Courses of Study.

I.—CLASSICAL COURSE.

This course extends over two years, and embraces the subjects required for admission to the full Arts Course in Acadia College.

II.—TEACHERS' COURSE.

This course is designed for those who are intending to apply for a Teacher's license of B, C, or D grade.

III.—COMMERCIAL COURSE.

This course embraces the subjects in the Classical Course, except Greek, for which French and German are substituted, and is designed to fit students for an English Course* in Acadia College.

The primary object of the above course of study is to prepare young men for College; but at the same time provision is made for an English Course, complete in itself, by adding to the English of this Course certain studies that may be selected from the course pursued in Acadia Seminary. This selection is designed to fit young men for general occupations.

Young men wishing to prepare for Teacher's examinations will find it profitable to take up the Course here presented, exclusive of the Classics, with the addition of some selected subjects in Science, Mensuration, etc., which are provided for when students of this class present themselves.

* This consists of the following electives from the regular College Course: English Literature, Rhetoric, Logic, Moral Science, Political Economy, History, and Natural Science.

PAYMENT OF BILLS.

Grammar, X The necessity for prompt payment is readily seen by every one. Large purchases have to be made from time to time; salaries have to be met, and interest on the debt on the buildings has to be paid, and prompt remittances are necessary to enable the Managing Committee to meet their engagements.

No deduction in tuition or rent bills will be made for absence during the first two or last two weeks of a Term.

Students who have paid in advance, but who may be called away from the Institution by sickness or other necessary cause, will have the money refunded to them *pro rata* for time of absence.

HORTON ACADEMY.

Established, A. D., 1828.

This Academy is under the control of the Board of Governors of Acadia College, and in its government and regulations is subordinate to the faculty of the College. It aims, to provide, at a reasonable charge, good opportunities for boys and young men to prepare for usefulness and efficiency in the different occupations of life. Its prime object is to fit pupils to enter College, and the chief attention is therefore given to the Classical Course.

The School seeks to elevate the morals of the pupils, and to foster Christian principles, as well as to communicate knowledge and to develop the mind.

The situation is such as to furnish conditions necessary to healthfulness. The scenery, a matter of not a little importance to the location of a School, is, in some respects, unsurpassed. The Boarding House lately assigned to Academy pupils, for the exclusive use, is that occupied by the Ladies of the Seminary until the new Seminary was constructed. This house has undergone repairs, and has been made more convenient and comfortable than when used as the Seminary Boarding House. Here suitable accommodations are furnished for about twenty pupils, chiefly the younger and less advanced in their studies, who are under the direct charge of the Teachers, in regard to conduct and attention to study at the time appointed. The Principal and family also reside in this House, and board at the same table with the pupils.

The older and more advanced pupils, who present good references and testimonials in regard to character, are accommodated in the College Boarding House, so far as the space permits, on the same terms and conditions as College Students.

Pupils who, for any reasons, are not accommodated in either of these Houses, will be boarded elsewhere, by an arrangement with the Principal and the Chairman of the Executive Committee.

Every student at all times arduous and ready to send a written order and quarterly make a faithful record of the main, are to be supplied for admission to the same. The use of intoxicating liquors is prohibited. The use of tobacco, except in the case of parents, is prohibited. Smoking is prohibited in the buildings, nor in the presence of students. A daily record of the conduct of the students is forwarded to the College. Demerits will be given for any actuality, for any violation of the regulations of the school. When the demerits of a student reach a certain number, he will be removed by the Executive Committee.

Regulations.

ard of Government regulations is submitted to provide, at all times and in all places; to faithfully observe the hours for study and recreation; to be prompt at the opening exercises of the school each day; to properly observe the Sabbath, and attend College, and the public worship and Bible Class; to be punctual at every recitation, Course.

Every student is expected to be gentlemanly in his deportment; to send a written statement explaining why he is not there; to be orderly and quiet about the buildings; to be respectful to teachers; to make a faithful effort to perform every duty assigned,—such, in the main, are the regulations of the school, and every student who applies for admission is received only on condition of agreeing to the same.

The use of intoxicating liquors is absolutely prohibited. The use of tobacco is forbidden to all students under eighteen years of age, unless they present a written request from their parents permitting them to use it.

Smoking is not allowed on the grounds, in the vicinity of the buildings, nor on the public streets.

DAILY RECORD.

A daily record of deportment and scholarship is kept, and will be forwarded to parents and guardians at the end of each term, or more frequently if desired.

Demerits will be given for ungentlemanly conduct, for lack of punctuality, for wilful violations of Academic regulations, and for disregard of study hours.

When the demerits reach 50 parents will be notified of the same; when they reach 100 the student will be removed from the school.

