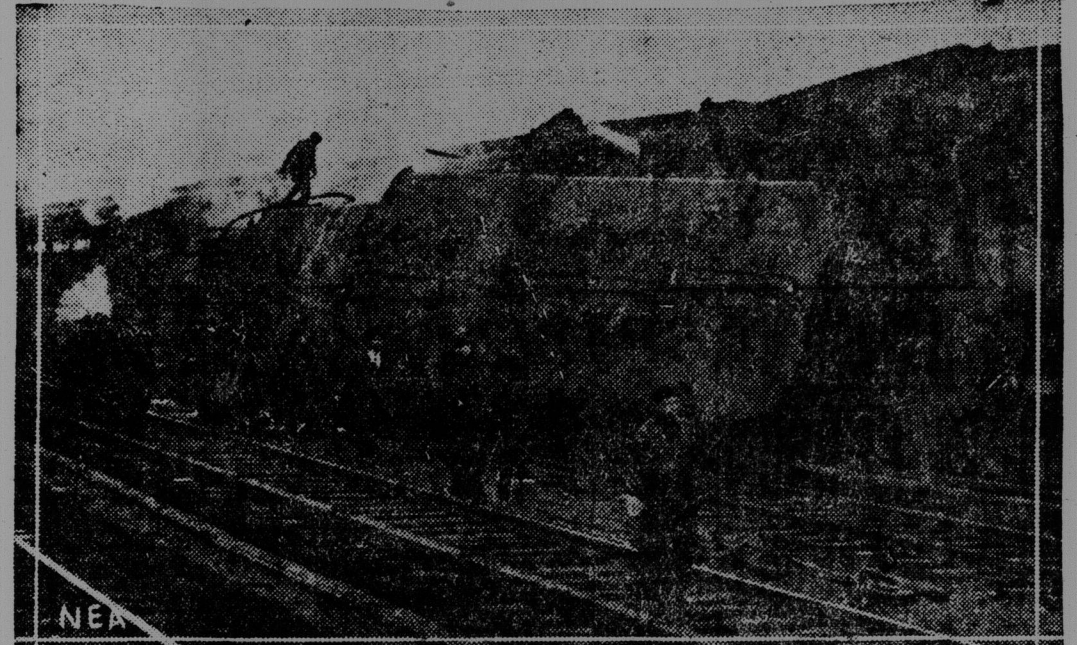

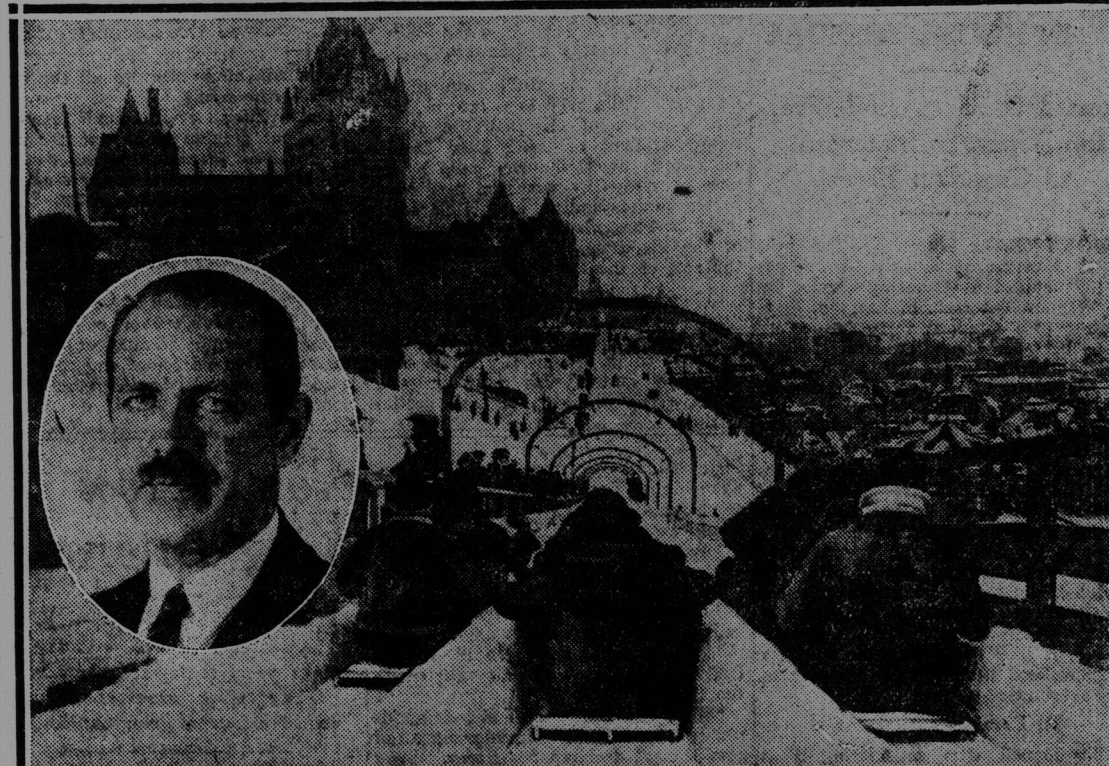

11,000 QUARTS OF CITY MILK UNFIT FOR USE

Inspector Reports Condemnation Last Month to Board of Health

PERMIT OF FARMER ORDERED CANCELLED

Quantity of Beef in City Market Rejected on Account of Condition.

