Extracts from "The St. John City Assessment Law of 1889."

"Sec. 118. The Assessors shall ascertain, as nearly as possible, the particulars of the Real Estate, the Personal Estate, and the Income of any person who has not brought in a statement in accordance with their notice, and as pequived by this Law, and shall make an estimate thereof, at the true value and amount, to the best of their information and belief; and such estimate shall be conclusive upon all persons who have not filed their statements in due time, unless they can show a reasonable excuse for the omission."

"Sec. 183. No person shall have an abatement unless he has filed with the Assessors the statement, under oath, within the time hereinbefore required; nor shall the Common Council in any such case, sustain an appeal from the judgment of the Assessors, unless they shall be satisfied that there was good cause why the statement was not filed in due time as herein provided."

SULTAN ABOLISHES **UNPOPULAR TAXES**

Suffering in Turkey—New Taxes

to be imposed.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 20 — The announcement by the Turkish newspapers that the Sultan has decided to abolish the tax on domestic animals and the personal tax which were only the greatest satisfaction throughout the country. From the beginning both taxes were thoroughly unpopular, and the attempts to levy them were met with such resistance as to show the amateur financiers at the palace who had suggested these ways of raising money that they had overestimated the patience of the Turkish peasants. In several districts, notably in Albania, Frzerum, and Kastamuni the Mussulman population not only refused to pay the new taxes, but clamored for their abolition, and insisted on the dismissal of the unpopular Valis and other officials. According to some accounts the expense caused by these disorders exceeded the revenue which the government received from the two scources.