The demerits received one term may be reduced or wholly removed by unexceptionably good deportment the subsequent term.

CLASSIFICATION.

At the opening of each Term an effort is made to classify the pupils to the best advantage.

The daily marks are combined with the results of frequent written and oral examinations and the scholarship thus determined.

Unexcused absences from class are reckoned as failures.

There are three grades of scholarship :—

FIRST GRADE,—Those whose average is from 6.5 to 10.

SECOND GRADE,— “ “ “ 4.5 to 6.5.

THIRD GRADE,— “ “ “ below 4.5.

Students of the Junior Year who, on the year's work, have obtained First Grade are allowed to advance to the Middle Year; those of the Second Grade are allowed to join the Middle Year on probation for one term, and in case they do not improve their standing they are put back into the next Junior Year. Students of the Third Grade are required to go over the year's work again. The same principle is applied in the case of students of the Middle Year being advanced to the Senior Year.

By vote of the Faculty of Acadia College, First Grade Students of the Senior Year from Horton Collegiate Academy, provided their marks on no subject fall below 4.5, are admitted to College as full matriculants, without examination, on presentation of a certificate from the Principal of the Academy.

Students of the Second Grade are admitted on probation for one term; if during that time they improve their standing they are then fully admitted. Students must have been in the Academy at least three months to get the benefit of this arrangement.

SOCIETIES.

The Horton Collegiate Academy Lyceum, a Society under the management of the students of the Academy, meets weekly for literary exercises.

The Acadia Missionary Society, open to all students of the Institutions meets monthly, when missionary intelligence from various parts of the world is communicated, essays read, and matters of interest relating to missions discussed.

LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.

The Library of Acadia College is accessible, under proper restrictions, to the students of the Academy.

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The Reading Room, under the control of the students of Acadia College, well supplied with foreign and domestic periodicals and newspapers, is open to the students of the Academy, on payment of a small fee, or by subscribing to the College paper, the *Acadia Athenæum*.

MORAL AND RELIGIOUS INFLUENCES.

This Academy, from its foundation in 1828, has had a moral and religious record, unsurpassed by any school of like character in this Continent.

The conditions are such that unless vicious habits are already formed the student is elevated and ennobled. Many who come here thoughtless and irreligious have their purposes changed for life. On Sabbath morning and Wednesday evening there are prayer meetings conducted by the students of the College and Academy. These meetings have proved a spiritual benefit to those attending them.

ADMISSION.

The regular time of admission to the Academy is the beginning of each Term and on November 1st. Students may enter at any time if they are able to join the regular classes and do satisfactory work in them. It is desired that pupils present themselves at the opening of the Terms for classification, as it is difficult to do those justice who come after the opening. Testimonials of good moral character, from some responsible person, will be required from those with whom the teachers are not personally acquainted. Pupils coming from other Schools must present certificates of honorable dismissal.

NOTE.—The First Session of Acadia College begins on the first Thursday of September, and ends on the third Thursday in December.

The Second Session begins on the first Thursday after January 4th, and ends on the first Thursday in June.

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Requirements for Matriculation.

The regular Matriculation Examination begins on the Wednesday preceding the first Thursday in September.

No candidate can be admitted to the examination who has not completed his fifteenth year; nor will any candidate be admitted before he has produced satisfactory testimonials of good moral character.

For admission to *advanced standing*, candidates must pass a general examination in the studies already pursued by the class which they propose to enter.

Candidates for Matriculation, except graduates in full standing of the Horton Collegiate Academy, will be required to pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects:

- I. LATIN.—Caesar, Gallic War, Bk. I., Virgil Æneid, Bk. I., Cicero, two Orations against Catiline, or the Manilian Law, Latin Grammar,* (Harkness's Abridged is preferred), Smith's Principia Latina, Pt. IV., Exs. 1-25, or the equivalent.
- II. GREEK.—Xenophon, Anabasis, Bk. I., or Bk. IV., Greek Grammar, (Hadley's Abridged is preferred).
- III. MATHEMATICS.—Arithmetic, Algebra, to the end of Simple Equations, Geometry, as in Davies's Legendre, Books I.-IV. (inclusive), or the equivalent thereof.
- IV. ENGLISH.*—Grammar, Writing from Dictation, and a short Composition, upon some subject drawn either from Goldsmith's Vicar of Wakefield or Macaulay's Essay on Addison which must be correct in spelling, punctuation, grammar and expression.
- V. HISTORY AND GEOGRAPHY.—Swinton's Outlines of Universal History, Modern Geography, Ancient Geography of Greece, Italy and Asia Minor.

* Special stress is laid on this part of the examination.