The milk which came to the city from Kings county during February was characterized by J. F. Tilley, milk inspector, as the worst milk that he had ever seen shipped for city delivery. Mr. Tilley, in his monthly report to the Sub-District Board of Health, said that about 11,000 quarts of milk coming to the city had been rejected as unfit for pasteurization and that it was no wonder the producers complained that they could not make money when their returns were greatly lessened by the poor condition of the milk. Mr. Tilley's report was read at the meeting of the board yesterday afternoon when John Kelly, chairman, presided. Preparations were made for the call to the citizens to clean up in the spring time and for the busy period of issuing of milk licenses on May 1.

"Clean Up" Period.
The board gave authority for having 100 posters printed to notify the public that all yards and premises generally, must be tidied up and put in proper order and sanitary condition. An application was received for the opening of a house which the board had ordered closed but which had since been repaired. It was arranged to have the premises inspected and if conditions were satisfactory to have the closing order rescinded.

Report of Inspector.
The report of Dr. T. Fred Johnston, dairy and food inspector, showed that he had carried out the inspection of the premises of 140 milk producers and 15 cream producers located in the following districts: Lakeside, Nauveigewauk, Hampton, Bloomfield, Norton, Aphonauk, Sussex and Hammond River. Three of the premises were scored as dirty and one permit was cancelled. Dr. Johnston also reported on having seized beef in the city market, weighing 648 pounds, which he found to be unfit for human consumption. His inspection of slaughter houses revealed the fact that 70 animals had been slaughtered in the two houses, the smallest number of animals slaughtered

PAIR BEAT AND ROB MONTREAL WOMEN

Culprits Then Set Fire to Boarding House and Make Getaway.

MONTREAL, March 4.—After gagging Mrs. B. Allard, 32, landlady of a boarding house in Jeanne Mance street, and robbing her of \$148 and beating her housekeeper, Ruby Galloway, 23, into unconsciousness this afternoon, two young men, so far unidentified, set fire to the house in four different places in an apparent effort to remove traces of their crime.

By rolling from the house into the yard, Mrs. Allard managed to escape. Firemen, who had been summoned by a passerby, saved Miss Galloway from asphyxiation when they carried her

unconscious from a room on the second floor.

Set Fire to House.
The women's assailants had been roomers at the Allard house and attacked them separately this afternoon. One of them knocked Miss Galloway unconscious while the other attacked Mrs. Allard and took \$148 from her. Following that Mrs. Allard's assailant gagged her and taking coal oil from two lamps spread it over different parts of the house and setting fire to it.

Police are combing Montreal and district for the two men but up to a late hour no arrests had been made.

ASK REVISION OF LIGHTHOUSE RATES

Deer Island Keeper Member of Delegation Waiting on Government.

OTTAWA, March 4.—A deputation of lighthouse keepers representative of 1,500 members of the Canadian Brotherhood of Lightkeepers' Association, scattered throughout the Dominion of Canada, today waited on the Dominion Government presenting two requests:

A—New schedule of wages for light keepers and assistants which they wish the Government to adopt.

B—That keepers of lightships be furnished with motor launches.

A. R. Conley, Deer Island, N. B., was a member of the deputation.

Lower Than in U. S.
In presenting their requests the delegation pointed out that the present wage schedule for Canadian light keepers was on the average 75 per cent. lower than the schedule for similar stations in the United States.

Regarding the request for gasoline launches the petition pointed out that they were to a large degree necessary to the rendering of first class efficiency and service.

Hon. P. J. A. Cardin, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, agreed to give their request his earnest consideration.

COURSE FOR GARAGE MEN.

An intensive course of instruction in automobile mechanics for garage foremen of New Brunswick is being conducted in the garage of J. Clark & Son here.

W. F. Herzog, of the Studebaker corporation, is in charge of the classes. In the work a car is disassembled by those taking the course and it will be assembled again. In this way the features of the automobiles are shown and the garage men become thoroughly familiar with the different parts of the car.

The course will be continued until the end of the week, when the garage men will be better qualified than ever to take care of the automobiles of their customers.
