The Moderator announced that he had associated with himself Rev. J. N. Barnes and Rev. Abner McNinch as a Committee on Preaching Arrangements.

On motion of Rev. J. McLeod, D. D.

1. *Resolved*, That Bro. A. K. deBlois, Ph. D., and W. T. Corey be invited to seats with us.

Rev. J. Wesley Clarke, Corresponding Secretary, submitted the following Report:

BROTHER MODERATOR AND CHRISTIAN FRIENDS :

In presenting the Denominational Report of our work for another year, I am permitted to extend Christian greeting to you all, and to come before you with the words of David, who, speaking of the Church, said : " God is in the midst of her ; she shall not be moved. God shall help her, and that right early."

This promise, so long ago made by the Father, has ever been maintained ; and from the time of the Church in miniature until this day of her world-wide usefulness and power, it has been her support, and she has steadily and successfully moved forward in the great work of evangelizing the world.

Though clouds have sometimes been about her, and unpromising has been the outlook, yet to-day, she can rejoice in the conquering grace of God, and give testimony to the fact, that the prophesies are being fulfilled, and that some day Christ shall reign " from the river unto the ends of the earth."

Sixty years ago we entered upon our existence as an organized body. Many and great changes have taken place since then. Nearly all of the Fathers have "crossed the river," and have taken membership in the Church triumphant ; but He who gave direction and approval for the inauguration of our Church, and has called so many into the work, has been with us all the time ; and during every year many precious souls, feeling their need of the Saviour and bowing penitently at the cross, have passed through the "straits" of regeneration, and entered into work for God.

The year now closing has not been one of revivals in the Churches generally. Yet in some respects it is among the best and most successful of them all—a fact which may be taken as proof that the Lord continues with us, and that "the glory has not departed." With grateful hearts let us acknowledge God,

and go forward with an unwavering faith in Him who has declared that "our labor is not in vain in the Lord."

A very pleasant feature of our report is, that the ranks of our Ministry have not been broken by death during the year.

FIRST DISTRICT.

The annual session of this District was held with the Church at Perth Centre on the second Saturday of July last. The Lord's presence and power were manifested, and the people gave praise to God. Nine Churches reported at the annual session. Of these, three were organized during the year—one by Rev. Henry Hart, and two by Rev. J. J. Barnes.

The Bath, Bumfrau Lower Perth, and Rowena Churches refer to the labors of their Pastor, Rev. J. J. Barnes, as being abundant and successful. Brother Barnes is regarded by the people throughout this District as their Spiritual Director, and his services are constantly brought into requisition.

The Church at Bath report their prayer and conference meetings to be seasons of much encouragement.

The Bumfrau Church has had a hard struggle. They have, however, regularly sustained their meetings; and Pastor and Church are encouraged and hopeful. Three have been added to this Church by baptism.

The Lower Perth Church reports itself prospering.

The Church at Rowena was organized during the year with a membership of sixteen; since which time nine have been added by letter. They are a happy little band, are progressing nicely, and have commenced the building of a house in which to worship.

The Fort Fairfield Church is an organization of recent date. It reported, fourteen added by baptism and nine by letter, a total of twenty-three. Since District Meeting Brother Barnes baptized twelve, gave them the hand of fellowship and united them to this Church. The labors of Rev. Henry Hart were greatly blessed in the sections of this District, in which he labored for two months of the year. He was pastor of the Church at California, and I think the organizer of it also. Brother Hart baptized six, and with twenty others added them to the California Church. Brother Cripps visited the Church at Long Island.

Seven of the Churches have had more or less pastoral care during the year. The same number have held weekly prayer-meetings, five have had the Lord's supper, thirty-nine were added by baptism and thirty-nine by letter: total, seventy-eight.

12 Sabbath Schools, 45 teachers, 385 pupils. This District has had a good year.

Three Churches voted on Baptist Union. For Union, 50; against it, 0; not voting, 3.

SECOND DISTRICT.

This District held its annual session with the Windsor Church on the third Saturday in June. The Conference on Saturday and the meetings on the Lord's day were seasons of much refreshing. Altogether it was a most excellent District meeting.

The Churches at Somerville, Connell, Third Tier, and Victoria Corner, have had the pastoral care of Rev. Gideon Swim. The Somerville Church is reported as being in good working condition.

The methodical and energetic labors of Rev. A C Thompson have been given to the Knoxford, Tracy's Mills and East Bridgewater Churches.

The East Bridgewater Church was organized during the year, and was received into the District Meeting at its last session. It has a membership of fifty-nine, several of whom were baptized by the Pastor.

Fourteen were added by baptism and seven by letter to the Knoxford Church. This Church is stronger than ever before.

The Tracy's Mills Church is in good working condition.

The Knowlesville and Coldstream Churches have received the pastoral attentions of Rev. E. B. Gray. The Pastor spent one quarter of his time with each of these Churches.

The Coldstream Church reports its meetings well attended and seasons of much refreshing.

The Upper Brighton, Pembroke, Hartland, Rockland, and Lower Brighton churches received and enjoyed the labor of Rev. William Downey as Pastor for some months during the first part of the year, when our brother suffered a severe attack of LaGrippe, which completely prostrated him, and his health became so impaired as to render necessary abandonment of his much loved and life-long work. Brother Downey, though considerably improved in health, has not yet fully recovered.

Revivals of much power were experienced in connection with the Churches at Pembroke, and Upper and Lower Brighton. Thirteen were added by baptism and ten by letter, to the Pembroke Church; ten by baptism and one by letter to the Upper Brighton

Church, and fifty-two by baptism and two by letter to the Lower Brighton Church.

Rev. T. S. Vanwart spent one quarter of his time as Pastor of the Church at Charleston, and one half of the time as Pastor of the Waterville Church. Two were added by letter to the Church at Waterville.

Rev. C. T. Phillips is the Pastor of the First Woodstock Church. Brother Phillips has just completed his eighth year of much appreciated service with this Church. The statistics give evidence of good work being done.

The Seventh Tier, River Bank and Gordonsville Churches have had no pastor. They have asked for prayers and ministerial help.

Of the Churches comprising this District twenty-three reported; twenty have had pastoral care; ten have had mid-week prayer meetings, and nine have celebrated the Lord's supper. The number added by baptism is 109; by letter, 63; total, 172; less by decease, 34; net increase, 138. The total membership of this District is 1,690.

Your Secretary is unable to say anything in regard to the non-reported Churches. No information has reached him.

Fifteen of the Churches voted on the Basis of Union; six for and nine against. The total number of votes cast, as reported, was 260; in favor of basis, 131; against it, 129. One Church did not report the number of votes cast. Ten Churches did not vote.

The fifteen Churches with an aggregate vote of 260, report a membership of 1,500. The votes cast are, therefore, about one sixth of the membership of the Churches voting, and are about equally divided.

On motion, it was resolved that the General Conference be requested to so change the Constitution of District Meetings, that any District Meeting may, when it chooses, hold a semi-annual session.

THIRD DISTRICT.

The annual session of this District was held with the Church at Stanley, in York County, on the third Saturday of September. Of the twenty-one Churches comprising this District, sixteen of

them reported. The report states that the five not reported are not in existence.

The Churches at Eel River, Millville, Campbell Settlement, Upper Hainsville and Southampton, have had the pastoral care of Rev. A. H. Bonnell, who has labored faithfully and well. Four were added by baptism to the Church at Upper Hainsville.

