Lord Brougham and Newspaper Writing.—Some phrenologists contend, that the casts which have been taken of the heads of celebrated lawyers show a lamentable deficiency in the organ of conscientiousness; and are of opinion, that Lord Brougham, aware of this fact, has, from that consideration alone, refused to allow a cast of his head to be taken, although he has openly, in the patronage of Mr. Simpson and others who are attempting to introduce a system of public education phrenological principles, shown that he is a partisan of the doctrine. I do not know whether it be true, that the nature of the education and pursuits of the lawyers has a tendency to check the development of the organ called conscientiousness, or that the head of Lord Brougham is, in this respect, deficient in the external sign; neither do I know whether, in this general conduct as a man, there may be any ground for supposing that he is deficient in conscientiousness; but I am quite sure, that, if there be any truth in phrenology, he must be the organ of caution (the phrenologists have another word for it that is less flattering) strongly developed. Whilst he was Lord Chancellor, he was in the almost daily habit of communicating articles to a daily paper, but with a degree of caution which few men would have imagined. Not a line of his writing came before the compositors, or even the editor. His communications were made by letter to his brother, by whom they were read to the editor, who wrote as Mr. Brougham read; and, in this way, the leading articles appeared, without its being possible to prove that they came from Lord Brougham's pen. On one occasion, when an article against the Whig Ministry had appeared in the Times, it was sent to Lord Brougham, who was sitting at Westminster in the Court of Chancery. The paper was folded in such a way that the article might meet the eye readily and was handed up to the Chancellor. Sir Edward Sturgen was pleading. The Chancellor laid the paper before him, took his pen, and, whilst the public and the bar imagined that he was taking notes of Sir Edward's speech, with whom, from time to time, he held a conversation on the points of his case, the answer was written. Less than a quarter of an hour sufficed for an article of about forty lines full of spirit. When it was done, he made some excuse for quitting the bench for a few minutes, and went into his own room, when it was given to the editor to transcribe; for, although Lord Brougham could write, and write well for newspapers, no man was to be permitted to possess a proof that the articles came from him. I have heard of other instances of this caution in his relations with the newspaper-press; but, as they were not like those which I have given within my personal knowledge, I shall not repeat them here.

Extraordinary change of Fortune.—Mr. John Mobbs, who died at Llington about the year 1789, by his will bequeathed a large & valuable estate then known as the Wenlock Farm, to executors, upon trust for the benefit of his two sons, then of the ages of three or four years, who were to have proper schoolmasters, to be qualified

to become ornaments of society, and to be brought up to the Church of England. The executors, in violation as the trust reposed in them, at a proper age apprenticed the boys to shoemakers in the neighborhood of Shoreditch, and they have up to the present time undergone many vicissitudes, totally ignorant of the splendid patrimony to which they were entitled. The property, which during the present century has been considerably improved, comprises about 200 acres of land, now nearly all built upon, and several old established first-rate public-houses in Hoxton Old Town and its vicinity, among which are the Old Ivy House, the Rosemary Branch, the Queen's Head, the Cock and Greyhound, the King of Prussia; the Britannia, the Bacchus, the Plough, the Green Man, the College House, the Whitmore's Head, the Robin Hood, and the Noah's Ark. The will of Mr. Mobbs, after having been secreted by the different parties in whose hands it has been until within the last few weeks, having come into the possession of his sons, has just been proved by them in Doctor's Commons. The property must at the present time be worth upwards of £300,000.

Millions, of years, however, are allotted in the regions of Palata for offences of the higher grade, thousands circumscribe the penalties due to minor offences. But during all this term of trial and probation, the criminal is permitted again to return in another form to the world of delusion, that may be prepared by the

better discharge, or otherwise of the duties of his new state, to approach nearer and nearer to its final destiny, or to merit a still longer, and more fearful purgation in Palata. Such is the Hell of the Hindu; it follows, that the true Heaven of the Brahminical faith is absorption into the Deity.—From Dr. Byce's Sketches of Native Education in India.
