CHURCH AND STAGE.
Cause of the Separation of the Church
and Theatre.
Geo. C. Mill, the evangelist, in his lec-
ture in Halifax, on the above subject,
said that the church and the theatre
were twin children and capable of
achieving the same ends—sustain a
relation of trust and unity. What
caused the separation of the church and
the theatre, which is so much to be de-
plored; and why may we not look for-
ward to a time when the pulpit and the
stage, having passed into nobler condi-
tions, shall again stand side by side, hand
clasped in hand, as loving sisters, mutu-
ally ambitious to promote the true
elevation of humanity? To seek after
and express in an entirely sanguine and
friendly spirit an answer to this question
is the congenial task of the present hour.
The stage I choose, a subject fair and free—
To years, its mine, its common property—
At first I wish to insist upon the early
relationship between church and theatre,
of which I have already made mention.
It is knowledge, easily within the reach
of all before us, that the dramatic art
was begotten of the same impulse as
religious worship, and that, among all
nations, their earliest forms were simul-
taneously developed. In the far east,
where the drama exists in its crudest
forms, in China and Japan, we see the
song and dances of early religious festi-
vals gradually breaking away from the
custody of the priests, to be conducted
by a distinct class of actors. But with
them as with us the impulse, which has
led all nations into the institution of
religious forms and ceremonies, is also
found to be the real source of the
dramatic art. In India the high caste
Brahmins attribute the origin of the drama
to Bharata, an inspired sage, who received
his inspiration, as they allege, direct
from Brahma himself; and to me it has
been exceedingly interesting to find that
with this remarkable people the earliest
dramatic representations were directly
controlled by the priests, and that all
the sagacious conceived of the drama as
the helmsman of religion, and as a powerful
factor in the education of the
people. . . . We perceive, then,
that even after the Hindoo drama had
risen into a distinct existence, its true
aim was still held to be to impart in-
struction through the agency of amuse-
ment. And I here make bold to say
that in all nations actors and dramatic
authors had been true to this conception,
the stage, as a factor in our civilization,
would have been more influential than
the pulpit, whose aim, in the main, has
been to impart instruction without the
least amusement in the world! It is in
classic Greece, however, that we find the
early drama, distinctly and honor-
ably allied with the church and state, as
it was in the country of Oeschylus,
Sophocles, and Euripides, that the art
attained the summit of its early glory.
The origin of
THE GREEK DRAMA
is found in those heterogeneous cere-
monies in which the sacrifice of animals,
tumultuous dances and mystic chants
formed the chief features of the worship
of Dionysus, Bacchus and kindred
divinities. Its factors were among the
most honored citizens. The Roman
drama was at the first imported from
Greece, but it never assumed the dig-
nity, either from a literary or dramatic
standpoint, which characterized the atti-
tude. It was in Rome, too, that the
stage first came into conflict with the
Christian church. The stage had fallen
into a condition of indecency which
justified its condemnation; but we find
strangely enough, a most significant
testimony to
THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE DRAMA,
as an educational force, in the fact that
the very Christian fathers who condemned
the Roman stage, themselves wrote
tragedies and comedies, based upon the
picturesque portions of the Old and New
Testaments. Indeed the single link
which connects the old Roman drama
with that of the middle ages is found in
this class of plays in which God, Abraham,
Moses, Job, and the devil were the
dramatis personae. Gregory Nazianzen's
"Passion of Christ" still remains as a
specimen of this era of the dramatic art.
I have dwelt long enough, however, upon
this phase of the subject. What I have
said will sufficiently illustrate the mean-
ing of the remark that the church and
the theatre are twin children of the
religious impulse, and that their child-
hood was spent in loving fellowship.
Upon what ground, then, are we to ac-
count for the coldness and enmity which
has so long divided them? The story is
too long for detailed narration. Only a
snatch here and there can possibly be
given now. But it will help our
understanding of the situation if we
notice the difference in process by which
church and theatre have sought to attain
the same object. The church has aimed
to reform society by directly attacking
its defects by pointing out its immoral-
ities, and describing the penalties in store
for wrong doers. The theatre, on the
other hand, has endeavored to make
vice loathsome by depicting it as it is
by holding
"The mirror up to nature,"
that we might see her own features,
scorn her own image, and
"The very age and body of the time, his form and
pression"

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THE LEGISLATURE.

Debate on the Motion that the House go into Supply.

Speeches by Messrs. Wetmore, Humphrey, McManus and Stockton.