Rev. A. G. Downey has had the pastoral care of the Douglas, Prince William, Bear Island and Lower Queensbury Churches. One was added by baptism to the Church at Douglas. This circuit reports a large increase in Sabbath School work. Two new schools were organized.

Rev. F. C. Hartley has spent all his time as pastor of the Fredericton Church. There have been added to this Church, by baptism, eleven; by letter, three. The liquidation of the large debt upon this Church is spoken of as the most pleasing feature in the report.

Rev. J. T. Parsons has had the pastoral care of the Nashwaak and Peniac Churches. Bro. Parsons has also organized a Church at Gibson. The membership of this Church is forty-seven—ten of that number were added by baptism. This Church has in course of construction a fine parsonage, situated in the town of Marysville. They have recently undertaken to build a house of worship at Gibson. The newly organized church was received into the District at its last session.

Rev. R. W. Carpenter has spent a part of his time as pastor of the Stanley Church. Five were added by baptism. They have built a new Church edifice, which was dedicated at the session of the District Meeting.

Licentiate I. Lewis is reported as extending some care with the Church at Lower Canterbury.

Kingsley Church has had some care from Rev. John Henderson and a visit from Rev. G. F. Currie. Five were added by baptism.

All but two of the reported Churches hold monthly conference meetings. Eight of the sixteen churches reported hold weekly prayer meetings.

To the Churches of this District there have been added by baptism, 34; by letter, 44; total, 78; less by decrease, 150; net decrease, 72. The total membership of this District is 1,472.

There were 243 votes cast on the Basis of Union—66 in favor

of it and 177 against it. Twelve were present and did not vote.

This District elected Bro. Woodbury Shepherd for its Clerk, and Bro. Geo. F. Atherton for its Treasurer.

FOURTH DISTRICT.

This District held its annual session with the Church at Lincoln, in Sunbury County, on the second Saturday in September. Many people from the various sections of this District were in attendance at the meetings, which were reported as being refreshing and encouraging to the Lord's people. Of the fifteen Churches composing the District, thirteen of them reported. Twelve by letter and one verbally.

Rev. W. H. Perry is referred to as the faithful and appreciated pastor of Mill Settlement, Patterson Settlement and Blissville Churches. Though none have been added to this pastorate during the year, still the religious interest is good, and the pastor and churches are working with expectancy and zeal.

The Fredericton Junction, Tracey Station and Little Lake Churches have enjoyed the pastoral attentions of Rev. G. W. Foster. The pastor added two by baptism and one by letter to the Fredericton Junction Church, and two by baptism to the Tracey Station Church. Bro. Foster has well and faithfully worked this circuit, which is a good one.

Licentiate A. W. Currie has spent all of his time in caring for the Oromocto, Lincoln, Waasis and Rusagornish Churches. Bro. Currie's punctuality and faithfulness in the discharge of his duties as the overseer of this pastorate has greatly commended him to the people. The Rev. Dr. McLeod has administered the ordinances and otherwise assisted Bro. Currie on this circuit. One was added by baptism to the Church at Lincoln and three by letter to the Church at Oromocto.

Waterville, Victoria, Greenfield and Upper Gagetown Churches have had no pastor during the year, and, with one or two exceptions, have had no preaching. They are all weak and sometimes ready to be discouraged, and your Secretary ventures to say that if these Churches are to be preserved, then in some way provision must be made by which they may be supplied with the preaching of the Word, and with ministerial attention and care.

Nine of the churches have had pastoral care, a part of the time each, during the year. The same number have held monthly conference meetings, and five, weekly prayer meetings. Twelve of the Churches have Sabbath Schools, and four have had administered to them occasionally the Lord's Supper.

The addition by baptism is 5 ; by letter, 4 ; total, 9 ; less by decrease, 19 ; net decrease, 10.

Seventy-three voted on the Basis of Union—35 for it, 38 against it.

FIFTH DISTRICT.

The annual meeting of this District was held with the Tennant's Cove Church, in Kars, Kings Co., on the first Wednesday in July. The meetings were good and the session was interesting and profitable. Fifteen of the Churches reported, most of which were represented by delegates and letters.

The First, Third and Fourth Hampstead Churches have had the pastoral care of R. v. C. B. Lewis. They report the prayer and conference meetings fairly well attended, and a good degree of interest in the general work of the Churches. The pastor's labors, which are faithfully and earnestly given, are greatly appreciated. Bro. Lewis, soon after engaging with these Churches, held some special meetings with the First Hampstead Church, when, though the conversions were not many, a blessed work was done. Many who had backsliden returned to God. Several were converted and baptized, three of whom united with the Church and two others by letter.

The Fourth Hampstead Church feelingly refers to their sad loss by the death of their deacon, the late Oliver Davis.

Rev. L. A. Cosman is reported as extending pastoral labor for one quarter of his time with the Second Church, Greenwich.

The First, Second and Sixth Wickham Churches report the labors of Rev. C. B. Lewis as pastor up to the time of last General Conference. None of these Churches report additions by baptism. One was added by letter to the Second Wickham Church. From this Church has been removed by death one of its best and most interesting members, our late sister, the beloved wife of Rev. T. W. Carpenter. They have also put on record their thankfulness to Almighty God for his many comforts and blessings.

Bro. Lewis was also pastor of the Fourth Wickham Church until last Conference. Since then Rev. O. N. Mott has labored with them one half of the time. They report visits from Rev. T. W. Carpenter and Licentiate S. J. Perry.

Licentiate S. J. Perry has labored half of the time with the

First and Second Johnston Churches. The first named to some extent reviews its history with regard to its influence, labors, spiritual life and success. Fifty-nine years have passed since they were organized as a church. The faithful are still keeping their faces Zionwards, and are trusting in the promises of their Divine Lord.

The Second Johnston Church report their Congregation good, and their conference meetings fairly well attended. They have no prayer meeting during the week.

The labors of Rev. J. G. McKenzie as Pastor of the First and Second Churches, Kars, are highly spoken of. Bro. McKenzie has spent half of his time with each of these Churches, going regularly into the homes of his pastorate, cheering and comforting his people as a true and faithful servant of Jesus Christ. The Pastor received two into the membership of the first named Church by letter. Bro. McKenzie received a serious injury by being thrown out of his carriage, which interfered with his holding special services with these Churches. The prayer and conference meetings are reported as being well attended and regularly held, and as being seasons of much comfort to the brethren.

The Second named Church (Tennant's Cove) has greatly improved their place of worship both in appearance and comfort.

The Fifth Church, Hampstead, has had no Pastor. Their prayer and conference meetings are held regularly; are well attended, and are seasons of much comfort and joy. They also report a considerably large and successful sabbath school.

Licentiate W. R. Reud has been caring for the Upper Hampstead Church since June last, and reports two preaching services on the Sabbath, with an interesting Sabbath School, and a prayer meeting during the week.

Thirteen of the Churches hold monthly conference meetings, and four mid-week prayer meetings. The number added by baptism to the Churches of this District is three; by letter five; total, eight; less by decrease, thirty-seven; net decrease, twenty-nine.

There were 177 votes cast on the Basis of Union; 29 for its adoption; 148 against it. There were 22 present at meeting who did not vote.

