FIRST SESSION.

WOODSTOCK, WEDNESDAY, 18th June, 1862.] 8 o'clock, P. M.

At which place and time the Synod known as "The Synod of the Presbyterian Church of New Brunswick," met, according to adjournment, in the Hall of the Presbyterian Academy, when the Moderator the Rev. Wm. Alves, having preached the opening sermon from Eph. 1. 22, constituted the Synod. The Roll of Synod having been made out, as far as circumstances permitted, the Moderator proposed the Rev. James Salmon as his Moderator successor, which motion was unanimously agreed to. chosen. Mr. Salmon, on taking the chair, shortly addressed the Court.

The Rev. Mr. Crawford was invited to sit and aid Honorary Members. Synod in its deliberations.

By motion, the Rev. J. Irvine Dunlop's name was added to the Roll of Synod ; also that of Rev. G. Brown, which had been accidentally omitted in published minutes of last year.

Synod agreed to meet and adjourn at the periods of Times of Meetthe day observed on former years, viz. ; For Devotional ing. Exercises, from 9 till 10 a.m. For Public Business, from 10 till 1, and from 3 till 6, and from 71 till 10 o'clock, of each day.

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The Presbytery of Miramichi have to report that they bytery of Mira- have held eight meetings during the past year, but that little important business has been transacted; that shortly after last meeting of Synod, Mr. Fowler received a call from Bass River-a portion of Mr. Law's congregation-and has settled in that locality; that several efforts have been made to terminate the difficulties at New Mills, but without success, and that Mr. Farquharson has been laboring as a missionary at New Carlisle and vicinity during the past year.

The remit of Synod on the subject of Union with the Church of the Lower Provinces, was taken up at meeting of Presbytery in January, and the following resolution adopted. "That the basis of Union proposed is perfectly satisfactory, and touching that part of the resolution which refers to a general representative Assembly and Synod with co-ordinate jurisdiction, the Presbytery are unanimous that such a scheme is altogether unnecessary, and that the pressing of it would only frustrate the union desired; and moreover the Presbytery express their solemn conviction that such a union would be advantageous to the interests of both Churches, and earnestly hope that it might be consummated with the least possible delay." The members of the different committees were re-appointed.

The Presbytery of York beg leave to report that durbytery of York ing the past year they have held the usual number of meetings, that they have elected representatives for the several committees of Synod, and that a considerable amount of missionary labor has been done by its various members throughout the bounds of the said Presbytery. Mr. Salmon has been preaching at Glassville and other stations during the past year. Mr. Stirling and Mr. Smith have been supplying stations in the same way. The Presbytery are glad to be able to state that prayer meetings in some of the congregations are on the increase, that Bible classes are being taught, and that a greater interest is manifested in such classes and meetings than last year. A new church has been opened at Tay Creek by Mr. Stirling, which will tend much to the comfort of the people there. Two churches are being erected at Prince William for the permanent worship of God. The house at Prince William, which was owned by Mr. Glass, has been bought by the congregation, and efforts are being put forth to liquidate the debt remaining upon it. The collections ordered by the Synod have been made with great regularity in the various congregations. All which is respectfully submitted.

"In presenting a brief report of our labors during the st year to your committee, we at once recognize the adness of God in restoring our health, and enabling to fulfil our duties to those stations to which we were

"We entered upon our labors immediately after the last meeting of Synod. We began with Golden Grove, where there is a church and the attendance encouraging -about fifty. Their interest in the ordinances of the church seems unabated as regards regularity of attendance, but their appreciation of religious privileges is very small, judging from the smallness of the contribution-collections and contributions for the year \$19 63. A Sabbath School has been in active operation through out the winter, which promises to be a blessing to the locality, with about sixty volumes of interesting religious reading in circulation, as a nucleus of a library for the school. There is nothing in this district peculiar unles it be the want of professed family religion-a state of things only to be improved by the more frequent means of grace and a more pastoral oversight.

"Lepreaux and Musquash are the next stations which we have visited monthly. The former has but fou Presbyterian families who attend, and the little congre gation which meets in the Temperance Hall is made u of all denominations. We have a more favorable in pression of the moral worth of the Presbyterians Lepreaux, than at some places. They give cheerful their contributions to the Home Mission. We had he ed to have the Lord's Supper administered to those of them who are members of the Presbyterian Church, an a few others who would have united with us for the first time; and thus have kept them in connexion with th great Presbyterian family scattered over the country But the circumstance of the absence of some member of their families (being engaged in lumbering), preven ed the necessary intercourse to so desirable an end.

"At Musquash the Presbyterians are few, and are no so much interested in the services held in the school house at Lancaster Mills, as might be expected. Loc jealousies have some influence on this state of thing still generally the average attendance is encouragingabout forty. Their contributions are generous, bein chiefly from those not Presbyterian. These station visited the same Sabbath, have contributed this yes \$56 87.

