The druggist or vendor is to file all certificates, register all sales and make a return of the same at the end

wholesale, except he have a license therefor from the local licensing authority, and be a person exclusively engaged in some wholesale trade. No retail trader in part or whole, can hold a wholesale liquor license. Such wholesale trader can sell only in quantities not less than ten gallons at any one time. He can sell only to the licensed druggists or vendors mentioned before, and to those who he has good reason to believe will, forthwith carry the liquors beyond the limits of the County or City, and of any adjoining County or City in which the act is in force. No drinking of liquors is allowed in any wholesale establishment.

The first step to be taken in any County where the submission of the Act is desired, is to obtain the signatures of at least one-fourth of the Dominion electors to a petition, which petition, when duly signed, is to be deposited with the Sheriff or Registrar of deeds, for public examination for ten days, then forwarded to the Governor-General through the Secretary of State, with evidence that the necessary forms have been complied with. On receipt of such petition, His Excellency issues a proclamamation naming a date on which a vote will be taken, and giving instructions as to the mode of proceeding. The vote is to be by ballot, and to be taken throughout the County or City in one day. The Act contains most satisfactory arrangements for taking the vote, and provides for the prevention of corrupt practices, and the preservation of the peace in connection therewith; it also prohibits the sale of