SIXTH DISTRICT.

The annual meeting of this District was held with the Millstream Mountain Church on the second Friday in July. It was a season of most spiritual quickening. The reports gave encouragement, and the brethren representing the Churches throughout the District returned to their homes determined to do more than ever for the Master. There were reports from twenty-six Churches.

Rev. A. M. McNintch is pastor of the Sussex, Penobscuis and Dutch Valley Churches. Special meetings were held by the pastor with the Penobscuis Church, with grand results. Of the number converted and baptized, eighteen were received into membership with the Church.

At Sussex one was baptized and united to the Church.

The Midland, Norton Station and Long Point Churches have had the pastoral care of Rev. David Long. There is a good interest in the Churches of this pastorate. The pastor, who is every where highly spoken of, gives faithful attention to his people. He was rejoiced to see a revival at Long Point, which brought much strength to the Church. Among the number converted ten were baptized and united to the Church, and five were added by letter.

The pastorate comprising the Upper Millstream, Lower Millstream, Millstream Mountain, Snider Mountain and Apohaqui Churches have had the pastoral care of Rev. Wm. DeWare. There were no additions. Bro. DeWare's pulpit work is everywhere greatly appreciated, and his congregations are large.

Rev. G. F. Currie has been pastor of the Churches at Moncton, Taylor's Village and Dover. Three were added by baptism and one by letter to the Church at Moncton.

The Coverdale, Victoria Roads and Petitcodiac Churches have been cared for by Licentiate B. Daggett. Four were added by baptism and five by letter to the Petitcodiac Church.

Rev. A. Perry has given pastoral attention to the Lewis Mountain, Second Salisbury, Second North River, Wheaton Settlement and Steves Mountain Churches. Revivals of much power were enjoyed by the Second Salisbury and Steves Mountain Churches. The pastor added eight by baptism and one by letter to the first named, and seventeen by baptism and five by letter to the second named.

The Churches at Corn Hill, Lower Ridge and Portage have been faithfully ministered to by Rev. J. N. Barnes. The Divine favor was given to the pastor in special meetings held with the Church at Corn Hill, where, as a conference, we are assembled to-day, and where we are receiving the kind attentions of the

people. Five were baptized by the pastor, and, with one by letter, were united to the church.

Rev. L. A. Cosman has spent half of his time as pastor of the First Church, Kingston. Bro. Cosman held special services with this Church during the winter. The meetings were well attended and were of much interest and power. Among the number converted eight were baptized, and, with one other by letter, added to the Church.

About all of the Churches reported hold monthly conference meetings and mid week prayer meetings. Only twelve have had administered to them the Lord's Supper.

There have been added by baptism 74 ; by letter, 19 ; total, 93 ; less by decrease, 39 ; net increase, 54.

The District Meeting granted Licences to Bros. Bolten Dagget, and Edwin Cripps.

The vote taken on the Basis of Union was as follows: Twenty-two of the Churches voted. Total number of votes cast, 328 ; for Union, 74 ; against it, 254. The number present at meetings and did not vote was 17.

SEVENTH DISTRICT.

The annual meeting of this District was held with the Church in Carleton on the fourth Saturday in August. Noticeable in all the meetings was the unity of the spirit. It was a great pleasure for the brethren and sisters to meet each other again, and to unite in thanksgivings to God who had safely brought them through the toils of another year.

Another year has been added to the long term of Rev. G. A. Hartley's pastorate at Carleton. St. John. Brother Hartley has completed his 34th year of faithful service with this Church ; his labors have been continuously appreciated and blessed. During the year four have been added to the Church by baptism and two by letter. The prayer and conference meetings are well attended and are seasons of much enjoyment and profit. The Sabbath congregations are good, and the Sabbath school is in a prosperous condition, showing an average increase of twenty for the past year.

The Church on Victoria street, St. John, has had the pastoral labors of Rev B. H. Nobles. Brother Nobles has completed his

fourth year of service as pastor of this Church. During this time he was blessed in leading scores of precious souls to Jesus; nearly a hundred of whom were led by him into the waters of baptism, to follow the example of their Divine Lord. Brother Nobles was also successful in liquidating the debt which was on the Church when he assumed the pastoral duties. During his last year's incumbency, a most beautiful, and in every way comfortable and convenient parsonage was erected and completed. Though there has been no additions during the year, either by baptism or letter, yet, the meetings are well attended, the interest is fairly good, and the brethren are praying for greater manifestations of the Divine power.

The Grand Manan Churches, viz.: North Head, Grand Harbor and Seal Cove, have been faithfully ministered to by Rev. T. O. DeWitt. Brother DeWitt has greatly steadied and helped the Churches of this pastorate. They stand united and are full of encouragement, loyalty and hope. The pastor added four by baptism and one by letter to the Seal Cove Church. The prayer, conference and preaching meetings have been well and regularly sustained.

The Church at White Head continuously receives the faithful and much appreciated labor of Licentiate Irvine D. Harvy. A revival of much power and magnitude was given this Church during the early part of the year. Christians were quickened, and sinners were converted, 29 were baptized and added to the Church. There was joy on earth and in heaven over the repentance of sinners. The special meetings were conducted by the pastor, and assisted by the Rev. G. O. DeWitt, who administered the ordinances.

The Wilson Beach and North Road Churches have had no pastor, but are holding on their way and hoping for better days.

The Church at Beaver Harbor reports as their pastor Licentiate G. A. Eldridge. The visits of Rev. Joseph Noble were much appreciated and helpful.

The Rev. A. H. McLeod has labored for another year with much acceptance and profit to the Churches on Deers Island, viz: Fair Haven, Northern Harbor and Chocolate Cove. Two were added by baptism to the Northern Harbor Church and one by baptism to the Chocolate Cove Church. In these Churches are many interesting and loyal Free Baptists.

The Waterloo Street Church, St. John, has had the pastoral labors of Rev. J. W. Clarke. The report shows the addition by baptism to be four; the work of the Church to be progressive, and the removal of the Church debt, for all of which they thank God and take courage.

Eleven Churches have had pastoral care all or a part of the time. Eight of the Churches have had administered to them the Lord's Supper, and eleven regularly sustain mid-week prayer meetings and conference meetings. The number added by baptism is 42; by letter, 3; total, 45; less by decrease, 34; net increase, 11.

Ten of the Churches voted on the Basis of Union—4 in favor of it, 6 against it. 178 votes were cast—62 for it, and 116 against.

The total number of votes cast on the Basis of Union, 1,309; for its adoption, 447; against it, 862; number present and not voting, 54.

The total number of Churches comprising the several Districts is 148, of which 116 reported. One hundred and twelve of the Churches have had pastoral care for the whole or a part of the time. The total number added to all the Churches by baptism is 306; by letter, 177; total, 483; less by decrease, 313; net increase, 170.

It is impossible to say what the total membership is, the several Churches reporting verbally having given few or no statistics. A careful examination of our work during the year affords us great reason for thanksgiving to God. His blessings to us all have been many. As we enter upon the new year, let us gird up our loins afresh, and with increased earnestness and faith go about our

"Master's work," encouraged by the promise, "Lo, I am with you
 always, even unto the end of the world."

