SLAIN BY FATHER  
ON EVE OF WEDDING

Everett Man Murders His Daughter  
and Then Commits Suicide

Miss Pansy Townsend of Everett, Mass., Was to Have Been Married Within Three Hours of the Time the Terrible Tragedy Occurred—Parent Left Note That He Had Killed Her Rather Than See Her the Bride of the Man She Had Chosen.

Everett, Mass., March 26—Less than three hours before the time set for her wedding today, Pansy E. Townsend was shot and fatally wounded by her father, Joseph P. Townsend, in the sitting room of their home, 15 Woodville street, this city. Townsend then ended his own life by putting a revolver bullet into his head.

The only clue to the cause of the tragedy was a note written by Townsend. It was stated today and read:

"At 3:45 I have taken my daughter's life and my own. I do this rather than see her the wife of Francis Perry."

FOUR NEW YORK  
FIREMEN KILLED

Many Also Injured by Falling Walls  
Caused by Explosions

More Than 300 Employes in Factory When Fire Started—Panic Ensued as They Tried to Escape—Sixty Girls Huddled on Fire Escapes and Jumped to the Life Nets or Were Handed Down by Pyramid of Willing Workers—Loss About \$400,000.

New York, March 26—Four firemen were killed and about a score of firemen and citizens were injured today in a fire, accompanied by a series of explosions, that demolished a six story factory building on the Bedford and Downing streets in the Greenwich Village district on the lower West Side of the city.

That the damage which is estimated at from \$300,000 to \$400,000, was not far greater was declared by Chief Croker to be due to the explosions which shattered the building and crushed the blaze beneath tons of debris at the moment when the flames were completely beyond control and threatening to swamp the entire block.

Three hundred men and women were in the factory during the lunch hour when a slight explosion occurred on one of the upper floors and almost instantly the whole structure was enveloped in flames.

SUDDEN DEATH OF ROBT. A. PAYNE

Former St. John Newspaper Man Succumbed at Home in Lincoln

AT HIS POST ALMOST TO LAST. Had Been Assisting in Reporting Local Legislation—Prominent in Maritime Journalism for Thirty Years and Well Esteemed—Dropsy Complicated With Heart Trouble Caused Death.

Fredericton, N. B., March 23.—(Special)—Robert A. Payne, well known newspaper man, died quite suddenly at his home in Lincoln, Sunbury county, Saturday evening, from dropsy complicated with heart trouble. He had been in this city for the past few weeks assisting Dr. James Haney with the legislative reporting and the nervous strain entailed by the work seemed to be more than his weakened constitution could stand.

Mr. Payne had been associated with the daily "Telegraph" for thirty years, and severed his connection with the Sun newspaper only a few months ago. He was widely known throughout the province and in his younger days was considered one of the best news gatherers and reporter of St. John.

First a Druggist. In his youth, Mr. Payne, who was born on his father's farm at Lincoln, entered the drug business of George Hunt in Fredericton, where he served his apprenticeship for two years.

Mr. Payne was appointed correspondent of the "Telegraph" and his work in that connection met with such success that in the following year he was appointed night editor of the paper.

Mr. Payne was a member of the staff of the "Telegraph" for many years, and was a prominent figure in the journalistic world of the province.

From his long association with political questions in the handling of news the late Mr. Payne obtained a knowledge of parliamentary affairs second to none in this province, and was thoroughly versed in all questions of the day.

Deceased was aged sixty-three and was the younger brother and to all intents and purposes the only surviving member of the family.

Grand Falls, March 21.—J. F. McChesney's store was burglarized at an early hour yesterday morning and eighteen gold rings and two dozen of silver, jewel and plated rings stolen, besides other goods. The gold rings are valued at \$25 each. The total loss cannot be learned unless stock be again taken.

Vassier, one of the smallest guards on duty, saw a light moving around the store about 4 a. m. but thought it was the proprietor.

McChesney drove to Caribou this morning with a warrant, and the culprit will likely accompany them across the border without extradition proceedings.