The cause is hopeful in some aspects. With the concurrence of your Committee, a church membership has been organized, and the sacrament of the Lord's Supper been dispensed twice. On the first occasion, the 10th Dec., twenty-six sat down, many for the first time, and on the second occasion, forty-seven joined in the commemoration of the Lord's death—many of them being from the Old Kirk. There are no Elders appointed, and I do not

think that the mind of the congregation is yet prepared to choose any of their number to that office. "Contributions to the H. M. Funds for this year, has been \$39 83.

"Enclosed is a full financial statement of the whole receipts and expenditure of these stations for the year ending June, 1862.

MR. DUNLOP'S REPORT.

Shediac Missionary Station takes in the increasing population at the Terminus, the Village, and Cape, and the Scotch Settlement. This might be enlarged at pleasure by comprehending Irish Town and Buctouche.

The Mission was commenced in October last year. A room called the Masonic Hall was rented, in which divine service is conducted generally twice on the Sabbath day, and other places as I can. The attendance, when the weather and other circumstances have permitted, during the winter, has rated from 100 to 200, and on some occasions there appeared to have been as many as 250. A Sabbath School has also been commenced, which promises to be very useful; and a Bible-class has been conducted during the winter, of from 10 to 20 persons, from 50 to 14 years of age, male and female, married and single. The other preaching places are all well attended, according to their respective population. The congregations are composed of nominal Presbyterians, and others in some way or other connected with Episcopalians, Wesleyans, Baptists, Congregationalists, Universalists, Infidels, and occasionally a few Papists. Ungodlinesss fearfully abounds. Profane swearing, Sabbath breaking, and drunkenness prevail to a very great extent. The people receive and treat me with kindness and respect. They are not offended to be told their faults; and, on the whole, there is much to interest and encourage.

The hesitation manifested by the committee, with regard to the carrying on of the mission, the unwearied annoyance and opposition of the Bend Kirk minister, and other things, together with the badness of the times, have all militated against the success of the mission; and the fact that it has succeeded as well as it has, amid all these discouragements, is a strong reason for its prosecution with energy and decision.

To do so, in my opinion, it will be necessary for the committee to place the missionary independent of the people; to get them to help the missionary funds as much as possible; the erection of a new church as soon as practicable; and to restore confidence to the neighborhood with regard to the determination of the Synod to carry

it on. In a few years, with the divine blessing, there is every reason to think that a nice little congregation would be raised at Shediac, and a station formed in a very important locality for meeting the wants of the surrounding settlements. But should the mission be allowed to drop now, it is the opinion of many that the Synod need never attempt to renew it.

I generally preach three times on the Sabbath, and as often during the week as I can.

There can be no doubt regarding the importance of Shediac as a missionary station. Prior to entering upon it as a field of labour, our attention was drawn to it by a letter received by one of the members of the committee from a member of the Prince Edward Island Presbytery, intimating that if the Presbyterian Church of New Brunswick had no objections, the Presbytery of P. E. Island would establish a mission in Shediac. Your committee had previously had an eye on Shediac as an important field, and believing that the church would be unwilling to have it supposed that she was less zealous for the common cause than any other neighbouring church, resolved, if possible, to take up Shediac as a missionary station. 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generally favourable to the establishment of a missionary among them. Shortly after, the Rev. J. I. Dunlop arrived in this province, and, as an eminently suitable person, was engaged to labour among the people of Shediac. He has since been employed there with, your committee believe, excellent results. We believe that nothing should deter the Synod from endeavouring to establish a permament missionary station at Shediac. It is a rising and rapidly increasing village. At the same time, should a missionary be established there, great efforts will require to be made to increase the Home Mission funds.

Your committee regret that intimation has been received by the Convener to the effect that the donation given by the Irish Church will likely be withdrawn, though it is to be hoped that the Convener's remonstrance sent forward may yet have the effect of procuring its continuance. Still, the Synod must in the meantime look to the prospect that we may be cast on our own resources for missionary operations, at least for the pre-Appended to this report is a financial statement sent. of receipts and expenditure, from which it appears that, after liquidating present liabilities, the Home Mission Committee have only to look with certainty to the congregational collections of the present year for means to carry on their operations. These were more than swallowed up last year by claims for special missionary labour. Reverting to Shediac, the people there sent a memorial to the Home Mission Committee, praying that Mr. Dunlop might be continued among them, and promising to contribute to his support to the amount of Your Committee would say that, if possible, the \$170. mission at Shediac onght to be supported ; but stringent measures alone will raise the funds required. The principal points on which Synod will require to decide are: 1st. How to raise the necessary funds.

2d. Where missionaries should be located during the present year.

Herewith is submitted a treasurer's account of the Fund.