BROTHER MODERATOR:—Your Delegate appointed to attend the Maine State Association of Free Baptists, respectfully reports that as best he could he attended to the duty assigned him, and at the appointed time wended his way to Pittsfield, the place of meeting. At my urgent request Bro. Jos. Noble accompanied me. On our arrival at the station we were met by the Reception Committee, and were assigned to comfortable homes. Their first session was the Ministers' Conference. A card of invitation was issued to Bro. Noble and myself, to meet with them in their deliberations; and we greatly enjoyed listening to their discussions upon various subjects. The entire meeting was run according to a definite and carefully prepared plan—topics, papers, and speakers for all the time being arranged for. The reception of Delegates did not occur until the last day of the session. There were ten Corresponding Delegates from different religious bodies present. At the appointed time your Delegate reported to this Conference, compiling his statement from the last published report. From the report of their Cor. Secretary I gleaned the following facts:—They report 256 churches; 141 ministers; 14,140 recorded members; 9,400 of these resident; and 457 additions by baptism last year. They have two fine educational institutions in the State—the Maine Central Institution at Pittsfield, and Bates College at Lewiston. Your Delegate referred to our pastorate system, our con-

nection with the Saint Martins Seminary, and our stand on the temperance question; also to our polity and our loyalty to British connection. The qualifications we demand of candidates to our ministry I stated were: 1. Piety, which comprises a good conversion, and a good moral character. 2. Common sense. 3. A definite call to the work of the Gospel ministry. 4. Culture. Your Delegate is conscious of the fact that a more worthy representative from this body might have been sent, but, grateful for the honor conferred upon him, did the best he could.

S. L. Peters, Esq., Corresponding Secretary of the Executive Committee for Sabbath Schools, submitted the following Report:

BROTHER MODERATOR :—The facts as gleaned from the various reports that have come into our hands from the Sabbath schools in the different Districts are of the most cheering character. We have therefore very great pleasure in presenting them to this Convention of Sabbath School workers in General Conference assembled.

It will be noticed that there is important increase reported in the number of schools, pupils and teachers in the First, Third, Fourth, and Fifth Districts. This increase is sufficient to bring up the total number of schools reported considerably in excess of of the year 1890.

First District reports six schools, with a membership of 251 pupils and 28 teachers; a gain of 2 schools, 83 pupils and 10 teachers over last year. Those reporting are Arthurette, Perth, Bumfrau, Bath, Foster's Cove, and Mineral. Upper Kent and Long Island have failed to report. The reports speak encouragingly of the work and report three conversions.

Second District reports eight schools, with a membership of 457, with 46 teachers, and 28 conversions. Those reporting are Knoxford, Gordonsville, Woodstock, Lower Brighton, Mount Pleasant, Waterville, Pembroke and Rockland; while Tracy's Mills, Knowlesville, Third Tier, Seventh Tier, Windsor, Victoria Corner, Hartland, Upper Brighton, Somerville, Cold Stream, Connell, fail to report. It is the committee's hope that this large and influential District, in the years to come, will furnish to its District Clerk a report from every Sabbath School within its circuit, so that the most complete and satisfactory knowledge possible to obtain may be in your possession.

Third District reports 10 schools, with 686 pupils and 63 teachers; increase over last year, 2 schools, 224 pupils and 16 teachers. Seven conversions are reported. Schools reporting are Upper Hainesville, Lower Prince William, Central Southampton, Fredericton, Lower Queensbury, Campbell Settlement, Mouth of Keswick, Marysville, Bear Island and Douglass.

Fourth District reports 10 schools, 635 pupils and 48 teachers; increase over 1890. 2 schools, 148 pupils and 8 teachers. Six conversions are reported. Schools heard from are Greenfield, Waterville, Upper Gagetown, Blissville, Waasis, Patterson Settlement, Mill Settlement, Tracy Station, Fredericton Junction, Lincoln, Rusagornish.

Fifth District reports 13 schools, 472 pupils and 48 teachers, as against 9 schools, 312 pupils and 33 teachers last year. Two conversions are reported. Schools heard from are Hampstead, Upper Hampstead, Jerusalem, Hamilton's Mountain, Wickham,

Hibernia, Upper Otnabog, Bald Hill, Shannon, Oak Point, Belleisle Bay, Perry's Point, Akerly, and Narrows.

Sixth District reports 19 schools, 986 pupils, 76 teachers, as against 24 schools, 1,189 pupils and 209 teachers last year. Thirty-four conversions are reported. Schools heard from are Lower Mill Stream, Corn Hill, Norton Station, Mill Stream Mountain, Eagle Settlement, Sussex, Kingston, Upper Mill Stream, Penobscuis, Coverdale, Apohaqui, Wheaton Settlement, Snider Mountain, Long Point, Dover, Midland, Taylor Village, Butternut Ridge, Waterford.

Seventh District reports 11 schools, 1,337 pupils and 113 teachers, as against 9 schools, 1,112 pupils and 91 teachers last year. Twenty-four conversions are reported. Schools reporting are Waterloo Street, St. John; Carleton, St. John; Victoria Street, North End, St. John; North Head, Fairhaven, Grand Harbor, Chocolate Cove, Wilson's Beach, Seal Cove, White Head and Beaver Harbour.

We note with very great pleasure the steady increase of schools that are favoured with pastoral attendance and care, also the increase in attendance of Church members. In both cases the result must be beneficial. Very many of the Superintendents, in their reports, speak of a want of teachers in their schools. The correctness of their statements is made very apparent by examining their returns, for instance, the First District has 251 pupils enrolled with 28 teachers, equal to 9 pupils to each teacher. The Third District has a teacher for every 11 scholars; The Fourth District has a teacher for every 13; The Fifth District a teacher for every 10; The Sixth and Seventh Districts, a teacher for every 11.

Your committee venture to express the hope that largely increased numbers of our Church membership will see it to be their duty to enter more actively into Sabbath school work, and supply the great want felt in this department.

It is a matter of record, "that as a denomination of christians we neither undervalue, nor ignore the usefulness and work of the Sunday school." Nay, more, we have reached that period in our own history, when it is universally admitted to be a necessary aid to the Church, and therefore entitled to our best efforts.

Reports of the most satisfactory and cheering nature have reached us, with reference to the services held in our Churches and schools on the Children's Sabbath; we therefore recommend its continuance and observance for the next year.

We have as far as possible given you all the facts in connection with the year's work. They are, in very many respects, gratifying and encouraging.

Your committee desire to express their appreciation of the very helpful assistance received by our Sabbath Schools from the Field Secretary of the New Brunswick S. S. Association, Rev. A. Lucas, whose timely visits and words of cheer every Sabbath School worker so heartily appreciates; and we feel sure we express the sentiments of this Conference when we bid that Association "God speed" in their efforts in this branch of christian work.

Let us not relax our efforts. The field is widening before us; and the calls are urgent. And while all may well unite in giving to God praise for the measure of success we have enjoyed during the year, let us resolve to give our best efforts to the work in the coming years.

Rev. J. W. Clarke, from Committee on Education, sub-
mitted the following Report :

BROTHER MODERATOR :

The principle duty of your Committee on Education this year
is to report concerning the Union Baptist Seminary. At the last
Session of Conference the affairs of the Seminary were quite fully
considered. At that time its very existence was threatened;
financial burdens were bearing heavily, and there was a fear
that they might crush it. But your Committee is greatly pleased,

to be able to report that the crisis of that time has been safely passed, and that great encouragement has been given us concerning the future prospects of our educational institution at St. Martins. We believe the institution to be well prepared to meet the needs of our people in academic and christian education.

