To Owners and Masters of **British Ships**

The attention of Owners and Masters of British Ships is called

75.-(1) A Ship belonging to a British Subject shall hoist the proper national colors-(a) on a signal made to her by one of His Majesty's ships, including any vessel under the command of an officer of His

Majesty's navy or full pay, and (b) on entering or leaving any foreign port and (c) if of fifty tons gross tonnage or upwards, on entering of

leaving any British Port. (2) If default is made on board any ship in complying with this section the master of the ship shall for each offence be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds.

At time of war it is necessary for every British Ship to hoist the colours and heave to if signalled by a British Warship; if a vessel hoists no colours and runs away, it is liable to be fired upon. H. W. LeMESSUEIER,



Now let me give you my way of tell us that a road constructed or rather finished in this way will have no pools of water such as we see after every shower of rain, but will keep fine and dry. Thus we will have a road that will be decent to walk on and a credit to one of the
