Dr. Talmage on Relations of Employer and Employee.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—At a time when in various districts labor troubles are existing or impending the effort Dr. Talmage makes in this discourse to bring about a better feeling between both sides of this difficult question is well timed.

ABOUT every six months there is a great labor agitation. There are violent questions now discussed between employers and employees. The present "strikes" will go into the past. Of course, the damage done cannot immediately be repaired. Wages will not be so high as they were.