1.—The debt, sickness, a small attendance of students, and the resignation of the honored Principal, Rev. Dr. Hopper, made the past year one of gloom and sadness. The first token of the coming light was the raising, through the successful efforts of the Rev. Dr. deBlois, and Rev. Dr. McLeod and others, of the \$15,000 which covered the amount of the Institution's most pressing liabilities.

2.—The ill-health of Rev. Dr. Hopper, who had so faithfully discharged the arduous duties of his office, compelled him to resign at the close of the winter term. The present Principal, Rev. A. K. deBlois, Ph. D., was appointed in his stead.

3.—The number of students in attendance during the year was seventy-two, including day pupils, a less number than in any previous year. There were about thirty boarders in the building.

4.—The christian influence and religious meetings of the institution were such that several of the students professed religion. The classes in Bible study, which have for some time been a special feature in the work of our school, were conducted as heretofore, with great success.

5.—In addition to the raising of the debt, the interest on the mortgage for the next five years has been almost entirely secured. This relieves the directors of an embarrassment that has hampered their work ever since the Seminary was built.

6.—During the summer months the Principal worked earnestly and successfully in the interests of the school, visiting churches, District meetings and Associations, and he found in all directions an awakening enthusiasm and warm desire for the prosperity of our educational work at St. Martins.

7.—As a result, the Seminary, which re-opened on the 15th ultimo, has a splendid attendance, every room being taken, and all the indications pointing toward a successful and prosperous future.

8.—The staff of teachers engaged for the present year is of superior character. They are specialists, and are enthusiastic in their work and devoted to their students.

9.—The Elocution Department has been connected with the Boston school of expression, a fact which will give our institution prestige abroad as well as at home.

10.—There are now fifteen teachers and fifty-one students boarding at the Institution, and an enrollment of over seventy. The number enrolled will considerably exceed one hundred before the year ends. Never has the Institution opened under such favorable auspices. An earnest purpose of diligent study prevails amongst the students, who are themselves a fine body of young people.

The plan for the establishment of a summer school, now being agitated, is likely to prove a success, and will be of great value to the Seminary in its general work.

The Churches of the Free Baptist denomination are reported as having shown a deep interest in the Seminary during the past few months, and we have reason to believe that our Churches will be a source of great help to the school, and the school a source of power to our Churches through all the future.

Prayers, and faith, and work will make our Christian school at St. Martins the peer of any school of the kind in the Dominion.

Our ministers may contribute to the greater success of the school by talking to their people about it and encouraging our young people to attend it. They may also secure subscriptions to the funds of the institution, which are much needed; for while it is past the difficulty which so seriously threatened it, there still remains the need of the hearty and generous support of all who are anxious for the success of this important part of our work.

Among the pupils just now, we are pleased to learn, there is a marked religious interest.

The young men, candidates for the ministry in our denomination, who have been students at the Seminary, have profited much by the training they have received there. All the young men who are looking towards the ministry amongst us, should be required to study there, and so far as they need assistance in pursuing their studies, it should be given them by this Conference.

BROTHER MODERATOR:—The Committee on Literature beg leave to report the following: Living in an age when the printing press is furnishing the world with all kinds of literature, some of which can be purchased at very little cost, and is often read by the young with injury to their morals. We therefore should be careful that all books and papers placed in the hands of the young in our Sunday Schools be of such a class that would help to build up character as well as satisfy the intellect.

We, your committee, have reason to fear that the "International Quarterly," while it is a help to the pupil in preparing the lesson, is used by the class nearly altogether in place of the Bible, and if

its use is not curtailed in the class will eventually have a tendency to detract from the love and sacredness that should be given to the Divine Word of God. We would therefore recommend that pastors, superintendents and teachers endeavor to limit its use in the class.

We, your committee, would further suggest that every effort be made by pastors and others in placing the "Religious Intelligencer" in every Free Baptist home in our province during the coming year, as we believe it will be a stimulant in keeping our young people within the pale of our denomination.

BROTHER MODERATOR :—Your Committee on Temperance, in submitting their annual Report, are glad to be able to note that despite the great obstacles in the way, the grand temperance reform is still moving forward on the same lines as last year, viz. : Moral suasion for the drinker, and legal suasion for the drink traffic ; and it is rapidly forcing itself into the forefront of the political issues of the day. Now the concensus of opinion in Canada is a unit in regarding the drink traffic as a great evil, and the thought of the day is focussed upon it to devise means to handle it in a way that will best conserve the interest of the home, the community and the State.

1.—Your committee would reiterate the expressions of this Conference in previous years ; our attitude to the drink traffic has ever been that of uncompromising hostility, and we do not believe that the traffic can be legalized without sin ; hence, we are firm believers in the principle of prohibition.

2.—We believe in holding on to all the Prohibitory Temperance Legislation we can get. Hence, we believe in the Canada Temperance Act, and other local option laws as tending toward the goal we seek to gain, viz. :—Total Prohibition of the liquor traffic.

3.—We are glad to note that the Temperance sentiment of our

country, that so forcefully expressed itself in the Prohibition petitions sent to our Federal Parliament, caused the Government to give some attention to this great question, and to appoint a Royal Commission to make enquiries as to the feasibility of enacting such a law. We hope that the results of their investigation will establish beyond a doubt the feasibility, or the necessity of enacting such a law right speedily.

4.—Your committee would recommend that our ministers, at least once every three months, make the subject of Temperance the theme of their pulpit utterances, that the principle of moral suasion may be kept in active operation, and your committee hope that also in our Sunday schools this great question may receive the attention that it demands.

5.—Your committee repeat the recommendations of last year, that our Temperance committee be empowered to co-operate with like committees from other religious bodies to the end that all the Temperance forces may be united in their efforts.

BROTHER MODERATOR :—In attempting to place before you the report of this department of denominational work for another year, your Board desire at the outset to acknowledge the Divine favour which has crowned with a good measure of success the efforts put forth. God hath not forgotten to be gracious.

During a portion of the year two missionaries—Rev. O. N. Mott and Bro. W. R. Reud—have labored, under the Board's direction, with the Churches at Upper Hampstead and Castalia and surrounding sections. Much good has been accomplished, especially at Upper Hampstead, where the Church has been greatly awakened, and the Sabbath School re-organized.

In the First District Rev. J. J. Barnes has been pastor of some of the Mission Churches, and has had a general supervision of others, and as the result a marked improvement in the condition of these interests is manifest to even the casual observer. Our other missionary pastors are Revs. T. O. DeWitt of Grand Manan, R. W. Carpenter of Stanley, L. A. Cosman of Kingston, G. F. Currie of Moncton, J. N. Barnes, Corn Hill, H. A. Bonnell and Bro. Isaac Lewis of the Third District. All these brethren have been greatly blessed in their work, Bros. DeWitt, Cosman and Currie enjoying special revivals.

More information regarding our Mission Churches which would have been interesting to you, and desirable to have, we have been unable to obtain, owing to the fact that the blank forms recommended in the report of last year were not issued.