Provincial Secretary's Motion Carried by a Vote of 30 to 10.

Yesterday, the Provincial Secretary began his Budget Speech. The Secretary makes no pretensions to oratory, but he has a very clear head and knows the meaning of words, so that his explanation of the finances of the country is always sure to be lucid and interesting. He does not talk for effect. When he tells of a successful stroke of management, he contents himself with the telling of it. If a few thousand dollars have been saved he says so, but takes no credit for it, apparently regarding it as his simple duty to manage matters in a practical business like way. As we will publish his speech in full next week, we will not attempt even a synopsis of it to-day, but limit it by saying that he covered all the ground which he ought to cover, and when he had done so with purely financial subjects, branched out into a defence of the government against the charges of interference in Dominion politics which carried conviction to every one who heard him. He was followed by

MR. WETMORE who appeared in good humor and rather more disposed to display the pleasant side of his nature than he usually is. He made a very good opposition speech, so far as the matter went, that is, he used up all the matter relevant or irrelevant to the debate. He went on to discuss the various subjects which he covered, and when he had done so with purely financial subjects, branched out into a defence of the government against the charges of interference in Dominion politics which carried conviction to every one who heard him. 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been used for the Liberal candidate, the truth was that both in St. John and King's officials of the Local Government had worked for the Conservative candidate. During this part of his speech Mr. McLeod made some interruptions of a negative character, but Mr. Stockton speedily silenced him. Mr. Adams also drew a little of the speaker's fire, but did not appear to relish it and so he left the House and did not come back until the Sergeant at Arms found him when he was wanted for the division. Mr. Stockton took occasion to refer to Mr. Wetmore's hostility to the Marysville Bridge.

As this is of a local interest we will give the colloquy in the words of both gentlemen:—
Mr. Stockton, "My honorable friend from York wished the House to understand that the support of the distinguished citizen who lives at Marysville had been purchased by the government by Mr. Wetmore, after some hesitation, I meant he bought a government. Mr. Stockton, "I do not understand my honorable friend unless he means that the government built the bridge to induce Mr. Gibson to buy them. Is that what he means? Is he willing to let it stand for fact? Mr. Wetmore said that he did. Mr. Stockton added, "Then we will let it stand in that way."

At the close of his remarks Mr. Stockton referred to the purchase of the portrait of Lieutenant Governor Wilton to which Mr. Wetmore had objected. He said he thought the sentiment of the country would approve of the purchase of portraits of the Lieutenant Governor since Confederation and that he thought the portraits of the men to whom this Province owes responsible government, namely Messrs. McLeod and Fisher should adorn the walls.

After Mr. Stockton had concluded his observations there was a full and considerable surprise was manifested that no opposition man rose to reply. Every one was in his place but Mr. Adams, and the sergeant at arms soon found him. Then the member for Northumberland came in every one expected a speech, but when a whispered word or two to his friend who was sitting next to him, he did not rise again until the vote was taken. The House thereupon divided as follows: upon the motion that Mr. Speaker should leave the chair:—

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CANADA'S COMMERCE.

Review of the Official Returns for the Trade of the Year.

The trade returns for the fiscal year 1884-85 have been laid before Parliament—(1) New Brunswick's exports, \$2,544,981 went to Great Britain, \$1,238,232 to the United States, and the balance to other countries. The principal articles exported from New Brunswick were—Lumber, \$4,440,012 of which \$1,080,251 was not Canadian produce, but logs floated down St. John River from Maine; fish, \$1,114,586; animals and their produce, \$207,670; minerals, \$95,034; manufactures, \$203,194.

Nova Scotia exported 320 horses, valued at \$20,200. The 1,544 horses shipped from New Brunswick were of various breeds.

The Sad Flight of Lumbermen and Settlers in Recent Months.

All hands, with teams and sleds, turned out this evening and opened a road to the river, so that those in need of water might obtain that useful article. Word was brought here yesterday that over fifty men had left Howard's camp on Grand river, on Saturday, and that they expected great difficulty in reaching the nearest settlement. The men were obliged to leave behind them on the river nine horses, but returned the following day to get them. It is said that when the men reached the first house in the settlement they found an old man and his wife making preparations to leave, being without provisions and had placed their small family of children on a sled to journey to the next settlement. It is said that the old man and his wife had a settlement of about six miles distant, on Friday last, but were not interested in being impossible to reach, as they were unable to get their sleds over the ice. The men were shortly received of some and cases of starvation and death among the poorer settlers in remote districts.