This, however, has come to our knowledge : That twenty-six Churches have had no pastoral care during the year, and thirty-five of them no privilege of observing the Lord's supper. It should be a source of regret to us all that these brethren, needing and desiring to commemorate the dying love of our Lord, should not have the privilege to do so, because, from a lack of men or means, they have not the ministrations of a regular pastor, and

your committee would suggest that some ways or means be devised by this body to remedy this sad state of affairs.

The interest in our Home Mission work, is not what your Executive think, might easily be awakened, and therefore recommend that the suggestions contained in the report of last year relative to the appointment of an itinerant missionary or superintendent of missions, and also concerning the originating of plans for the systematic collection of funds for this and other departments of denominational work be carefully considered by this Conference in its present session.

We are living in an age of intense activity in business, scientific and religious spheres. As a part of the religious world we must keep abreast the times or suffer the consequences. While others are using sanctified intelligence in planning, and sanctified powers in prosecuting their work for Christ, we must not be indifferent.

Hence we emphasize our recommendation regarding these suggestions, for if the various interests with which we are identified as a denomination are to prosper our Home Missionary work must not be allowed to languish, but must be vigorously prosecuted.

Let us be faithful to the charge divinely given us, and "the God of peace that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus Christ, that great shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant shall make us perfect in every good work to do his will, working in us that which is well pleasing through Jesus Christ."

Foreign Mission Report.

BROTHER MODERATOR.—The work of the Free Baptist Mission in India has gone on during the past year much as in general late years. The report, issued from the Mission press, says :

"We cannot report such large results as some of our neighboring missions, but we can report an honest effort. How faithful we have been we do not attempt to say, and while the figures do not show such gains as last year, yet we trust that in the Last Great Day, the fruits will appear. Bengal and Orissa as yet have not been moved by any great turning to Christ. Southern and Northern India have had great waves of power, which turned thousands of Hindus into Christians, but the missions which have been so successful both north and south, in their work in Bengal and Orissa, have reports like our own. In intellect, education and official position, the Bengalis stand first in India, and have aptly been called the "Yankees of India"; for this reason, perhaps, the work among them has been slow, but not discouraging. Each year shows a healthy growth of the Church. By and by we expect to turn the excellent powers of this people to the work of Christ's Church. When that time comes we shall expect to see mightier works than ever before in India."

All the departments of work have been carried on with zeal. But in no year has the work been so broken by sickness and death, so that the year has been one of anxiety and weeping. But in spite of all, progress has been made, the mission is promising, and there is need of more help from the home Churches, both in laborers and money.

New Brunswick's part in the work is now smaller than for many years. Miss Hooper's health having necessitated her return, Mrs. Boyer alone is the representative of this Conference in the foreign work. Her report, which is appended, shows the character of the labor she has been doing during the year, the extent of it, and, so far as possible, to ascertain and set them forth the results. There is also a statement of the needs of the field, and an earnest appeal for help in the great work.

The situation certainly appeals to us—appeals strongly, and we ought not turn a deaf ear to it, nor allow ourselves to think it a matter of indifference whether we respond. God is calling His people everywhere to larger undertakings for the evangelization of

the world. Shall we fail to hear His voice and go forth at His command?

The field entrusted to Free Baptists in India is large and very important. The census of this year shows the population of the district to be 3,610,995. There are only twenty missionaries—seven men and thirteen women—laboring in this vast district, amongst these millions of benighted souls. Sickness and death have diminished the number of missionaries, so there are now several less than a year or two ago. We have but one, the devoted and efficient Mrs. Boyer, who, bravely bearing her great bereavement, toils on faithfully and with a good degree of success.

Is the sending of one missionary to the heathen our full part of the work which God calls His people to do? is a question we need to consider.

We have, according to the reports of this year, 148 Churches, with a membership of nearly 12,000. From all these the contributions for Foreign Missions during the past year amount to \$1,674, of which amount \$950 was raised by the W. F. M. Society. Must this amount be regarded as expressing the depth and extent of our interest in the cause of Christian work among the heathen nations of the earth? We are not a poor people. While we may not have great wealth, our Churches are composed of people who are, very generally, in comfortable circumstances, and quite able to meet all the demands which their Christian profession and the needs of God's cause make upon them. Freely we have received of material bounties and of God's grace, and freely we should give for the help, enlightenment and salvation of those who are in darkness and the shadow of death.

Brethren, we owe it to our Lord, whom we love and who is to have "the heathen for His inheritance and the uttermost parts of the earth for His possession," to the benighted and lost of the human race, and to ourselves for the nurture and development of the spiritual life in us, and for the greater efficiency of the work at our own doors—to enlarge our practical interest in the cause of the world's evangelization.

A recent writer well says: The greatest work in the world is that marked out by our Lord Jesus Christ, to be accomplished by His followers between His ascension and his return, viz: This Gospel of the Kingdom shall be preached in the whole world for a testimony unto all nations; and then shall the end come. Again, more definitely, after the resurrection, His last words were, "All authority hath been give Me in heaven and on earth; go ye, therefore, and make disciples of all the nations, . . . and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

Can it be that, having "heard these solemn and definite words so frequently, they have become trite and almost powerless." We ought to "recognize in them an utterance of the mightiest possible significance to every kindred, tribe and tongue; which compasses a work so large that after eighteen centuries it is far from complete, and which may yet rise up in judgment against us, and which will certainly condemn us if we are unfaithful to the duty imposed.

The Executive for Foreign Missions suggests.

1. That there should be raised this year not less than \$1,200. They regret to have to say that the amount asked for last year was not raised, the deficiency being \$474, but earnestly hope that there will be no deficit this year.

2. That the pulpits of the denomination more frequently direct the attention of the people to this great work; and that steps be taken to distribute missionary information in the Churches, Sunday-schools and homes of the denomination.

3. That a missionary prayer meeting at least monthly, be established in every church, and that earnest prayer be offered that God will raise up amongst us young men for the foreign work. "May not the fact that none amongst us are offering themselves for the work be attributed to the lack of missionary spirit in our Churches and the little earnest prayer made for the work and the workers."

4. That public missionary meetings be held in all the Churches, neighboring pastors arranging to assist each other in such meetings.

5. That each Church adopt a plan of raising the amount assigned to it, which will assure the contributions being forwarded to the Treasurer promptly each quarter—January, April, July and October.

We cannot too strongly press the importance of this branch of Christian effort upon our people. Neglect of it is sure to bring spiritual poverty to us. The Lord grant that the year we now begin may witness a great revival of missionary interest and zeal in all our Churches. The result will be a forward movement in the struggling mission in India, and the strengthening and increased prosperity of home work.

Mrs. Boyer's Report.

To the Brethren of the Foreign Mission Board :

DEAR BRETHREN.—The time has come round for me to send my annual report to you. It is now nearly six years since we bade you good bye at the Conference and sailed for India. We three are widely separated, but I, here alone, am still glad that God called us, and believe there was no mistake. Perhaps it has been the discipline of sorrow, perhaps the kind Father's bountiful provision of grace sufficient for the need, but I believe this has been the best year of my work in India.

I can give you statistics and reports of my work here, and to a certain extent I will, but all these seem to come far short of reaching the great throbbing heart of the thing we call missionary work. When I tell you that 38 boys call me mother, and many of them know no other, you will understand better what I mean. Thirty-eight orphans, waifs, beggars, provided with a good home, food and clothing, and educated to make good and useful men; that is what I have been trying to do during the year. I believe the spiritual element has been growing. Several boys and the old woman who cooks for them have been converted. The older boys, and even the young Christians, have been enabled to reach out after and help others. By getting more and more into their confidence I have been able to help them more myself. The prayer offered in secret with a wayward one, the quiet talks at bedtime, the word of admonition in the quiet of my room to another, has bound the boys to me and helped me as much as it has them.

At Ujurda the visible signs of success are not wanting. The fine large school-house is finished; two teachers are employed and nearly 40 scholars enrolled. Not far from the school-house Dannie and family are comfortably installed in part of Soni Barik's house until his own can be built. The church numbers nine, one having died soon after his baptism. His five children had been put in the Orphanages. Dannie has prayers on his verandah every night. He teaches these babes in the Divine way the simple Gospel truths and the ten commandments. My heart was touched and gladdened to hear their simple prayers of faith. The women have similar instruction under Dannie's wife. She is a gentle, modest little woman. The Spirit of God has taken hold of her since coming here, and of her own accord she began to go about in the village singing and talking to the women. I have persuaded her to begin work regularly, and another Christian woman from Balasore accompanies her.

At Singla, four miles from Ujurda, Besu and wife still keep up

their village work. Singla is by far the larger and more important place, but it was not the comparatively wealthy and educated people of Singla who accepted God's truth, but the poor, ignorant low caste people of Ujurda. Dannie goes to Singla every week to attend the large markets held there and preach to the crowds.

I held a prize-giving for the seven Hindoo girls' schools in March, and then gratefully made them over to Dr. Nellie Phillips. She is holding them till some one else comes, but she has more than she ought to do without them. It is so hard to let old established work fall, even when there is no one who can properly assume its responsibility. I have not been able to give my two Bible women as much attention as they should have had. They have been regular at their work, and since Miss Hooper left Uma one of her women has gone with them,

During the most of the year six Hindoo Sunday-schools have been kept up. They have been mostly taught by the young men of our A. C. F. They go in pairs—an active and an associate member. The time is Sunday morning before service. They disperse to the different villages and I visit them by turns, one each Sabbath. I look upon the good done the young men as almost, if not quite, equal to that done the children.

The A. C. F. meets at my house every Sunday evening. Since the revival meetings last March the interest and numbers have constantly increased, till now as many as thirty are present—about every young man in the place. I do not think that in any place do I feel my responsibility as a Christian worker as I do Sunday evening with those thirty boys around me. Some of them I know sincerely try to do right, most want to, but some come here and pray, who go out to put Christ to open shame.

When you pray for the mission remember these young men. They are the hope of our Church, but so few of them seem rooted and grounded in love. I submit to you the account of what, as your representative, I have been trying to do during the years. We are all fellow-workers with Him, and fully as much as the work needs your financial help it needs your prayers.

BROTHER MODERATOR.—Your Committee on Baptist Union has to report as follows :

1. Obeying the instructions given by Conference we addressed the following circular letter to the Churches and ministers :

"DEAR BRETHREN :—We were instructed by the last General Conference to address you on the question of Baptist Union, on which you are now asked to vote.

The question of Union of the two Baptist denominations having been agitated, more or less, for several years, a joint committee was appointed in 1886 to consider the subject, and, if possible, arrange a Basis of Union. That committee agreed upon a "Basis of Union." It is published in the Year Book of 1890.

The Churches are now asked to say whether they approve of that Basis. It is important that the vote be full and based upon proper information. We have, therefore, to ask that before a

vote is taken the Basis be read in every Church; also, that every member be requested to read it at home.

It is necessary to remember that you are not asked to vote on whether you are willing to become Baptists, or have Baptists become Free Baptists, but whether you are willing to accept the Basis of Union as a statement of your doctrinal beliefs, and to have a union with any person or denomination that accepts the same beliefs.

It is not our duty or privilege in this letter to state our own personal views on the question. We are willing to leave the whole matter with the Lord and our brethren in the Churches.

We are instructed, however, by the Conference, to urge that the vote be a full and clear declaration from every Church. And that it may be, we suggest:

(1) That due notice be given of the meeting at which the vote is to be taken, and that the object be clearly announced.

(2) That all the members of the Churches, both male and female, be requested to vote; and that the vote be taken by ballot.

(3) That when the time comes to vote the question be put thus: *Are you in favor of the Basis of Union?*

(4) That the votes be counted, that a record of the number voting yea, the number voting nay, and the number present not voting, be made in the Church book, and that the number voting either way be stated in the report of the Church to the District Meeting.

A question so important cannot be decided lightly. And we trust the brethren in all the Churches are asking and will continue to earnestly pray for Divine guidance. If we are directed of God the result will surely be for the promotion of His cause and to His Glory."

2. The reports received from Clerks of Districts do not enable us to say, with exactness, how many Churches voted on the question; but probably not more than one-third of our churches voted.

3. The total number of votes cast is 1,309, or about one-eighth of our membership. Of those who voted, 447 were in favor of the Basis of Union, and 862 against it.

4. It is quite evident that the votes cast are not a sufficiently full and satisfactory expression on so important a question. What are the reasons which induced so large a number to refrain from voting, your committee cannot undertake to say with certainty. Possibly the method suggested was not the best, or the time may have been inopportune, or there may be a lack of thorough understanding of the Basis and all that may be involved in its adoption or rejection. But, whatever the reason or reasons, the result of

the attempt to get an expression of the will of our people can scarcely be considered decisive.

5. Whatever may, in coming years, be unfolded to us as the Divine will in this matter, it is apparent that our present duty is to carefully conserve the interests intrusted to us as a denomination, and to propagate with zeal the doctrines peculiar to us.

6. For our brethren of the Baptist denomination we entertain profound Christian love, and desire that our mutual relations continue to be warmly fraternal, as becomes those who hold more truth in common than any other two Christian bodies.

7. We suggest that a letter communicating the facts about the action of our Churches and the substance of this report, be addressed to the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces.

Report of the Corresponding Secretary of the Woman's Mission Society.

MRS. PRESIDENT AND SISTERS :—Another milestone in the journey of life has been reached, and again it becomes my duty to lay before you my annual report of your foreign work. To-day we meet under peculiar circumstances, and with mingled feelings of joy and sadness. Joy and thankfulness pervades our hearts that our own lives and the life of our dear missionary has been spared, and we have been permitted to do something for the Master, while our hearts are saddened that our dear Sister Hooper's health has obliged her to relinquish, for a time at least, her dearly loved work, and we are left as a society without a representative in India ; but it is not for us to be discouraged. God's ways are not as our ways. It is ours to trust where we cannot see, for we walk by faith, not sight.

From the annual Indian report we learn that all the departments of work have been carried on with zeal ; while it has been a year of weeping, anxiety and labor on account of the work being so broken by sickness and death ; yet those missionaries who were blessed with health were willing to do extra work that the others who were ill might take needed rest. As you know, our work is located at Balasore. In that district the different departments of the work, viz : Zenana work, schools, Bazaar work, has been vigorously carried on. Our Bible women, under Mrs. Boyer, have a round of villages which they visit regularly, and have gone out to the schools when practicable. Of the good they are doing eternity alone will disclose the value. Of our work Mrs. Boyer writes : "The work supported by the ladies has been interrupted by the departure of Miss Hooper, but I am glad to say none of it has been stopped. Dr. Nellie Phillips united her four schools with the seven girls' schools supported by the American ladies Board. Mrs. Griffin, needing Bible women to complete her number, took three, and I have taken Uma. The work I am carrying

on for you has been perhaps more than usually encouraging, from the fact that Dannie, of his own free will, volunteered to leave his home and comforts at Balasore and make his home among the poor and ignorant at Ujurda for Christ's sake. I have visited them once in their new home, and found them happy and much respected by the villagers, both heathen and Christian. It has been the means of drawing out Dannie's wife. She holds a prayer meeting for the women, and goes about among them singing and talking of Jesus. She has now begun work regularly. Dannie loves his work and is training up the new converts in the straight truth. Formerly all of them bought their weekly supplies from the large market held on Sunday; now no one buys or sells on the Sabbath. I was much pleased with a little story Dannie told me while there. One of our new Christians was ploughing on a Hindoo holy day. He was reproved by one of his heathen neighbours, who said, "How dare you profane this holy day. Can't you rest on our puja days?" The convert replied, "Every week I keep one day holy to the true God. I cannot afford to keep heathen holy days too, but if you will observe my holy day every week I will observe yours." His neighbor left him. The Bible women have been at work regularly. They bring me a monthly report of the number of houses visited, persons seen and the subjects of conversation. I do not make a table of these statistics, for I know they often visit the same houses and see the same persons over and over again, so I cannot make an exact statement of the number of the different persons seen."

Sister Boyer also says: "There has been a wonderful blessing on the work at Ujurda from the beginning. Slowly but surely they have been coming in from heathenism, 'till now there is a Church of ten, where a year and a half ago there was not one. It does not seem too much to expect that the village will, as a whole, become Christian. A large school-house has been built and a good school is in good running order. Dannie himself gives religious instruction daily. I wish, at least until you have another missionary in the field, you would adopt this important branch of the work."

Sister Boyer and dear little Bessie and Rilla have the sympathy and prayers of each one of our sisters. Since coming to this meeting I was handed one dollar and nineteen cents from the little children of Dover Sabbath-school, who wished it sent to Bessie and Rilla, Mrs. Boyer's little girls. It touched me deeply to know that even the little ones are thinking of their little sisters away across the ocean, and early learning to help them.

Of Sister Hooper's work I need not speak, as I have a full and interesting report from her appended, and with devout thanks-

giving in our hearts for her preserved life, we gladly welcome our sister in our midst to-day to tell us herself of her work and of all her needs and of what she has been doing.

Sisters! The burden of every letter from the Missionaries, of every page of the Annual Report, is help! help! More workers are needed. Are we doing all we should? In the face of every difficulty let us not grow weary in well doing, for in due season we shall reap if we faint not. 'Tis the sowing time now; the reaping will come by-and-by, and we have the glorious promise, "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end."

Miss Hooper's Report.

My Dear Sisters :—During the publication of the yearly Indian report I was ill in a Calcutta hospital, hence no account of the work entrusted to my care was given.

The schools at Swarasatipura, Jangunj and Brahmoonie were kept up as usual. The result of the yearly government examination was not known when I left. Swaraswatipura school I've always considered the most encouraging of the three. Indeed it seems little short of a miracle that in a village where idolatry had such a strong hold the head man of the place should be willing to dismiss the family priest and turn the idol temple into a school-house, and that for a girls' school too!

At Jangung opposition has ceased and religious instruction received, not only in the school, but in the homes of the high-caste as well as in the huts of the poor.

Only a few months ago a priest who lived by imposing on the superstition of the people said to us: "You are destroying our trade by teaching the people your religion." Another Brahmin, who was the family priest in the home of the man who formerly opposed us so, came and asked me for work, saying: "I can't live on the small pay I get from the babn." Another Brahmin of Jangunj put a little boy who had no home under my care. I put him in the orphanage which is under Mrs. Beyer's care.

At Brahmoonie we have seen much up-hill work and had our faith tested. The very name shows it was once a village of Brahmins. The people are poor, and many of the little girls have to

work in the fields to earn their daily food. When ill I felt the school would have to be closed, but Dr. N. M. Phillips visited it and said that it was "a pity to close such a nice school." So we will thank the Lord and take courage about Brahmaonia.

During the cold season vacation of the Bible School, two of the students, Umesh Singh and Amrita Singh, (Butini's sons), I employed as Catechists. They did much good work in the schools, villages, markets and bazaars.

The Bible women, Uma Kokoi, Gelha, and their assistants, Suni and Sorra, have worked faithfully during the year.

Owing to illness and family cares Kokoi was unable to attend to her work for a few weeks before I left. She has since moved with her family to Cuttack, where her husband is employed.

Kokoi was a superior worker and won the hearts of her heathen neighbours. She began a new work in a Telugu village, a blind boy who spoke Oriya acting as interpreter.

July 11th Mrs. Griffin writes: "Your Bible women are well. Sorra goes with my women. Do you think you can support Sorra? Gelha and Suni are also going with my Bible women. Vina had a little surplus from her Bible women's fund and she helps support them now. We are hoping you can secure their support in New Brunswick. Uma goes with Mrs. Boyer's Bible women. As soon as you can ascertain and let us know if New Brunswick will support them we shall be glad. I have no extra funds at all. The women were very anxious to go on with work. My garrie goes each Tuesday to the villages where your women used to go in your garrie. On Wednesday my garrie does not go. I would send them on that day to the outlying villages if you could help me a little with the cost of garrie. Ask the women won't you? May God bless the people of New Brunswick and help them to send out more workers than ever before. Vina and Dr. Nellie are both in very poor health; they must both go home this year. Dr. and Mrs. Bachelor are to go too, and our family. How we wish New Brunswick would send out a man to take Mr. Boyer's place."

A letter of August 15th, from Mrs. Boyer, who is in the Hills with her sick baby, says: "None of your work is dropped; Nellie took all of your schools with Idias and provides for their support. Vina supports Suni and Gelha. They go with Mrs. Griffin's Bible women. I have asked the New Brunswick women to support the school at Ujuzda and Dannie's wife. I have also asked the men to support the orphanage."

A letter from Miss Coombs, of July 9th, says: "Dr. Nellie has given up her medical work; something had to be dropped,

there will be such an exodus in the spring—Dr. and Mrs. Bachelor, and Mr. and Mrs. Griffin. We are anxiously looking for new comers. Hattie Phillips is not able to return this autumn, so Nellie and I have decided to remain."

Later, a card from Miss Coombs, says: "The doctor says Mrs. Boyer cannot bring up her Rilla in this country."

In all probability Mrs. Boyer may soon be obliged to leave her loved work.

From a personal knowledge of the field and the workers I feel that a crisis has come in our work over there. The need, especially of workers, is very great. Shall we lose the opportunity; or shall we give the gospel to the perishing millions of Orissa? "Thrust in thy sickle and reap; for the time is come for thee to reap."

Since my return in the last week in June it has been my privilege to attend Seventh, Fourth and Third District Meetings. The people seem interested in the work when they hear of it, yet I feel how difficult it must be to realize the state of the heathen world when one has always lived in an atmosphere of christianity, and where "blessings fall like the dew."

When the "Our Father" falls from our lips may we remember our brethren and sisters in heathenism. By-and-by may the King say to us "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."
